KANSAS CITY, MO. —

Missouri built a 20 - point lead in the third quarter, then staved off a scrambling gang from Iowa State to win an opening-round Big Seven tournament game here Saturday night, 74-65.

Kansas won the first game, beating Colorado, 79-62, although the Jayhawks' all-America candidate, center B. H. Born, was held to only 12 points.

Third in Row.

This is the third year in succession that the Cyclones and the Tigers have opened tourney play against one another and it

is also the third year in a row that Missouri has won.

The most important fact in the 1953 victory was that Missouri, led by 6-foot 8-inch center Bob Reiter, had too much height and rebounding power for the shorter Cyclones.

Control Boards.

Control of the boards gave them control of the ball, and the Tigers didn't waste the opportunity. They unleashed a trio of hot shooters who overcame the fact that State's Chuck Duncan was high scorer with 19 points.

Reiter, who gathered three fouls in a hurry and sat out about half of the game, still managed 14 points, as did guard Med Park. The other "villain" was smooth sophomore forward Norm Stewart, 6-4, who tossed in 16.

Park, scoring 11 of his points in the second half, was double trouble for the Cyclones, for he did a magnificent patrol job on Dutch Van Cleave, holding him to eight points.

Stewart, assisted by Lloyd Elmore, was the gunner at the start as the Tigers took off into a 15-7 lead. Only Duncan was able to tally a single point for the losers during this stretch.

Juggles Lineup.

Just when the crowd of 9,000 was settling back for a rout, Coach Chick Sutherland managed to juggle around until he found a warmer crew.

Duncan and Van Cleave of the starting five teamed with three huskies—Barney Alleman, Dean Nims and Howard Johnson — to throw a little weight around and climb back into the game.

All were scoring as the Cyclones climbed up to within 19-18 early in the second quarter. The effort, though, was tiring and halfway through the period Reiter suddenly came to life and threw in three quick hook shots to reopen a 7-point lead.

38-30 at Half.

It was, thanks to Johnson's desperation long that dropped after the gun, only 38-30, favor of Missouri, at the half. It began to look dark again in a hurry.

Although Reiter picked up his fourth foul in no time, and went to the bench, Park started hitting. Reiter's sub, Bill Holst, also bagged a couple of goals as the Tigers roared into a 58-38 lead.

Larry Wetter and Van Cleave, who had done almost no scoring for Iowa State, started doing that job. The Cyclones made it up to 59-47 going into the final quarter, then closed to 69-61 near the end.

Howard Franks' goal, Duncan's free throw and baskets by Tom LeBuhn and Wetter accounted for the nine straight Cyclone points. Then the Tigers started stalling to run out the game.

Accurate free throwing helped the winners. They made 30 of 39 tries from the line but were outscored by Iowa State from the field. Iowa State made only 15 of 28 charity tosses.

34 Per Cent.

The Cyclones got 25 goals on 74 tries for 34 per cent, which was better than Missouri's 22 of 68 for 32 per cent. But the Tigers had better shots.

Iowa State and Colorado will meet at 2 p. m. Tuesday in the opening game of consolation play. Kansas and Missouri will clash at 8 p. m. Tuesday in title competition.



Kansas 79,

Colorado 62

Kansas turned on the steam after a tight start to hand Colorado its sixth straight defeat in the opening game, 79-62.

Except for the first quarter, during which the score was tied twice, Colorado was a badly beaten club.

Kansas led, 17-14, at the first quarter and 35-27 at the half. The Jayhawks, using a full court press much of the third quarter, were in front by 62-41 with 10 minutes to go.

Bob Jeangerard, Colorado guard, was the high scorer with 23 points. But his efforts were not enough to offset Kansas' 13-man attack.

3 Cyclone Victories.

The Cyclones, with a 3-1 record, rank second to defending champion Kansas State in pre-tourney victories. Missouri has won one of three games, plus a warmup game against a service team.

Drake, which Missouri defeated by 32 points and Iowa State by 10, is the only common foe. The Tiger losses were to Wisconsin and Arkansas.

Reiter, averaging 18 points, is about a scoring match for Cyclone Dutch Van Cleave, but the tall Tiger is able to furnish a consistently better brand of rebounding.

Resume Monday.

Sunday will be a day of rest, with the tourney resuming with two games Monday night. First-round losers will go into the consolation bracket and play Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons.

