

Hawkeyes Spill Huskers, 60-51

IOWA CITY, Iowa, Dec. 3 (AP)—Iowa's highly ranked basketball team opened the season Saturday with a 60-51 victory over Nebraska to record its 67th consecutive non-conference triumph on the home court. The game was nationally televised.

Iowa, Big Ten conference champion last year, moved out to an early lead but at halftime had only a 38-34 advantage. The game moved slowly most of the way and was marked by ragged ball handling by both sides.

A crowd of 7,800—about half of capacity—was on hand.

Bill Logan, Iowa's 6-6 center who has averaged 15.3 points per game the last two seasons, led the scoring with 16 points but got only four of those in the second half when forward Carl Cain warmed up to bag 10 of his 15-point game total.

Nebraska coach Jerry Bush started four sophomores and junior Rex Ekwall. Nebraska couldn't get its fast break "give and go" offense going against Iowa's defenses, however. Charles Smith, with 13 points, and his sophomore teammate Don Smidt, with 10, led the scoring for the visitors.

Free throws provided the margin of victory for Iowa. Both sides got 20 fieldgoals. The first half, except for a flurry near the close, was unusually slow. With 18 minutes gone, Iowa had only 18 points and Nebraska 13.

Iowa's percentage of fieldgoals made in the game was .308 against an average of .389 for its 22-game season a year ago. Nebraska had a .357 fieldgoal average.

Next foe of coach Bucky O'Connor's Iowa team is Southern Methodist here December 9.

A well-balanced, powerful Vanderbilt basket ball team pulled away in the second half Wednesday night to beat Nebraska, 66-48.

Al Rochelle, 6-foot junior guard, tallied 22 points to lead the Commodores.

He was followed by Babe Taylor with 14 points and Charles Harrison, 6-6 center, with 13. Harrison also picked off 19 rebounds.

Kubacki Scores 14

High for Nebraska was 5-9 sophomore Guard Jim Kubacki with 14 points, mostly on set shots. Kubacki had six field goals and two free throws.

The teams were evenly matched the first half with the Huskers leading at 12-11, 14-13 and 16-15.

But Vanderbilt, eighth ranked nationally, pulled out to stay in front by at least three points. The half ended with Vanderbilt on top, 30-27.

The Huskers rallied to 30-29 on Jim Thom's basket as the second half opened. That was as close as Nebraska came during the second half.

Huskers Have Drouth

The Huskers trailed, 43-39, until 10:55 was left. Then Nebraska had a drouth while Vanderbilt picked up six points.

From there the Commodores moved ahead easily, going into a semi-stall and taking advantage of Husker mistakes.

The loss was Nebraska's first on the home court and gives the Huskers a 2-5 season mark.

Vanderbilt is undefeated with six victories.

A big, blond scoring demon named Norm Stewart has made Missouri the Big Seven bellcow as the Tigers head into defense of their Big Seven tournament championship Wednesday night at Municipal auditorium.

With Stewart rocketing along at a 26.2 average through MU's first six games, Spraky Stalcip's gang has been more impressive than any tournament team. Its record won't lift any eyebrows at 4-2, but consider these facts..... 1) Only seven points separate Missouri from a perfect 6-0 figure, and 2) Its average margin of victory, 12.5, would have ranked tenth among the nation's college teams last year.

One losses have been to Indiana, 78-81, in Columbia, and to Purdue, 58-62, in Lafayette. Between times, the Tigers have run over South Dakota, Texas Tech, Illinois, and Idaho. MU disposed of the latter, 81-57,

Monday in its tournament dress rehearsal and thus left more than a week to prepare for its opener against the Cornhuskers.

COMMENTS:

This will be the leadoff game of the second night of first-round warring. Kansas and Cornell play for the other lower bracket semifinal spot in the nightcap. Colorado and Oklahoma lead off Tuesday's show with Iowa State and Kansas State matched in the second upper bracket tiff. Consolation play will fill ~~xx~~ Thursday and Friday afternoons with ~~sk~~ the championship bracket moving to a climax Saturday night, following a third-place playoff between Friday night's semifinal losers.

