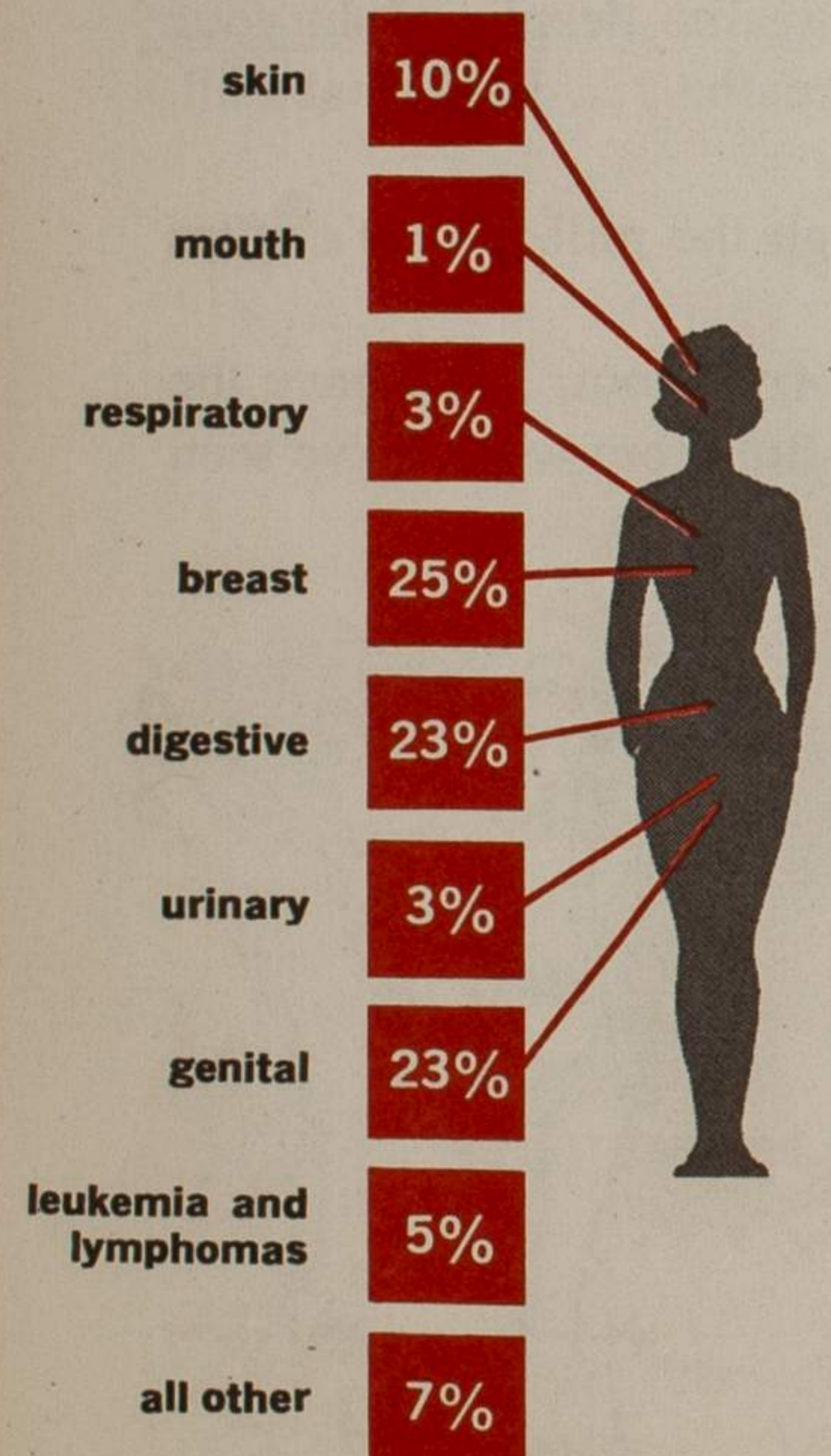
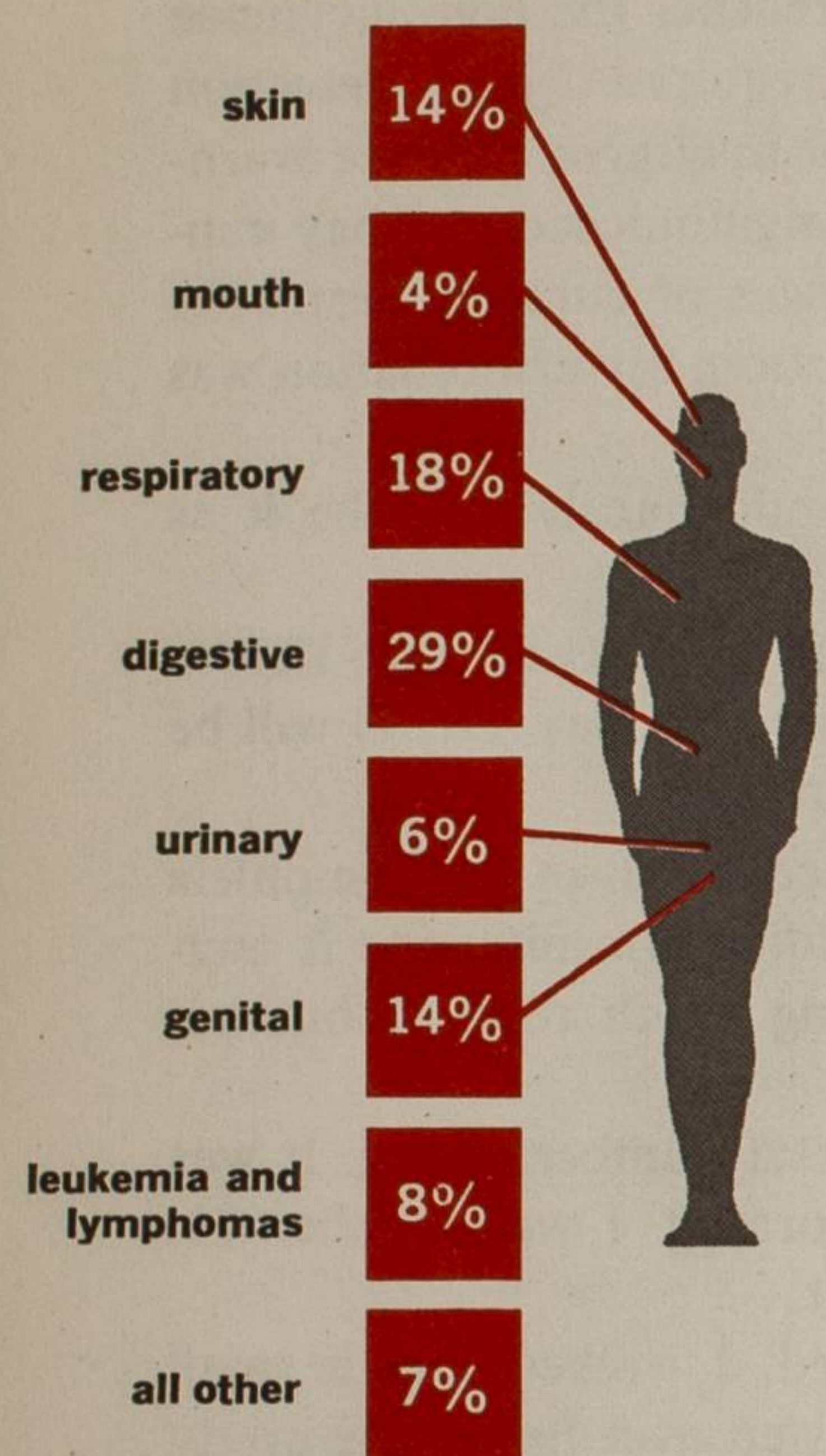

## FACTS ABOUT CANCER\*

DANGER SIGNALS	SAFEGUARDS
Sore that does not heal; change in wart or mole.	Annual checkup; special tissue examination if needed; avoidance of overexposure to sun and of friction from clothing over a mole or wart.
Sore that does not heal; difficulty in swallowing; hoarseness.	Annual checkup, including examination of mouth and throat.
Persistent cough; lingering chest ailment.	Annual checkup; chest X ray.
Lump or thickening in the breast.	Annual checkup; monthly self-examination of breasts.
Indigestion that lasts two weeks.	Annual checkup.
Change in bowel habits; bleeding from rectum.	Annual checkup, including examination of lining of colon and rectum with a special instrument called a "proctoscope."
Bleeding; difficulty in urinating.	Annual checkup, including urinalysis.
Difficulty in urinating.	Annual checkup, including examination of prostate.
Unusual bleeding or discharge.	Annual checkup, including pelvic examination and "Pap" test.
Paleness; fatigue; loss of appetite; persistent low fever.	Annual checkup, including special blood tests.
Painless swelling in neck, armpit, groin, or abdomen.	Annual checkup, with special tissue examination if indicated.