Washington, the guest team, brings a 0-4 record into the meet.

KANSAS CITY, MO.—Iowa State, never ahead until the final quarter, kept the lead once it was obtained and defeated Colorado, 70-63, here Tuesday afternoon.

The victory, first game in the loser's bracket in the Big Seven basketball tournament, qualified the Cyclones to play for fifth place at 4 o'clock this afternoon

against Kansas State, which defeated Washington in the second game, 81-75.

A tremendous second-half comeback, instigated by Jerry Davis, was responsible for Iowa State's scrambling victory over the Buffs, who are winless now in seven games.

In the night games Kansas beat off a furious Missouri rally to win, 69-67, and gain the championship game opposite Oklahoma, which upended Nebraska, 86-70.

Davis tallied 21 points, 13 of them in the rallying minutes, when the Cyclones shook off the effect of a very cold first half and pecked away until they had destroyed a 12-point deficit.

With 9 to Go.

Joined by the revitalized play of center Chuck Duncan (15 points) and the reserve troubleshooting of Howard Johnson and Tom LeBuhn, State finally caught the Buffs at 53 with nine minutes to go.

It took four more minutes before the Cyclones could batter into the lead, but they did it at 60-58 on LeBuhn's turning shot of the post and they held at least a two-point lead the rest of the way.

TIGERS GET THIRD

An Early Fourth-Quarter Flurry Brings 72 to 57 Victory Over Nebraska in Big 7 Tourney.

BOB REITER LEADS THE WAY

Missouri's Big Center Pours in 26 Points, Most of Them Coming in Clutch.

Huskers Stay in Game Until Surge by Victors in 2nd Period—Weber Paces Losers.

BULLETIN.

The University of Kansas led Oklahoma, 59 to 52, at the end of three quarters of play in the championship contest.

Missouri staged an early third-quarter flurry of points to outdistance Nebraska, 72 to 57, and take third place in the Big Seven pre-season basketball tournament in Municipal Auditorium last night.

A crowd of 9,500 packed the hall for the third-place game and the Kansas-Oklahoma championship battle which followed.

The Tigers were leading at the half, 36 to 30, after losing the lead in the early second quarter to a Nebraska rally.

A 13-Point Bulge.

But it was the early third, with big Bob Reiter banging the bucket with regularity, which saw Nebraska. The Tigers stretched their 6-point halftime lead to a 13-point bulge, 44-31, in two and one-half minutes of play just after the intermission. Reiter scored six of the eight Missouri points in that length of time as the Huskers got only a free throw added to their total.

Nebraska came back to narrow the gap to seven points as Don Weber and Duane Buel scored to make it 37-44. But Reiter again came to the rescue to score three more buckets in the remaining minutes of the period and Stewart and Bill Holst, Reiter's replacement, added one each in the late minutes for a 55-45 Missouri lead going into the final period.

Peak Is 16 Points.

Missouri's lead grew to 61-45, its peak, early in the fourth but Nebraska got within nine points later in the quarter before late Husker fouls added to the Tiger total.

Reiter hit twelve field goals and a pair of free throws for game scoring honors, 26. Weber was high for the Huskers with 18.

Missouri hit 39.4 per cent from the field while Nebraska had 30.8 per cent. Missouri had a hugh edge in rebounding 42 to 26.

Reiter was the top rebounder of the game, too, with seventeen saves off the boards. Stewart was next with nine. Willard Fagler and Bill Johnson with seven each were best for Nebraska.

Missouri pulled away from Nebraska to a 10-7 lead half-way through the first quarter with Lloyd Elmore doing most of the scoring in the early minutes. The margin grew to 16-9 as Bob Reiter and Jim Sally hit, then Reiter rebounded one in and hooked off the post for a 22-16 Missouri first quarter lead.

Huskers Run Hard.

Nebraska began running harder in the second quarter, and with the Huskers ganging the alley to snare most of the rebounds, caught and passed the Tigers. Missouri failed to score at all for three minutes of the second.

In the meantime Fred Seger and Fred Weber got two goals apiece to spark the Husker rally which put them ahead 26-22. Then Reiter hit a free throw, Garvin Filbert hit a jump shot and Reiter hooked from the corner for a 27-26 Missouri lead.