Stewart's terrific early firing has led a general increase of Tiger averages at almost every point. Center Chuck Denny is 11.2 against a 3.1 figure last season. Eddie Ronsick and Bill Ross also are up. ~~kin~~ Stewart's backline mate, Lionel Smith, is close with 9.6 compared to a seasonal level of 10.2 last year. So is forward Redford Reichert at 6.0 against a 7.8 mean last season. Team offense is at 75.6, an increase of 4.1 points per game over the same route last winter. This is despite heavy losses. Gone are those four-year veterans, Bob Keiter and Med Mark, plus Lloyd Elmore, a fine backline defender. ~~kin~~ There also is the absence of a lad named Win Wilfong, who elected to further his education at Memphis State when mustered out of service last spring. Had he returned to Columbia as anticipated the Tigers would have the greatest set of guards in league history. He is the nation's tenth-ranked scorer at the moment with a 27.7 average.

On paper, at least, Missouri doesn't look as potent as last year's club which was favored to win the conference flag, but finished two games behind Colorado. But Stewart, a smooth 6-4 199-pound boss who can rebound, pass and defend as well as shoot, is one of those rare competitors who can lift an entire club. Could be the Tigers will arrive in the throne room a year ~~late~~ behind schedule.

Oddly, Missouri is one of the ~~league~~ few league teams not endowed with a genuine big man in the pivot. Denny, a 6-5½, is the tallest regular. However it ~~is not~~ does not list a single midget, even in the backline and is resplendent with brawn, ~~and~~ which has come to be an important item under the boards. Denny scales 223. His replacement, John Stephens, is 6-5½ by 207. Ronsick weighs 194; Reichert 180; Ross 183; and Smith 182, and Roger Engelhoff, best prospect off last year's frosh, 189.

Stalcup was concerned at the outset over the pivot from the 6-9 where Reiter led team scoring last year on an 18.0 average and topped the rebound department as well. Off early indications, however, it appears that Denny, a lways a willing workhorse who puts out 100 percent and Stephens, will patch that g gap ~~he~~ even better than expected. Denny, foul-prone through his first two years, hasn't drawn five in a game yet.

The backline with Stewart and the versatile Smith is the league's best. Ross, after scoring only 11 points in ~~his~~ 16 games last year, has advanced to the point where Stalcup is mounting three capable forwards. Ronsick and Reichert are the other two. Engelhoff may be a fourth solid hand before the season is far ~~xx~~ advanced.

Only two items can hurt the Tigers 1) ~~Defending~~ a ~~x~~ good pivotman of 6-8 or taller, and 2) Lack of enough ~~supporting~~ scoring support around Stewart, especially when he runs into those ~~inavita~~ inevitable cold nights.

Missouri is facing a ~~xxxx~~ tournament hoodoo that says no champion repeats. But the Tigers are in the best position to defend since Kansas State's 1951 edition dropped a 90-88 overtime semifinal to Kansas in quest of its second straight.

Texans Hit by Husker Five, 69-63

Nebraskans Take Overtime Win

Texas Tech headed back to Lubbock Friday night empty-handed after a four-game swing around the Big Seven circuit.

Nebraska delivered the final blow, beating the Red Raiders, 69-63, in overtime.

The Texans had bowed earlier to Missouri, Kansas State and Iowa State.

The Cornhuskers, cold during the regulation periods, sizzled in overtime.

Coufal Breaks Tie

The teams went into the extra session, 60-60.

Norm Coufal, David City senior, broke the deadlock with an archer from the corner after 24 seconds.

Dudley Doebele, Elmwood, junior, and Du Wayne Blackshear of Tech then swapped free throws.

A pair of gift shots by Bob Mercier, Lincoln junior, and a drive-in by Charles Smith, Anderson, Ind., senior, iced the game at 67-61 with 50 seconds left in the overtime.

Tech Nabs Lead

Tech surprised by opening the game with a seven-point surge. The Raiders never trailed until the last four seconds of the first half.

Then Coufal dropped in two free throws to give Nebraska a 32-30 intermission bulge.

The Cornhuskers led, 38-33, 40-37 and 42-39, early in the second half, then faded.

With 3:30 left in regulation time, Tech looked like a winner with a 58-54 lead.

the first six games, is experiencing grief with both its defense and personnel and is taking a fearful whipping off the backboards.

