

REGITRARIUS FLAMMICEPS, Duxton

Planchonated Flower-gecko

Alphina Regitarius, Duxton, New York, 1874. J. A. S. See. Herp. vol. xvi, p. 111-12. Col.
This species was first described by the author in the Journal of the Herpetological Society of London, vol. xvi, p. 111.
It is a small, slender, and very active gecko, and is found in the mountains of the State of New York.
The following are the principal characters of the species:
Length, 1.5 inch; tail, 1.5 inch; head, .5 inch; eye, .2 inch; ear, .1 inch; nostril, .1 inch; mouth, .2 inch;
The species is taken from the mountains of the State of New York, and is now deposited in the collection of the
Herpetological Society of London.

This species differs from the other species of Planchonated Flower-gecko in
the following characters:
The body is more slender and more active than the other species.
The tail is longer and more flexible.
The head is smaller and more rounded.
The eye is larger and more prominent.
The ear is smaller and less distinct.
The nostril is smaller and less distinct.
The mouth is smaller and less distinct.
The species is taken from the mountains of the State of New York, and is now deposited in the collection of the
Herpetological Society of London.