Weber hit two free ones as Nebraska went back into a temporary lead but Filbert hit two long shots and Reiter hooked another one as Missouri went ahead, 34-28, and was on top 36-30 at the half.

Oklahoma began a semistall early, playing the ball deep in the offensive court and forcing the Kansas defenders to come out. The strategy paid off in fouls on the Jayhawks but not in points. Kansas crept away to a 7-3 lead in the first three minutes, a slow start.

Born was the big scorer for Kansas, hitting two early goals and tipping in another as the Kansas lead mounted to 12-5.

Ron Blue hit with a pair of long ones and Les Lane added a jump shot as the Sooners closed to 11-14. Born and Harold Patterson paced the Kansans to a 20-15 first quarter lead.

Kansas Hikes Lead.

Oklahoma got within three points, 17-20, in the early second quarter but Dallas Dobbs hit a jumper for K. U. and Allen Kelley added a free throw and a 1-handed push for a 25-17 count. But Jones hit on the fast break and he and Lane led Oklahoma back to a 32-all tie at the midway mark of the period.

Larry Hamilton's long 1-hander gave Oklahoma a lead

but Bill Brainard, subbing for Born who had collected four goals, hooked off the post and hit a free throw for 37-36.

Then in close battling to the horn ties of 37-all and 39-all were posted before three late free throws gave Kansas a shaky 42-39 halftime edge.

Kansas had fourteen field goals to eleven for Oklahoma in the first half and had a 41.2 per cent shot average. Oklahoma has 35.5 per cent but hit seventeen free throws to fourteen for K. U. Kansas had a slight 18-16 edge in rebounding in the first half.

A HIGH BY CATS

Kansas State Scores Most Points During Tournament in Blasting Cyclones, 98 to 77.

BUFFS FINALLY WIN ONE

Washington Drops 7th Straight, 60 to 81, as Colorado Ends Losing Streak.

Kansas State set a 1953 scoring high for the Big Seven pre-season basketball tournament yesterday afternoon to win the consolation championship, 98 to 77, from Iowa State.

K-State's point total was the second highest ever made in the tournament. The high mark was set in 1951 when Stanford defeated Iowa State, 103 to 102, in an experimental game which went into an overtime. All free throws were tried in that game as an experiment during the period when the rules allowed a team to waive free throws for possession.

Colorado finally found victory after seven straight losses in the other consolation bracket game yesterday, handing Washington its seventh straight loss. The score was 81 to 60. Until yesterday Colorado had not won a game this season.

First Since Harvard.

Washington is without victory this season and heads home as the second guest team to visit the tournament and not take home at least one triumph. Harvard took three straight losses in 1948.

Kansas State forged its victory margin in the second quarter. The Wildcats went on a 20-point scoring spree in that period while Iowa State was held to eight points. That margin was good enough to last Kansas State the rest of the game.

Iowa State led most of the first quarter and ended that session with a 25-22 edge. But the Cyclones went for three minutes and thirty-five seconds without a field goal in the second quarter, collecting only three free throws in that length of time, and wound up trailing by nineteen points at the half.

The Cyclone scoring was still in the deep freeze in the early third quarter. Counting the goalless streak in the second frame, the Iowans went eight minutes and ten seconds without scoring from the field. During that time, the Wildcats upped the lead to twenty-three points. The Cyclones rallied to trail by only fourteen at the three-quarter mark, 58-72.

Cut Margin to 13.

The Cyclones succeeded once in the early fourth period in chopping the margin to thirteen points but couldn't hold on.

K-State suffered at least the temporary loss of Jerry Jung, 6-foot 11-inch center, who was injured in the game. He fell to the floor after a collision under the K-State defensive basket and was struck in the forehead.

Jung was taken to St. Mary's hospital, where he was kept overnight for observation. At the hospital it was reported that Jung had not suffered a severe injury and was resting comfortably.

Kansas State hit a hot 46.9 per cent from the field, thirty-eight goals in eighty-one shots. Iowa State had only 28.7 per cent, twenty-five field goals in eighty-seven shots. The Cyclones had a rebounding edge, forty-six to forty-two.

Jesse Prisock was top scorer for the Wildcats with sixteen and also snared the most K-State rebounds, eleven. Charles Duncan of Iowa State had game scoring honors with twenty-one. He also was top rebounder with twelve.