The Jayhawkers have out-rebounded only Northwestern and SMU the latter by one carom in the their second game, while falling far short against its other four opponents. This is traceable to two factors 1) Lack of a modern-day giant, and 2) An attitude of non-aggression.

Lew Johnson, holdover varsity center, is 6-6½, not lofty by modern post standards. He is the Hawkers' tallest regular, which brackets them with Oklahoma and Missouri in that department. The unaccountable docility of this year's edition is a far cry from all Jayhawk previous Jayhawk editions of this decade.

Another unlooked-for item is absence of bench strength. Phog Allen, starting his 39th season at t. Oread, thought he was going to be able to employ ten men at the outset of the season. Instead six or seven are carrying the entire load. Until some of the second liners arrive, the Ole Kinghawk of the Kaw will be playing with as little depth as any club in the league save Oklahoma.

Even with their weaknesses showing, the Jayhawkers own enough potential to shoot down any tournament team. Their backline fire-power from Capt. Dallas Dobbs and the rising Maurice King is second only to that of Missouri's Norm Stewart at Lionel Smith (29.3 points per game against 35.8). The revolving pivot offense places an added burden on the defense since all starters save Dobbs can work well out of what once was called the keyhole. And the zone defense they have employed the last two games seldom offers a shooting gallery for any team. The latter also helps this club off the defensive boards where it can present no 200-pound regular as well as no real loft.

Cantabs Down Cagers, 81-59, In Ivy Opener

Fifteen years of Cornell basketball invincibility over Harvard came to an abrupt end at Barton Hall Saturday night, as the Cantabs rolled to an overwhelming 81-59 win. Back-courtman Bob Hastings, an unheralded playmaker on the Harvard roster, scored 28 points while directing the visiting offense to the most one-sided triumph ever recorded by the Crimson over a Cornell cage team.

Cornell never threatened after the first 17 minutes. With the locals trailing by one point, 25-26, Hastings stole the ball twice to set up two baskets, boosting the Harvard margin to five points.

The first half was one of the worst exhibitions of basketball displayed by a Big Red team in recent seasons. The ball-handling was sloppy, the home team rebounders were continually outfought underneath both boards, and the offense was only able to score nine field goals.

Dick Canty, Phil Haughey, and Hastings were instrumental in exploiting the Cornell rebounding weakness. Hastings, a 6-1 junior from Austin, Minn., proved that playmaking and scoring were not his only specialties as he pulled down six rebounds during the initial stanza.

For that matter, however, the Big Red looked little better in the last eight minutes of the contest, as they were again outscored 23-8. Trailing by only seven points at this juncture, Cornell saw Hastings turn what might have been a close game into a rout.

Driving by the entire Cornell team, Hastings bucketed two lay-ups. When the Cornell defense started to press, the Cantab back-courtman calmly waited for an opening and passed underneath to reserve Lew Lowenfels for two setups, bolstering the Crimson advantage to 13 points.

Harvard's offense came to life during the second half. Netting 15 out of 31 field goals, the visitors completely dominated the last 20 minutes of play.

It was a tough blow for the locals. After an impressive victory Wednesday over Colgate, Cornell was a heavy favorite to open the Ivy League season on an impressive note.

Mainstays Chuck Rolles and Ray Zelek along with senior Don Hughes played adequately for the Big Red. Rolles dropped seven out of 13 shots from the field in scoring a total of 17 points, and also made six assists. Zelek made five

Cornell to Face Brown Courtmen

Cornell's varsity basketball team returns to Barton Hall at 8:15 p.m. tonight, still in quest of their first Ivy League win. Brown, picked by the coaches to finish last in the league, provides the opposition.

If the local cagers hope to make a strong showing in this season's Ivy title race, a win over Brown is a necessity.

The Big Red now possesses an 0-1 league record as a result of the 21 point defeat administered by Harvard last weekend.

Brown has improved over their mediocre 7-18 record of 1954-55. The Bruins hold wins over Tufts, Rhode Island, and Northeastern. Only Providence College was able to defeat the Ivy Leaguers in their opening game of the season.

However, this outstanding record may be deceptive. The Bruin's three victories came over teams with a combined season's mark of 1-10. The team lacks size and experience. No man on the Brown squad is taller than 6-4, but for that matter this height problem also plagued Harvard. About the only thing certain is that Brown has improved; how much they have improved will not be known until tonight.

