

DIOMEDEA JULIENI

1894

Diomedea julieni, a new species of the genus Diomedea, is described from a single specimen, a male, which was shot by Mr. J. A. Rehn, of the U. S. Fish Commission, at the mouth of the Amazon, Brazil, on July 1, 1894. The specimen is now in the collection of the U. S. Fish Commission, Washington, D. C.

The bird is of the same size as *Diomedea immutabilis*, but the plumage is entirely different. The head is black, the bill is black, and the feet are black. The back is black, the wings are black, and the tail is black. The underparts are white, with a black band across the breast. The throat is white, and the neck is white. The legs are black, and the feet are black. The bird is a male, and it is a single specimen. It was shot by Mr. J. A. Rehn, of the U. S. Fish Commission, at the mouth of the Amazon, Brazil, on July 1, 1894. The specimen is now in the collection of the U. S. Fish Commission, Washington, D. C.