KANSAS CITY, MO. —

Kansas State couldn't contain the individual brilliance of forward Don Weber here Monday night as Nebraska pulled a huge 78-74 basketball upset.

Weber, a 6-foot 3-inch senior from Estherville, Ia., furnished 30 points—24 of them in the second half—to knock the defending champion Wildcats out of Big Seven tournament title play.

In the night's second game Oklahoma downed Washington, the guest team, 87-77, in a contest that was a 42-42 standoff at halftime. The Sooners' Lester Lane scored 28 points.

It is the first time in the eight-year history of the meet that Kansas State hasn't won its first test, and the Weber-led assault that destroyed the 'Cats had 8,500 people highly excited.

The Huskers, trailing by 13 large points going into the final half, suddenly became unbelievably proficient and outscored their foe, 27-9 in the third quarter to take a lead they never relinquished.

Weber tallied 13 points in this vital stretch and lifted his lithe frame all over the Municipal Auditorium floor to grab rebounds.

In all, during the second half, Dandy Don fired at the basket 14 times and 10 of these tries fell through for field goals.

Johnson Hits 23.

Center Bill Johnson, rather sluggish in the opening quarters, caught fire and wound up with 23 points to help Nebraska.

The scoring heroics of this pair, strongly abetted by the general play of guard Fred Seger, was more than enough to cancel out the 26-point effort of K-State's talented Jesse Prisock.

Prisock led the early Wildcat surge, counting 15 of his points in the first half.

No Husker could handle the 6-5 senior, but four fouls put him on the bench early and he came back to foul out in the final scramble for the ball.

SQUEAK FOR K. U.

Fouls Play Major Role as Missouri Bows, 69-67, in Big 7 Tourney Semifinals.

PLAY TO CROWD OF 9,500

Tigers Post 23 to 21 Margin in Field, but Can't Match Kansans on Charities.

Jayhawks Lose 9-Point Halftime Lead and Just Manage to Stave Off Late Rally.

BULLETIN.

Nebraska held a 40-34 lead over Oklahoma at half-time of the second game of the Big Seven tournament semifinals last night.

While 9,500 fans cheered and jeered and the officials blew their continuous whistle obligatos, Kansas and Missouri basketball teams hacked and chopped their ways through each other in the semifinals of the Big Seven pre-season basketball tournament last night. Kansas won, but only by a nervous 69 to 67 score.

Fifty-eight fouls were called in the game, thirty on the Tigers and twenty-eight on the Kansans. In the final analysis it was the whistle which decided the game. Missouri got twenty-three field goals, to twenty-one for Kansas, but the Jayhawks converted twenty-seven free throws to twenty-one for the always pressing Tigers.

The game was a bruising demonstration of the skin-tight defense. Both teams determined early that the opposition had to walk over bodies to get to the basket and that was the way they played it for an hour and forty-five minutes.

Kansas had been favored by six and one-half points but this was strictly survival of the fittest.

Tigers Close the Gap.

Kansas led throughout the game but never in the final stanza was the lead healthy except for the early minutes when the Jayhawks started with a 9-point, 58 to 49 bulge. In less than two

Injury May Sideline K-State's J. R. Snyder Today.

J. R. Snyder, Kansas State forward who was injured late in the game against Washington yesterday afternoon in the Big Seven pre-season tournament, has either a cramp or Charley horse, Coach Tex Winter said last night.

Whether or not Snyder will be available for today's game against Iowa State will not be known until some time this morning, Winter added.

Snyder fell to the floor late in the fourth quarter and was carried from the floor. The injury was to his left knee.

Kansas went ahead with Patterson, Dallas Dobbs and Larry Davenport scoring to make it 18-7 for the Jayhawks. Missouri managed to cut the gap to seven points twice in the period but wound up trailing, 15-23.

Again in the second Missouri got within seven points twice but never could narrow the gap to less than that figure. Kansas at one point held an 11-point margin, 35-24, but wound up at the half with a 42-33 lead.

A technical foul on the Kansas bench at one juncture of the second quarter caused a crowd uproar. Missouri converted it into a point. Missouri had been able early in the game to break men loose under the basket by pulling the Kansas defense out, but the Jayhawks got onto the strategy quickly and closed up. Kansas's defense switched off and closed the middle effectively and the front line men were hawking the ball consistently to harry Missouri ball handlers.

