

This deducted from the original amount leaves 3,743,003 acres.

Besides the Cherokee lands thus ceded, there were also ceded to the Cheyenne and Arapahoe tribes, by the said treaty of 1867, 732,162 acres, lying between the Cimarron river and the south line of the Cherokee outlet, which formerly belonged to the Creek Nation.

Thus it will be observed:

First. That the lands embraced in the said Cheyenne and Arapahoe reservation, and bounded by the Arkansas river on the east, by the south line of Kansas on the north, and by the Cimarron river on the south and west (except Creek lands disposed of), were ceded to the Cherokee Nation, for an outlet, by the treaties of 1828, 1833 and 1835.

Second. That by the treaty of 1866, the Cherokee Nation ceded said lands to the United States, for the purpose of locating other tribes thereon.

Third. That by the treaty of 1867, the said lands were ceded to the Cheyenne and Arapahoe tribes, in exchange for lands in Kansas which had been ceded to the said Cheyenne and Arapahoe tribes by the treaty of 1865.
