people there has existed those forces whose purposes are to divide us from our brothers in order to exploit our lives our culture, our manhood. We have exemined the American educational system, particularly its universities, and have found them to be one of the major divisive forces among Black people. If we and our life-styles are to survive, then Black people must immediately be about the business of preserving and developing those systems of Black values which make our lives totally relevant to the development of a self-determined Black community. This can only be achieved through the total and unending unity of Black reonle. This, then, becomes the primary responsibility of the BSU constant reinforcement of the unifying tendencies that are manifest in Black people. This must include as a first priority the elimination of one of the most severe divisions between B 1 a c k reople, that of the Black student and the Black community. The issue is survival-for both or none-for we are the

Only through self-determination is. it possible to insure our survival as men and women when surrounded by a hostile white enviroment. The BSU must have as the basic rremise of its existence community and national selfdetermination. This is the unifying goal of Black people. If we are serously about the business of creating a black-directed destiny for a Black nation, then we must recognize the resnonsibility for directing all available resources to our community and where that responsibility lies. As students we have access to the resources which can further the programs directed toward the unity and self-determination of Black peorle. It is our responsibility to direct thes resources toward these goals. To do less is to renege on ourselves, our people, our survival.

In order to create those conditions which are necessary to the development of our sef-determination, we must make ourselves totally aware of the contradictions involved in traditional white educational systems and our lives. mustrecognize the existence of the Black experience as nothing less than a reality. This experience has coused us to perceive the total world in a way which is basically different from a white percention of the same world. But our experience and perceptions are real, and it is from this roint that we must begin to enalyze the neture of our condition and its relationship to our survival. Only from this perspective can programs be developed which are capable of building, reinforcing, and saleguard ing Black unity and national self-deter mination. And only from this perspective is it rossible to perceive the results of these rrograms as they relate to our lives.
