

The Eastern and Central sections of Kansas, are sufficiently well timbered on the river bottoms, extending from three to five miles in width, and along the edges of prairies and streams.

WILD FRUIT.

THE country abounds with the Plum, (four or five varieties,) Cherry, Paw-Paw, Persimmon, Grape, (several varieties) Hickory Nut, Black Walnut, Butter-nut, Hazel-nut, Bean-nut, Wild Cherry, Crab Apple, Mulberry, Strawberry, Raspberry, Gooseberry, Blackberry, &c.

**CULTIVATED FRUIT.**

THE Apple, Pear, Peach, Plum, Cherry, Grape, Currant, Gooseberry, Raspberry, Strawberry, and all fruits or vegetables raised in the Eastern and Middle States.

## CULTIVATED CROPS.

KANZAS is well adapted for the cultivation of Hemp, Tobacco, Wheat, Buckwheat, Corn, Oats, Barley, Rye, Irish and Sweet Potatoes, Beans, Turnips, &c.

## STOCK RAISING.

KANZAS possesses advantages for the raising and grazing of stock superior to that of any portion of the United States, as its winters are mild and dry,—its waters pure, and Cattle are not subject to the diseases peculiar to the more marshy regions of Wisconsin, Michigan, and Indiana. The Grasses of Kansas are nutritious and well adapted for Horses, Mules, Cattle and Sheep. Stock raising is one of the surest methods of acquiring wealth with but little labor, and small outlay.
