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

Family Recreation Is Oread 'Mardi Gras'

"A full summer's recreational program for every member of the family will make a 'Mardi Gras' on Mt. Oread," stated Dr. F. C. Allen in speaking of the fifth summer recreational program. The scene of activities covers a quadrangle in front of the R.O.T.C. building in Fowler Grove. The playground is open to the public from 7:30 until 9:30 every evening except Saturday and Sunday and will be supervised by Dr. Allen and his class in Community Recreation.

The field will be brightly lighted with twelve floodlights, and benches which have been borrowed from the athletic association will be scattered around under the trees. It will be an ideal place to relax or to read.

An all-school, get-acquainted picnic on Monday, June 8 will be the opening event. Prof. Guy B. Smith and F. O. Russell, prin. of Univer-

sity high school, will be chefs for the outdoor steak fry. A program of stunts, games and singing will be presented.