Kansas enjoyed a tremendous edge in rebounding during the first two quarters taking twenty-two off the backboards to more than double the number grabbed by Missouri, ten.

minutes it was a 5-point, 60-55 lead, with Bob Schoonmaker and Bob Reiter hitting goals for the Tigers.

The margin teetered on that dangerous four or 5-point figure through hectic minutes, then it fell to three points as Bill Holst tipped in a missed shot by Missouri for a 61-64 score.

Jerry Alberts, in for Allen Kelley when the K. U. starter fouled out with fifty-three seconds of the third period to play, shot one in from the side for Kansas and it was 66-61, temporarily. But Missouri was persistent. Jim Sally scored on a fast break play. Bob Cruts hit a free shot and Holst stole the ball and laid it in for a 66-67 count.

With 2:43 left Kansas's Harold McElroy got two free shots and made one for a 68-66 score. Norman Stewart converted one of two free throws and it was 67-68. McElroy, with 1:44 left, was fouled and missed one of two free throws for a 69-67 count.

Each Team Loses Ball.

With fifty-eight seconds to play Lavannes Squires of Kansas lost possession when called for traveling. But Missouri lost it when with twenty-five seconds to go Sally booted the ball off the court under the relentless pressing by Kansas and the Jayhawks took over. McElroy missed two more at the free line to keep it jittery in the final seconds, but Born saved the day for Kansas by rebounding Missouri's last shot from the field.

Even the strategy was strange, Missouri's coach, Wilbur Stalcup, held his No. 1 center, Bob Reiter, out of much of the game, hoping to have an advantage when Kansas's Born fouled out. Born had three personals at the intermission. But Reiter, without a foul in his first half play, collected five in the second half while Born lasted the game, being called only once in the last two quarters.

Kansas did lose Kelley and another starter who was sorely missed, Harold Patterson. Both went out in the third quarter. Patterson left first with 6:01 to go in the third.

Missouri threatened in the third quarter, but did not get closer than five points. And had the Tigers not missed eight consecutive free throws in that period the heat may have been on Kansas earlier than it was.

Start 8 Points Ahead.

Kansas started the period with a 42-33 lead, saw it melt to 47-42, then wound up the period on top by 58-49.

Born and Patterson shared scoring honors for the winning Kansans. Each hit for seventeen points but nine of Kansas's ten players scored. For Missouri Norman Stewart was high with fourteen points. Reiter hit ten and so did his replacement, Holst.

Born and Patterson were also close in the rebound department. Born got nine, Patterson eight. Holst got nine and Stewart eight for Missouri. All told Kansas carried a slim 36 to 34 rebound lead for the game.

The Tigers had a better shooting percentage, 39, with twenty-three out of fifty-nine shots falling through. Kansas hit at a 34.4 per cent pace, getting twenty-one out of sixty-one.

CATS NIP HUSKIES

Washington Suffers 6th Straight Loss as Kansas State Captures an 81-75 Victory.

IOWA STATE ON RALLY

Colorado Leads by Twelve Points at Half, but Cyclones Go on Spree to Win, 70-63.

Two of the longest losing streaks in major college basketball grew a game longer each yesterday afternoon in the consolation round of the Big Seven pre-season basketball tournament at Municipal Auditorium.

Kansas State staved off guest Washington's second half rally to take an 81 to 75 decision, the third for the Wildcats over the Huskies and the sixth straight loss for the West coast crew. Iowa State overcame a 28-40 halftime deficit to hand Colorado its seventh straight loss, 70 to 63, in the early game.

A Crowd of 3,500.

About 3,500 persons sat in on the afternoon twin bill. Iowa State and Kansas State meet for the consolation championship at 4 o'clock and either Washington or Colorado will get into the win column when they meet at 2 o'clock. Neither team has won a game this season.

K-State never succeeded in pulling away from the Huskies as they battled toe to toe through the first two quarters. After an early 5-1 Wildcat lead, the score was tied at 8-all. Jesse Prisock hit five straight points to give K-State a 13-8 lead, as large a spread as the team enjoyed in the first quarter. Two goals by 6-11 Jerry Jung and a free throw by Jim Smith gave the Cats a 21-16 lead late in the first but Washington closed to an 18-21 position at the buzzer.

