Request No. 1250 from this department for some poultry netting that we needed for tennis court backstops. This Purchase Request was accompanied by a bid of \$37.50 for ten 150-foot rolls of wire neeting from Green Brothers Hardward Company, of Lawrence.

Purchase Order Voucher No. 2074 showed that the order was given to the Thompson Hardware Company of Topeka, for \$30.00.

I am enclosing two samples of netting. The dull, heavier piece of wire is a sample of Green Brothers neeting, and the lighter, finer netting is a sample of the order received from Thompson's.
