Quintus Montanus

Quintus Montanus, a Roman orator, was born in the city of Tarraco, in the province of Hispania, about the year 100 B.C. He was a member of the equestrian order, and was distinguished by his eloquence and his patriotism.

The first of his orations, which is preserved in the works of Cicero, is a speech in support of the rights of the Roman people.
