The annual 8-team extrava-

ganza opens tomorrow in Municipal Auditorium with California supplementing this year's field as the guest team.

The veteran Wildcat one-two

punch bears two familiar names,

Jerry Jung, the 6-11 center from Hutchinson, and Jim Smith, the rugged 6-3 forward out of Brainerd, Minn. Both played as freshmen in 1952 when yearlings were eligible under Korean war rules. Both have followed a rather frustrating pattern, too, several times lingering on the threshold of stardom without quite getting through the door.

Off the basis of recent starts, they both have arrived at once. Smith is traveling at a 15.4 scoring pace, eighth on the latest all-

ing pace, eighth on the latest all-tournament personnel scoring lists for pre-meet action. But that is only part of the story. Since being handed a starting role by Tex Winter in the last three games he has averaged 20.6. He made the most of his varsity debut in the 70-50 flogging of Wyoming with twenty-three points. He followed with twenty-seven in the 81-74 victory over Wyoming and twelve in Tuesday's 91-74 shattering of Indiana's proud Big Ten cham-

pions. Not only that but he has

averaged twelve rebounds over

that 3-game stretch.
