APPROVED NEW BARLEY

FOR DISTRIBUTION

A new winteh-hardy barley has been approved for distribution by Kansas State College, Manhattan. A. L. Clapp, agronomist has announced.

Named Dicktoo, the new barley has proved more winter-harny than Reno. It also has a slightly higher test weight, matures a little earlier, has somewhat shorter Colby and Hays branch experiment Reno.

The new barley variety was developed from a selection at Dickerson, N. D., in 1917, but origin of its parentage is unknown. In tests at the K-State experiment station at Manhattan, from 1947 through 1952, 99 percent of Dicktoo survived, compared with 78 percent for Reno. Its average yield was 56 bushels compared with 46 for Reno. Last year, when there was little winter killing of barley, Reno yielded 1½ bushels an acre more than Dicktoo in 12 plots at the K-State station. In 11 cooperative tests on Kansas farms, Dicktoo yielded 1.3 bushels an acre more than Reno last year.

Increases of seed of the new variety will be made this year at the straw than Reno, and may outyield stations and by the Kansas Hybrid assoriation at Manhattan.
