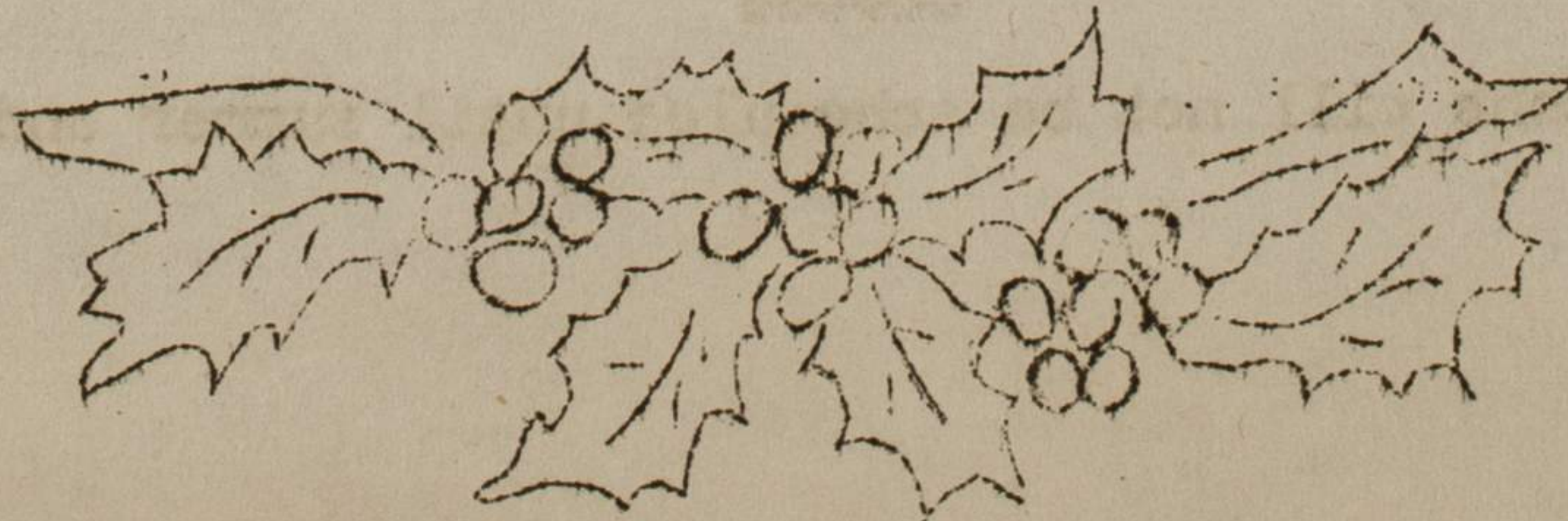
The same day, the three Township Committees (namely, Home Economics, Agriculture and 4-H) met and elected their officers.

