Places, an exhibition of prints by Lloyd Foltz, an original member of the Prairie Print Makers. Works in the exhibit demonstrate Foltz's eagerness to experiment in all print media, and include block prints, drypoints, etchings, aquatints, and lithographs in black and white and in color.

Subjects of his prints are most often the plains landscape and small town, scenes of industrial development, and steam locomotives and rail lines in mountain and plains areas.