Washington began pressing the K-State stamina with a fast break in the second quarter and it paid off as the Huskies took over late in the period. But first two goals by J. R. Snyder and one by Kent Poore gave the Wildcats a 31-24 lead 3½ minutes into the period.

The double teaming center position of the Huskies with Dean Parsons and Jim Coshow was giving the Wildcats trouble. Parsons and Coshow both hooked shots in and Doyle Perkins hit two jump shots as Washington took the lead, 35-34. Dick Stone, Snyder and Roger Craft pulled K-State ahead late in the period and the Cats led, 42-39, at the half.

Forest Fire Won't Interfere With Rose Bowl TV.

Hollywood, Dec. 29.(AP)—The National Broadcasting company quickly squelched today speculation that the Mt. Wilson forest fire might interfere with the coast-to-coast telecast of the Rose bowl game New Year's day.

Television transmitters are located atop the peak.

"No matter what happens on Mt. Wilson," N. B. C. stated, "we will be able to carry the Rose bowl game live coast-to-coast."

It was disclosed, however, that local telecasting of the game might be affected if flames should reach the 4 million dollars worth of TV installations on the peak. Transmitters on the seven Los Angeles area video stations are located there.

Duncan was top rebounder for Iowa State with eight and Haldorson grabbed fifteen for Colorado.

Huskies Tie It Up.

Kansas State erected a 46-39 lead as the third quarter started but later on Tripp, Parsons and Patnoe hit a flurry of points for Washington to make it a 49-all tie with four and a half minutes of the period to go. Big Jerry Jung came alive and with Prisock spearheaded a rally which pulled the Cats away to a 65-57 at the end of the quarter.

Kansas State got two 9-point leads in the final quarter and once had an 11-point gap before a late Washington rally combined with a full court press chopped it to its final margin, 81-75.

Dean Parsons, Washington center, hit eleven of eighteen field shots and two free throws for game scoring honors, twenty-four. Jesse Prisock had eight goals and three free ones for nineteen points, high for the Wildcats. Washington edged the winners in shot percentage, 38 per cent to 37.2 per cent. K-State had one more rebound than the Huskies, 44 to 43.

Cyclones Catch Up.

The Cyclones, hitting only 20.5 per cent of their field shots in the first half, got within a point twice in the third quarter, then caught the Buffs in the first minute of the fourth stanza when Charles Duncan laid one in and converted a free throw when he was fouled on the shot. That made it 53-all.

Tied again at 55, Iowa State once more fell behind as Burdette Haldorson hit two free throws. Then a 58-all tie was posted before Tom Lebuhn and Jerry Davis hit five points to give the Cyclones a lead of 63-58. Late fouls by Colorado protected the Iowa State lead.

The Cyclones hit better in the second half and wound up with an over-all 30.5 per cent, twenty-one hits in sixty-nine shots. Colorado cooled off in the second half and wound up with a 28.1 per cent average, eighteen out of sixty-four. Colorado, with a decided height advantage, snared thirty-eight rebounds to twenty-nine for Iowa State.

shots from the field and a free toss for 13 points, and looked like one of the slickest first-year men ever to grace this tournament.

The leading scorer for the game, however, was Bob Jeangerard, 6-3 junior Colorado forward from Wilmette, Ill., looped in nine long one-handers and five free tosses for 23 points.

Colorado faded quickly in the third period after making a real battle of it for the first half, and went down to its sixth straight defeat. The win was KU's second and evened its season record.

The Buffs wiped out an early Kansas lead and pulled into a 10-10 tie midway thru the first quarter, and then zipped to a 14-10 lead with three minutes left in the period. Kansas then hit seven straight points while blanking Colorado to pull out three points in front as the period ended.

Colorado never got even again, but kept it close until KU opened the gap to eight points on a follow by Harold Patterson and a tip-in by Born as the half ended.

Then the roof fell in. Colorado didn't score from the field until the second half was four minutes old, and by that time Kansas owned a 44-30 lead, and was under full steam.

Missouri grabbed a 19-15 lead at the end of the first period, boosted the lead to 38-30 at half-time, and was out in front, 59-47, going into the final period after once leading by 20 points.