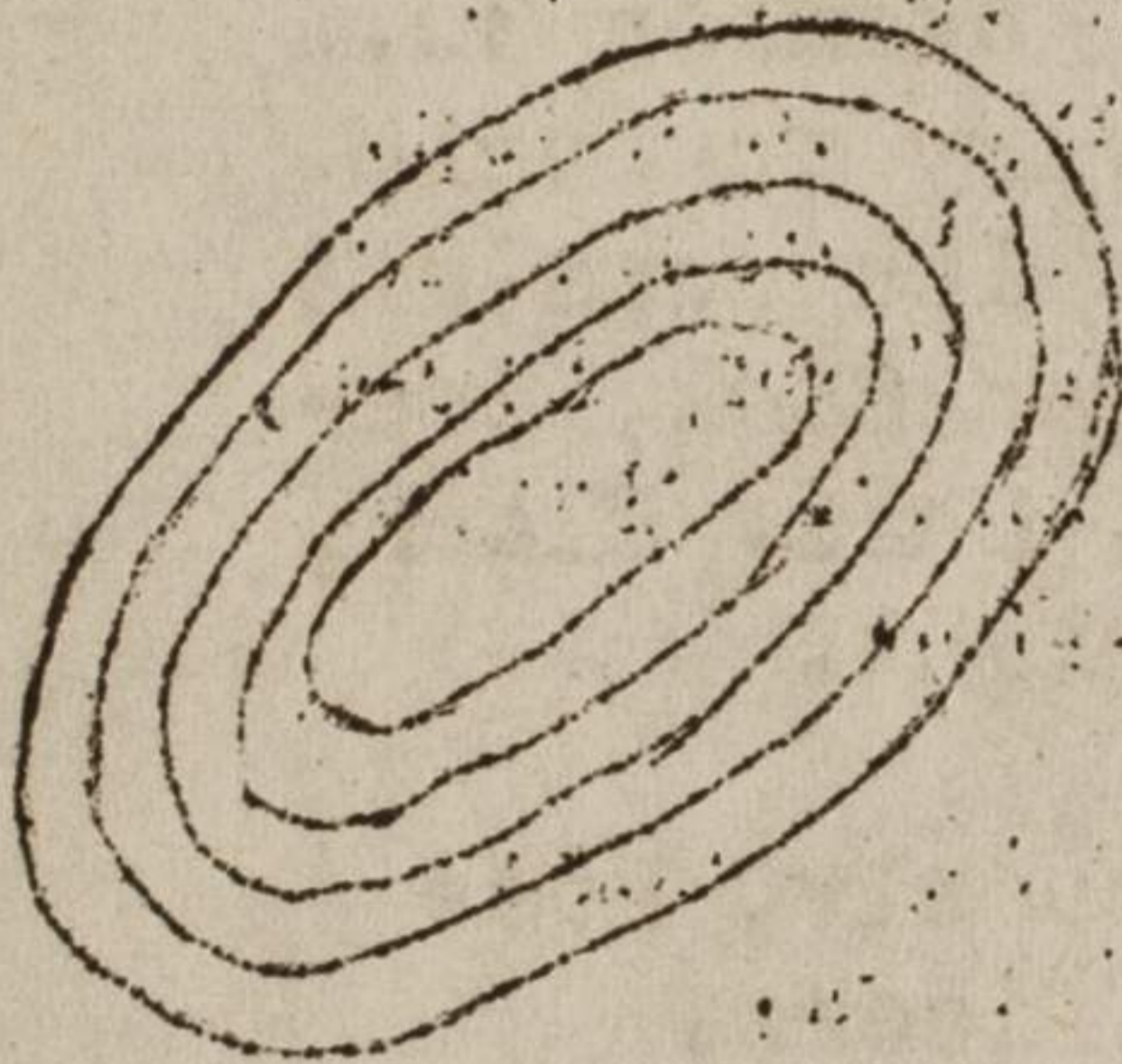

UPHOLSTERING

The question has been asked several times about the possibility of another workshop in upholstery. Yes, if there are enough interested we will try to plan work days for those wanting to reupholster a piece.

A cranberry pudding that has a real old "New England" flavor.

Cranberry Pudding

To 2 egg yolks, beaten slightly, add 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 3 table-
spoons melted butter. Then sift in 1 1/2 cups flour, mixed with 2 teaspoons
baking powder. Finally stir in 2 cups raw cranberries.

Bake 3/4 hour in a 350 degrees oven. Serve hot with Fluffy Sauce.

Fluffy Sauce

Mix 1 cup sugar with 2 tablespoons flour, then stir in 1/2 cup boiling
water and let mixture come to a boil. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla and 2 egg whites,
stiffly beaten. Serve hot on Cranberry Pudding.

Cranberries can be frozen, whole, or in a puree.

If you want to freeze them whole, pack them into containers without
sugar, or cover with a cold 50-percent syrup. Leave head space. Seal and
freeze.

For the puree, prepare the cranberries as for freezing whole. Add 2
cups water to each quart (1 pound) of berries. Cook until skins have popped.
Press through a sieve. Add sugar to taste, about 2 cups for each quart
(2 pounds) of puree. Pack into containers, leaving head space. Seal and
freeze.

To make up cranberry juice for 10 or 12 small glasses you can use this recipe:

Cranberry Juice

1 pound cranberries
3 cups water

3 whole cloves

Cook together and strain. Add 2/3 cup sugar. Stir until dissolved.
Then chill. Just before serving add 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Cranberry Stains

Cranberry stains, like other berry and fruit stains, should be treated
immediately, if possible. They are hard to remove after they are dry. Tex-
tile chemists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture advise removing most
fruit stains with boiling water, if it does not harm the cloth, and sometimes
even warm water is effective. It is better not to use soap, as alkalies set
some fruit and berry stains. Use the same methods for removing stains from
cooked fruits and berries as from fresh.

A date that may be of interest to both men and women is February 4-8 when the Farm and Home Week will again be held in Manhattan. For several years this Farm and Home meeting has been held in districts and Women's Week at Manhattan in June, but the housing of delegate can now be handled in Manhattan so they have gone back to the regular Farm and Home Week to be held in Manhattan.

Am sure you will be happy to hear of this arrangement and let's plan a fine representation from Graham County. More information will be announced later.

PRUNING DEMONSTRATION

If anyone is interested in the pruning and trimming of fruit trees, contact the county agent and a demonstration will be scheduled in your community. Any time the next two or three months is recommended for such work. Newer plantings particularly need attention so the trees will develop proper structural strength and general shape for long life and quality production.

Its always fun to make candy at Christmas time. Here are two recipes that include fruit.

Uncooked Fruit Candy I: Ingredients: 3 egg whites; 2 cups powdered sugar; 3/4 cup powdered milk; 1 cup chopped dried fruit; 1/2 cup chopped walnuts or almonds; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. To make: Beat egg whites light. Slowly stir in powdered sugar and powdered milk. Mix nuts and fruit thoroughly. Stir into egg white mixture. Add vanilla. Mix thoroughly. Pour into oiled pan or on waxed paper to harden. Cut into squares.

