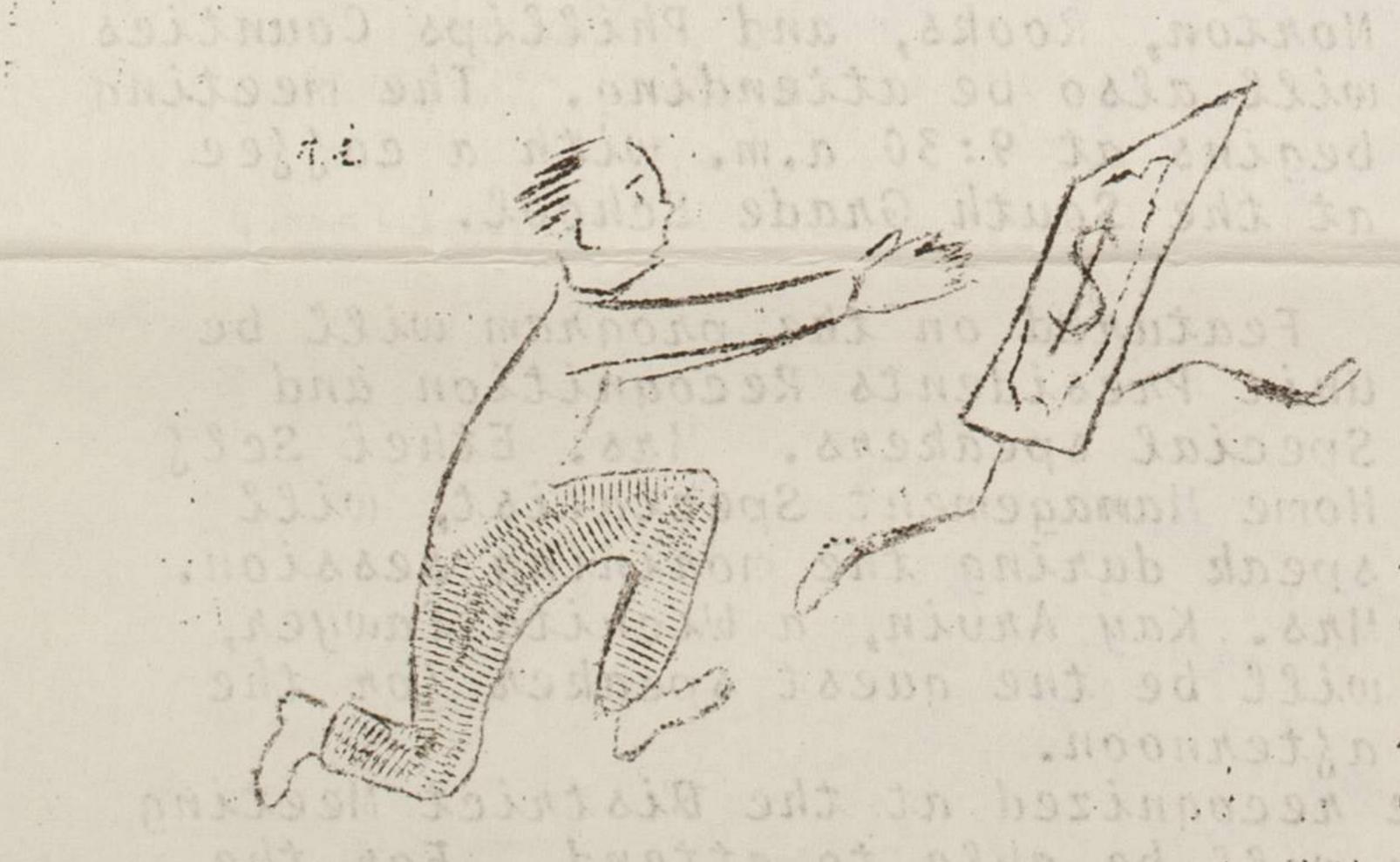

where does your money go? Don't let those dollars escapa! Does your samily take time to prepare a yearly sinancial plan or budget? This is a sine policy and also helps teach children in the samily how to manage money. Does it seem like you spend a good share of your money for groceries? Probably so. A study persormed on a group of sarm samilies reveled that food costs exceeded all others averaging 27.6 per cent of the disposable income. Expenditures sor samily living were categorized under 10 headings. Household operation ranked next, 13 per cent. Clothing and transporation costs accounted for 11.5 and 11.8 per cent. Health care required an expenditure of 9 per cent of the income. As a group, samilies set aside 8.2 per cent of their disposable income sor direct savinas. Those consisted of investments in lise insurance, in social security payments, other retirement sunds and bank savinas. How does this compare with your samily savinas?
