Dear Sir I embrace the
present opportunity of Dropping you a few Lines to
Let you know that we are well at present I
Received yours of 11 of June which gave me great Pleasure
to hear that you was all well and I would
atone to you a few Days since But in answer to your
Request I will try and give you a full Detail and as
Sedgwick as I can we are having a very wet time it has rained
since July the 10. all most Every Day or 2. Our crops is
good generally Wheat is pertrate Oats Rusted Corn is fine
there is the best prospect for a Good Crop I ever
Saw to take the Season altogether it has bin a good
one just about wet unless New for the affairs of, K.C.
Every thing is quiet at this time as far as I know
our Election on the Leocompton Constitution goes
off the first Monday in August as far as I can learn
the Leocompton Con will be Badly Defeated I think
there is know Chance for it at all as for the murders
Comitted at the trading post by Gambeltons Co
it was one of the most Barbarious Outrages on
Record Gambelton was Drove out of the Territory by
Montgomery, Co, a short time previous to the murder
he returned with about 30. Buffins and succeeded in
Capturing 12 men who was going about there peace
unarmed and unsuspecting he marched them to a
Suitable Place and arranged them in a Line
