 He has picked up the same lighted torch thru the
 early going this season. His 18.8 average is second only to Oklahoma's
 Lester Lane among tournament personnel, which includes California, the 1954

Dobbs is an artful dribbler and one of the finest
 jump shooters the league ever has contained, either off the break or set
 offense. He trailed only Born on the last year's scoring lists, which means he outscored the likes of Al Kelley and Harold Patterson over the
 full season's haul.

Allen has surrounded his quick ace with promising
 young talent. Teaming with him in the backline is John Parker, stout-legged
 5-11 $\frac{1}{2}$, 178-pounder, who has distinguished himself in the early games with
 ball-hawking, rebounding and defense.

Gene Elstun, six angular 6-3 Shawnee-Mission
 product, is on the verge of establishing himself as a forward of Big
 Seven dimensions. He not only owns the club's second highest average at
 12.5, but he trails only Johnson in the rebound department on an 8.8 per
 game average. Another rookie, Maurice King, from Kansas City's R.T.
 Coles, is shooting 48-percent, highest among the regulars, at the other
 forward.

Tom Johnson is the fourth starting soph. He owns
 no hook like Born or Lovellette, but he is a tireless tipper and rebounder.
 He is averaging six a respectable 8.3 points and 13.0 rebounds. He may be a
 year away, but he is growing and possess the desire and tools to become a marked
 performer for the future. And Allen is going all the way with him, which
 means he is receiving a rapid tempering.

Two high-leaping juniors, Gary Padgett, a letterman
 and Chris Divich, sturdy Doland, S.D. squadman, are the second line for
