Cornmeal Shuffle Drew 300 Monday

Twelve-thirty closing hours have been permitted for tonight by the advisor of women for all University women attending the semi-formal GIA dance. Russ Chambers' band will play for the dance, which will be held in the ballroom of the Memorial Union building from 9 o'-clock until 12.

The first formal dance of the summer session, free to all GIA members, will also be open to all University men and women for 50 cents each.

It was a cool moonlight evening, for the first "cornmeal street shuffle" last Monday night, and over 300 persons gathered to dance and watch the dancing in the street on Oread drive between Bailey Chemical laboratories and Robinson gymnasium.

The street was washed, roped-off, and spread with cornmeal late Monday afternoon and at 7:45 Russ Chambers' 13-piece band gave the down beat for the start of a two-hour jazz and dance session, sending the music ringing over Mt. Oread and through the grove, and luring students away from the library and textbooks.

Faculty members, Lawrence people, kiddies from the playground, on-looking students, and stags lined the street and filled the benches placed along the sidewalk for spectators. Without intermission, the dance continued until 9:45 under the summer sky when the band played the final chord, and the street shuffle came to an end.

The dance, scheduled to take place every Monday night, but which had to be cancelled until this week because of bad weather will continue throughout the summer session, unless stormy weather again prevails. The street dances are part of the summer recreational program planned by Dr. F. C. Allen and his class in Community Recreation.

Jayhawks Beat Cyclones In Big Six Contest

In the first game of the Big Six National Baseball League, played Monday evening, the Jayhawks defeated the Cyclones 15 to 8. League play was held up last week by rains and the Wednesday schedule was also cancelled.

Led by Dick Miller and Faul Carpenter, who alternated as pitcher and catcher, the Jayhawks piled up five runs in the first inning to the Cyclones one and retained the advantage throughout the game. Miller began pitching in the third inning and held the opponents to two unearned runs and a walk. He made the only home run of the game in the first of the fourth inning.

Dean Oberhelman, left fielder for the Jayhawks, played outstanding ball throughout the game. In his four times at bat he made two hits, got on base twice by errors, and scored three runs.

Ralph Dugan also showed up well at bat. He tripled in the first inning with the bases loaded. In his other three trips to the plate he got a single and succeeded in getting on base twice through errors.
