

Stop Lane.

Perhaps the neatest trick of the night was the nine-point halter Iowa State put on Sooner ace Les Lane, who had averaged 26 in six previous games, to assure their own center, Chuck Duncan, the scoring crown.

These two were the only real contenders. Duncan wound up with 18 points to run his three-game total to 75, nine points more than Lane, last year's king with 64.

The title game, the Tigers second such crown, can be treated briefly. It was over almost before it started. Missouri always led by at least six after 17-8 and got up as high as 28.

A couple of tall teams were playing, but the way Missouri monopolized the boards was brutal. The Tigers started by
