Dear Homemaker:

Between making plans for the Fair, preparing for the 4-H Style Revue, and trying to find the bottom of my desk; won't you please take a few minutes too from your busy day to visit with me? There are several things which I've found interesting and wish to share with you.

Are you planning to make jam or jelly this fall? Many of us have trouble determining exactly when the jelly or jam is "done."

The most simple and certain method of testing to see if the jelly or jam is cooked enough is to use a thermometer.

Before you make the jelly or jam, take the temperature of boiling water with a jelly, candy or deep-fat thermometer.

Cook the jelly mixture to a temperature 8°F. higher than the boiling point of water. Cook the jam to 9°F. above this temperature.

Why use the boiling point of water as a guage?
At that temperature the concentration of sugar will be just right for the mixture to form a satisfactory jell.

When you read the thermometer, hold the thermometer in a vertical position and at eye level. The bulb of the thermometer must be completely covered with the jelly or jam mixture without touching the bottom of the pan.





Feeling tired and run down?

This sounds like the beginning of a commercial, but it isn't - just some common sense and facts!

Eight hours of sleep are still recommended for most people. This was shown by a study of the effect of increasing amounts of sleep on performance.

Performance improved sharply as the amount of sleep was increased from one to six hours. Beyond six hours of sleep, the rate of improvement was smaller up to eight hours. When the length of sleep was extended to ten hours, there was no further improvement of performance.

The hours of sleep needed vary from person to person. Doctors say you are getting enough sleep if: (1) you can wake up spontaneously at the usual getting up time, and (2) do not get drowsy in the afternoon nap, anyone?

Warning: Sun Worshippers

Continued exposure to sunshine is a factor in skin cancer. Kansas had 1,035 cases of skin cancer reported in 1961. This was almost one-fifth of the total of all types of cancer reported.


-- Sunlight alone did not cause those thousand -- plus cases of skin cancer, of course. It is possible it played a part, however.

The ultraviolet rays of sunshine not only burn and tan. They may eventually stimulate abnormal changes in human skin. Years of exposure increase the possibility. Fair-skinned people-especially with red or blonde hair, and blue eyes-are most susceptible.

Constant exposure to the sun can also promote skin cancer in some brunettes.

Cancer of the skin is a form of cancer, after all.

THE RECIPE CORNER

If you have recipes you would like to share with other homemakers in the county just let me know. I will be glad to put them in the newsletter.

A new and delicious meat dish which was served at a dinner by the Solomon Valley 4-H Club is called Veal a la Madelon. I got the recipe from Mrs. Ben Hunsicker.

Veal a la Madelon

1 clove garlic, minced 2 lbs. boneless veal, cut in bite size pieces 2 T. flour

1 t. salt

1/4 t. pepper

Two 1 inch wide strips lemon peel.

1 c. boiling water

1 c. heavy cream standard of about 1 Indeves bethvol val

Saute parlic in hot butter in heavy skillet. Remove garlic and brown veal in the butter. Sprinkle flour, salt, and pepper over meat. Brown again. Add lemon peel and water. Cover. Simmer about 1 hour until tender.

Remove lemon peel. Stir in heavy cream. Heat through. Serve hot over buttered potatoes. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

NOTE: Onion may be substituted for orlic. Baef may be used in place of veal.

A cherry pie recipe which is real extra special is contributed by JoAnn Logsdon. This is no ordinary cherry pie, but a special treat which your family and friends will be crazy about!

Almond Crust Cherry Pie

To your favorite pie crust recipe add:
1/2 c. almonds
Press these into the crust as you are
rolling it. Bake pie shell. Cool.

For the pie filling measure:

1 (15oz.) can sweetened condensed milk

1/3 c. lemon juice

1 t. vanilla

1/2 t. almond extract

1/2 c. whipping cream

Combine milk with lemon juice, vanilla, and almond extract. Stir until thick. Fold in whipped cream. Spoon into cooled pie shell.

Top with cherry pie filling. Chill 2 or 3 hours.

Ladies, listen to this. It is no longer necessary to fuss around with sifting flour! Since there is more flour in a cup of unsifted flour than a cup of sifted flour an: adjustment does have to be made. Simply spoon flour into a dry measuring cup. Level it off. Then remove 2 level tablespoonful of flour. When the volume of unsifted flour is so adjusted by removing 2 level tablespoons from each measured cup of flour - there will be no difference in the quality of products made with sifted or unsifted flour.