Uncooked Fruit Candy II: Ingredients: 2/3 cup sweetened condensed milk; 4 cups finely sifted powdered sugar; 1 teaspoon vanilla. To make: Warm condensed milk in double boiler until it is thin enough for mixing. Remove from heat. Add vanilla. Add powdered sugar gradually, mixing until smooth and creamy. To each cup of this mixture, add 2/3 chopped dried fruit and 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Mix well. Pour into oiled pan to harden. Cut into squares.

SUPPLIES NEEDED

A lighted candle on table in front of president. A supply of unlit candles. Gavel (if used). Officers' handbooks. Secretary's books and records. Treasurer's books, and money on hand.

Arrangement for the Ceremony

The present organization officers of the unit (president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer, and reporter) are seated at the front of the group. A lighted candle is on the table in front of the president. The president appoints a Marshal and invites the installing officer to take charge of the service. (It is recommended that a member of the county home economics advisory committee be the installing officer.)

The installing officer comes to the front and requests the Marshal to present the organization officers for installation. The Marshal conducts the newly elected president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer, and reporter to position in front of the Installing Officer. The Installing Officer arises and addresses these elected officers.

INSTALLING OFFICER: Extension workers, you have been chosen to fill an office in this Home Demonstration Unit for the coming year. You will, we know, honor the trust that has been reposed in you, and fulfill in every way the obligation that trust entails. You must know that the welfare and success of our Home Demonstration Unit depends on your willingness and ability to discharge your duties faithfully. You must know, as we know, its purposes and its policies. There is no rank among us, for each serves as the equal of another member, and all must strive toward the same high goals.

The object of this Unit shall be to promote and receive training in practical and scientific homemaking through the Extension Service of the Kansas State College of Agriculture and Applied Science. That homemaking may become more interesting and attractive, and rural living more satisfying, and that the interest of the home and family and the rural community may be promoted. The following projects will be carried during the coming year: *(Insert here the names of projects.)*

INSTALLING OFFICER: With this knowledge of the Unit and your responsibility toward the success and welfare of the Unit, will you pledge yourself to promote the interest of the Unit to the best of your ability? If so, you will please repeat this pledge after me—

NEW OFFICERS: (Repeat after the installing officer the following pledge.) I, _____, (name)

do hereby pledge myself to hold high the standards of the Extension Service; and to do my part to point the way toward a higher standard of achievement for the members of this unit and the community which I serve. I will perform all the duties pertaining to the office to which I have been selected so far as is in my power, until my successor is duly installed; all this I pledge on my sacred honor.

INSTALLING OFFICER: (Turn to the president-elect.) Blanche White, as president you (name)

will be expected to preside at all business meetings of this body. You shall have power to fill such vacancies as may occur in any office, or committee. You may call meetings of the Unit or any of the committees, whenever advisable or upon the suggestion of the Extension agents and perform such other duties as usually appertain to the office. In particular, you will encourage the work of the project leaders, seeing that quiet is maintained during their demonstrations, and sufficient time is allowed on the program for their work. You will see that your Unit is represented at each training school and that all reports are made out. You will conduct business meetings according to parliamentary procedure and will endeavor to call all meetings to order on time and to adjourn at a reasonable time.

INSTALLING OFFICER: (Turn to the vice-president elect) Bernice Bates (name)

you, as vice-president will be expected to preside in the absence of the president, and you, like her, shall at all times hold high the standards of Extension work.

INSTALLING OFFICER: (Turn to the secretary-treasurer elect.) Guinita Reed, you, (name)

as secretary-treasurer shall keep accurate minutes of all the meetings of the unit, attend to all correspondence, receive and keep properly filed, all communications and records, distribute all literature to members of the Unit and make such reports to the Extension agents as deemed advisable. You have a great and noble task. No officer so much needs the virtues of promptness and exactness as the secretary. In your keeping is also placed the money of your organization, to be disbursed only as directed by that body. You will also be expected to give a financial report at each regular meeting, and a report at the annual meeting of the Unit, of all money received and expended during the year.

(The outgoing president hands over the gavel, president's handbook, etc. The secretary-treasurer hands over the secretary's books, treasurer's books, and money on hand, and all records in her keeping. The reporter hands over the reporter's handbook, "Tips for Reporters," etc. The retiring officers now take place among the members.)

RECREATION LEADER: I will.

INSTALLING OFFICER: Leaders, you will now light your candle from that of your president and then receive from the retiring leaders the material they have in their possession which will help to prepare you for your duties. (*Leaders pick up a candle from table and light it from the president's candle. If a change of leaders has been made in any project, the outgoing leaders will come forward and turn over handbooks, etc., to the new leaders. All leaders will then take seats among the members.*)

INSTALLING OFFICER: Marshal, you will direct all members of program and membership committees to stand.

MARSHAL: The newly appointed committee members will please stand.