The Bruin's 74-71 overtime win against Rhode Island was particularly gratifying to Coach Stan Ward. Joe Tebo, a sophomore guard, scored 29 points against the Rams, while the rest of the Brown team also performed well in this upset victory. Tebo is averaging 21 points per game after the first four contests.

However, Tebo is not the only Brown scoring threat. Center Jerry Alaimo, a natural forward who has been converted to the pivot spot due to a lack of height, has been deadly on his inside shots. The 6-3 sophomore has scored 23 field goals out of 50 attempts, and also leads in rebounds with an average of 16.3 per game. Brown's starting lineup is completed by three seniors—Capt. Chuck Merritt, Phil Gerould, and Pete Campisi.

Cornell also appears to be much better, at least than their play in the Harvard game would indicate. Colgate, who Cornell defeated by six points, split a pair of one point decisions on the road against Princeton and Columbia this week. Both of these teams are strong Ivy title contenders.

Coach Royner Green will call upon Ray Zelek, Chuck Rolles, Dick Meade, Larry Pearson, and Bo Roberson to open against the visitors.

Rolles and Zelek appear to be the key men of this year's Cornell team. The 5-6 backcourtman looks like a cinch to better his sixth place finish in last year's Ivy scoring race. In the three contests played to date, Rolles is averaging 22 points per game, and has a 53.1 field goal percentage.

Sharing the team height honors with 6-5 Flip Calkin, Zelek has been doing a large share of Cornell's rebounding. Although poses-

sing a nice one-hander from the outside, the Cornell rebounder has received little chance to use it, as he is needed under the boards.

Meade, who played outstandingly against Buffalo and Colgate, could not find the basket in the Harvard game. Whether he can score consistently from the outside may have a large bearing on the success of this year's Cornell team.

The two sophomores in the starting lineup, Pearson and Roberson, both lack vital game experience. However, they have proved increasingly valuable in every game. Pearson, seeing spot action in the Colgate encounter, scored 10 points, and was an important factor in that game.

Roberson, although only 6-1, is able to outjump opponents four to five inches taller. He has proven to be an invaluable aid to Zelek in clearing the rebounds. As yet, Roberson has been unable to score with any consistency, but may find his shooting eye tonight.

Based on last week's game, it would appear that senior Don Hughes should see early action. Used mainly in spot roles last season, Hughes may turn out to be the "clutch" performer which the Cornellians are going to need as the season progresses.

Rolles Scores Record 37 Points as Red Tops Brown, 82-63

Chuck Rolles tossed 37 points as Cornell beat Brown, 82-63, at Barton Hall Friday night. It was the highlight event of an otherwise quiet evening for the game itself was rather listless. It was that one-sided.

But the approximately 2,000 fans, at least half of them keeping score, showed enthusiasm over the baskets produced by Rolles, especially the one 1:30 before the end and still one other with 10 seconds remaining.

Chuck put in 15 of his 30 field goal tries, added seven of nine free throws and had one large evening.

He assisted on eight other goals and picked off four rebounds.

His effort broke three records and tied another. Here's what he did:

1. Set a Barton Hall varsity record of 37, beating the 35 scored by Bucky Roche of Syracuse Jan. 5, 1952.

2. Set a Barton Hall varsity record by a Cornellian of 37, beating the 34 scored by Jack Sheehy against Yale Feb. 12, 1955.

4. Tied the highest single game total by a Cornellian, the 37 scored by Hillary Chollet against Syracuse at the State Fair Coliseum Feb. 23, 1949.

The Big Red had little trouble cashing its first Ivy League victory. It came back neatly after hitting the skids against Harvard last weekend. It will sit on a 3-1

Brown has now lost six straight to Cornell.

Rolles played all but 2:09. He had 18 points in the first half when he put in eight of his 12 fielders. As the second half wore on and Chuck wore out he began missing. He even missed a pair of free throws, which is unlike him.

Coach Roy Green sat him out with 4:13 remaining. The "scorekeepers" in the south stands objected strenuously. When the "boos" died down the "We want Rolles" chant picked up. He had a miss before Larry Pearson fed him with a pass and he laid it in. That was his 14th goal. He barely beat the gun with his 15th.
