My dear Dr. Allen:

In thinking over practical courses for those teachers in service who will be here and who will come to the summer session if they can get such courses, will it be possible to include the following?

I. Playground Activities for the Elementary School.

This course should deal with the play program from the classroom teachers' standpoint since she so often is the one to carry it on. Such points as the following should be covered in order to make the course vital:

1. Games suitable for the different grades.

2. Self-testing activities both with and without playeround apparatus.

3. Rhythms - both folk dancing and creative rhythms suitable for the different grade levels.

4. Organization of groups on the playground.

5. Use and oare of equipment.

6. Development and use of student leadership.

II. Theory and Practice of Individual and Dual Sports.
Since many teachers in the field have neither played nor had an opportunity to see played some of the more recent small group activities and since such an increased emphasis is being placed on this long neglected field in Physical Education, such activities as the following should be presented to the group:

1. Archery

- 2. Deck tennis and games of the same type
- 3. Badminton
- 4. Horseshoes
- 5. Hendball
- 6. Shuffleboard

If courses such as these can be offered, it seems to me an existing need can be met.

Described Sires

In submitting our proposed teaching schedule for the Department of Physical Education for the summer of 1940, I would like to present a resume of our offerings for the past two summers.

In arranging our program for the summer of 1940 we are faced with a number of alternatives. I am listing below the suggested courses, in the order of preference:

For Dr. Elbel -

Organization & Administration (3 hrs.)

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There is also the possibility of offering the course in Special Problems (2-4 hrs.). This course should be on the same basis as Thesis, since it demands only weekly conferences with the student, and should not count on the teaching load. Many schools feel that Special Problems are a nearer approach to graduate work than some class work. Most schools allow an unlimited number of hours of problems toward graduation. While Dr. Elbel has experienced some illness within the past few months, and would prefer not to take on a full eight-hour teaching load in the summer, I believe he would be willing to handle the students enrolled in Special Problems, together with a six-hour teaching load.

I would like to ask the Budget Committee to consider very seriously the need of teachers now out in the field who are interested in the newer trends in physical education activities. Both elementary classroom teachers and high school physical education teachers are now needing and asking for help. A number of these teachers now in service did not have an opportunity to play or learn how to teach certain activities while they were students. The following three courses, which at present do not offer graduate credit, are the ones which we feel would help satisfy such a need:

Personal Hygiene - taking up the subject from the individual's approach, both in regard to himself and as a member of society. Possibly this might be included as a semior-graduate course, when the revision of courses is made for those seeking a Master's degree.

Theory and Practice of Individual and Dual Sportsincluding such activities as archery, badminton, shuffleboard and darts. This is the material included in 33W during the regular session.

Elementary School Playground Activities

In a conference with Miss Hoover I learn very definitely that many schools have large summer enrollments in skill courses. Miss Hoover teaches in the summer school at the University of Colorado, and their skill courses for undergraduate credit are filled. They have nine full-time teachers to handle this work. These courses include tennis, basketball, baseball, soccer, speedball, individual and dual actitivies (badminton, darts, shuffleboard, pingpong and archery), folk dancing, tap, modern and social dancing, swimming, golf. One hour credit is given for each skill course. The students meet an hour a day, five days a week. The University of Wisconsin, Columbia University, and many others find there is a demand for these skill courses, both for graduates and undergraduates.

Summer Session Budget Committee, University of Kansas.

Door Sire:

I desire to make certain recommendations and suggestions for the recreation program for the summer of 1940. The success of last summer's recreational program is, I believe, evidence that there is much merit in a well-organized program for the summer students. Favorable comment has come to us from many sources on this feature of the Summer Session. Our relations with Professor Chandler in this connection were especially pleasing. He was co-operative and sympathetic at all times with our program. The expense of the entire recreational program last summer was increased by a trebling of the use of the swimming pool by men and women, and also co-recreational groups, for both white and colored students.

Last year we were allowed \$145.00 for the installation of flood lights over the playground. We had just half as many lights as we would desire, and for that reason we are asking for \$150.00 for additional lights.

Elderly people and families use these shady spot retreats both afternoons and evenings. Our request for benches for last summer was nearly \$200.00. The amount allowed us was \$100.00, and in order to fill our needs for this item we are requesting \$100.00 additional. Many persons who desire to escape the heat of their apartments or rooms come to the playground in the evenings just to sit and watch others at games. Many times mothers bring their children while the fathers are studying at the library.

In this connection, I might add that we did not limit our playground facilities last summer to only Summer Session students
and their families. The class in Community Recreation supervised
games in the evenings, and many townspeople came to the hill to
enjoy the activities. Supervision was provided for the little
folks who played in the sandpile, on the monkey mase, the swings,

and teeter-totters. This was a great service to the parents who came to enjoy the concerts and other entertainment on the hill-top.

Our request for this item last year was denied by the Budget Committee, but we are repeating it because until such a time when the Union Building can be air-conditioned this is so necessary to the comfort of the students during the summer. This past summer we were fortunate in being able to borrow from the Kansas Electric Power Company, four blower fans which they had in stock, but after these were sold we had to do without. These fans aided tremendously in the comfort of the persons attending functions in the building. It might not be possible for us to impose upon the company's kindness in this manner another summer.

4. For storage of Archery and Golf Equipment....\$50.00

With the archery range located near the golf driving range it is necessary to have a place to store this cumbersome equipment (archery bows, arrows, targets, golf clubs and balls) near the ranges.

Last year we were allowed approximately one-third of our request for this item. We were granted \$100 for playground equipment.

Each summer it becomes necessary to replace softball equipment (balls, bats, masks), archery tackle, shuffleboard discs and cues, badminton nets and shuttlecocks, ping pong balls and paddles, basketballs, and to add new items to fill the demand for game equipment. A Goal-Hi standard, which sells for \$21.50, was given to me by the manufacturers, because I developed the game. We now have two of these goals presented to us without any cost to the state.

Mr. Irving Hill of Lawrence has a place in his own yard for bowling on the green. At Iowa State College, this sport was the greatest single attraction to bring the groups together for recreational hours. The installation of this game would do more than any other single project here to stimulate interest and wholesome recreation. The nature of this sport combines both recreational and social aspects for both men and women. Great numbers would come, not only to play, but to witness others playing.

The present shuffleboard courts on the sidewalks offer a very crude and rough surface to play the game which attracted great numbers of people of all ages last summer. Portable Shuffleboard, with its highly polished surface, would enhance the game.

This is a project which I have brought to the attention of the budget committee in a cursory manner. I have not had an opportunity to deal at length with this subject with any members of the committee. Arrangements could be made whereby the entire Summer Session student body could be taken care of at a cost of less than 10¢ per student for a 35¢ show once a week. This would involve an increase in the activity fee, but would provide funds that could be utilized in the recreational program. I believe the students would be very enthusiastic about it. There is only one problem and that is in regard to the colored students. Only the best attractions would be offered, and this entertainment would be provided in air-conditioned theatres.

Most schools feel that Special Problems are a nearer approach to graduate work than some class work. Most schools allow an unlimited number of hours of problems toward graduation. Our Psychology Department allows 2-5 hours each semester in the Graduate School in "Special Topics in Psychology". But still I do not feel that it should count as other teaching since it is supervisory.

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
