Fewer Cases in Missouri Than in 1957, but More Paralysis, Hardwicke Says.

Hardwicke said 1½ million persons in Missouri have failed to get the original shots Charles Finn of Los Angeles and most of these are in the "susceptible" age bracket.

Only 47 per cent of the cases reported last year resulted in paralysis while 73 per cent this year have been paralytic. The case fatality rate from polio for this year is 16 deaths per 100 cases secondes sec

POLIO IS MORE SEVERE while in 1955 there were only three per 100 cases.

"None of the polio cases this year resulting in death had received the polio vaccine," Hardwicke added, "and of the paralytic cases reported only he three had received inocula-on the tions. Of the cases reported be fill this year, 48 per cent are claims. patients under 5 years old."
