

Inscription In Tall-Case Clock  
Kent C Nicodemus, Jr.  
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and if the story of its purchase has any basis in fact, the purchaser would have been Ann Neff Nicodemus. In 1805 John Nicodemus (D1C1B2A), husband of Ann Neff Nicodemus would have been 47 years old. John Nicodemus (E7D1C1B2A), husband of Hannah Englar Nicodemus would have been 4 years old. The persons referenced in the quit-claim were all children of John Lewis Nicodemus and Ann Neff Nicodemus and their spouses. Sarah Devilbiss listed was Sarah Nicodemus Devilbiss, wife of Levi Devilbiss. If there are any land purchases recorded in 1831 or 1832, the purchaser could well have been John Nicodemus, husband of Hannah Englar Nicodemus. In that case, Dr. J.D. Nicodemus's version of the clock purchase could well be correct.

Upon the death of Edith Nicodemus (unmarried) Mary Nicodemus moved from her home in Walkersville to Homewood Retirement Center in Frederick, MD. By terms of Mary Nicodemus' will the clock is to be bequeathed to Kent Nicodemus, Jr.
