He received his B.A. in Theatre from the North Carolina State University at Chapel Hill. Mr. Jones has taught at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, the University of Rochester and Shaw University in North Carolina. In 1974, Mr. Jones founded the LeVern Players in Raleigh, North Carolina. He has served as Associate Producer of the National Black Touring Circuit since 1983. In 1989, 1991, 1993, he served as Special Assistant to the Producer and a member of the National Advisory Board for the National Black Theater Festival held in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Mr. Jones was Artistic Director of the Madam C.J. Walker Urban Life Center in Indianapolis and the Kean-Brown Theatre in Plainfield, New Jersey. He also served as Associate Producer for the 1991 and 1992 Audelco Black Arts Festival. Mr. Jones' directing credits include: OTHELLO, NO PLACE TO BE SOMEBODY, THE ISLAND, AMEN CORNER, ONE MO' TIME, LONG TIME SINCE YESTERDAY, and OLIVIA'S OPUS. Mr. Jones' acting credits include: "Voodoo" IN GHOST STORIES OF BLACKSMITH CURSE at the 1991 National Black Theatre Festival, OTHELLO at the New Jersey Shakespeare Festival, "Cephus" in HOME, "Ralph Albernathy" in I HAVE A DREAM, "Cal" in THE LITTLE FOXES, "Lem" in ROBERT JOHNSON: TRICK THE DEVIL at the 1993 National Black Theatre Festival, and THE GUIDING LIGHT. In 1990, Mr. Jones was chosen to participate in the British American Arts Association Fellowships "Internationalizing the Local" which was held in several prominent theatres in the United Kingdom including London, Birmingham, Liverpool, Manchester and Nottingham.

He also directed the world premiere stage adaptation of Zora Neal Hurston's novel Their Eyes Were Watching God, entitled TO GLEAM IT AROUND, TO SHOW MY SHINE. Other directing credits include WEST MEMPHIS MOJO, for Crossroads and the Negro Ensemble Company; THE LATE GREAT LADIES OF BLUES AND JAZZ starring Sandra ReAves at Crossroads, the International Jazz Festival in Montreal and the Apollo Theatre; world premiere biographical works, including LANGSTON and ROADS OF THE MOUNTAINTOP; and most recently, BLACK ORPHEUS and Ntozake Shange's musical BETSEY BROWN for Crossroads. His recent awards include being selected to the Hall of Distinguished Alumni at Rutgers, receiving the Visionary Leader award from Camden County East Chapter of the NAACP and the 1993 New Jersey Pride Awards for the Arts.
