

PTERODACTYLUS

1840

The first specimen of this genus was discovered by Mr. G. Cuvier in the strata of the Paris basin.

It is a small, winged reptile, with a long, slender body, and a pair of large, membranous wings. The head is small, and the tail is long and pointed. The skin is covered with scales, and the wings are supported by a single bone. The fossil is preserved in a dark, calcareous matrix.

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