Limping Born Is Held To 12 Points by Buffs

KANSAS CITY, MO. — Kansas disposed of Colorado, 79-62, and Missouri ousted Iowa State, 74-65, here Saturday in the opening of the eighth annual Big Seven basketball tournament which produced not even a mild threat of an upset.

Playing before a quiet audience of 9,400 in Municipal Auditorium, the Jayhawks and Tigers moved into a semifinal match Tuesday night. The tournament resumes here Monday with lower bracket first-round games, matching Kansas State against Nebraska at 8 p. m., and Oklahoma against guest team Washington at 9:45.

Kansas, paced by veterans Al Kelley and Harold Patterson, and a sizzling band of sophomores led by Dallas Dobbs, erased an early Colorado lead in the first period and went on to make it a rout in the second half.

Missouri had an easy time, too, never trailing the Cyclones and piling up a 20-point lead late in the third period. Bob Reiter, 6-8 Missouri center, led a first-half attack that put the I-Staters under for keeps.

B. H. Born, KU's 6-9 scoring leader, was held to two field goals, both in the first half, but Kelley and Dobbs took up the slack with 28 points between them, 17 in the nip-and-tuck first two periods.

Kansas came from behind to take a 17-4 first-period lead, and then pulled away with a late spurt for a 35-27 margin at half-time.

The Jayhawks blanked Colorado for the first three minutes of the third period to take a 42-27 lead, and then shot ahead

by 24 points at 57-33—their biggest lead of the night—two minutes before the end of the quarter.

KU then piled in the reserves and Colorado cut the lead to trail by 62-41 going into the final period, and cut the deficit to 13 points midway in the final quarter before Kansas regulars returned to close out the game.

Born, who has been bothered by an ankle injury, played little more than half the game. But a balanced KU attack, geared around a stifling defensive press that recalled the tactics of last season's conference champs and NCAA runnerup team, made up for the lack of the big scoring punch.

Born's total was his lowest in the last seven games—the final three of last season and four this season.

But while he was hitting only two of 12 shots from the field, the Jayhawkers, with 12 men breaking into the scoring acts, totaled 26 of 57 from the field for a red hot 46 per cent. Colorado hit only 21 of 64 for 32 per cent.

The victory sent Kansas into the semifinals of the tournament against the winner of the Iowa State - Missouri game, played later Saturday night.

Kelley hit six of 10 field attempts and added three free throws without a miss for 15 points and scoring honors for the Jayhawks. But he had to make room in the spotlight for Dobbs, the 5-11 soph from Bartlesville, Okla.

Dobbs tossed in six of nine

Night Life More Appealing to Phog

KANSAS CITY.—For once Phog Allen's analysis of his basketball team's victory was no more pungent than the time of day.

"Well we won't have to play in the afternoon anyhow." He only half-kidded when asked for his quick conclusions following KU's 79-62 thumping of Colorado in the opening bout of the 1953 Big Seven tournament.

"We've had experience with those afternoon games and we don't like it," he continued. "We like to play 'em all at night over here."

What the doctor meant was that only first-round losers play matinee contests, the consolation bracket being unravelled all the way by that method. The Jayhawkers have lost only once in first-round play, bowing, 48-58, to Kansas State in the 1949 affair.

"A couple of our regulars, Born (B. H.) and Patterson (Harold) were not up to par, but some of our sophomores played well. Any game you win is a good game. Right now I'm happy. I'll wait until tomorrow to think of the bad things."

The veteran Mt. Oread wizard singled out three sophomores for shiny mention, guard Dallas Dobbs and forwards Gary Padgett and Harold McElroy. Dobbs whisked two successive 20-foot right-hand sets early in the third period to help demolish the Buffaloes' sagging defense, and over-all collected 13 points, his seasonal high. He used only nine shots

from the field in scoring six goals.

This kind of outside shooting from Dobbs, Al Kelley and Larry Davenport suddenly broke upon a tight halftime fit, (35-27) to balloon the Jayhawks on top as much as 24 points with 1:56 remaining in the third quarter. McElroy notched five points, Padgett seven. Both also flashed signs of grasping KU's complex switching defense.

"Some people already are telling me they're disappointed in our club," Allen fired a parting shot. "What they've got to get accustomed to is the fact we are no longer playing with Dean Kelley and Gil Reich (the departed guards who were the core of the Jayhawks' half-court press last season).

"I've said along we weren't going to be as good without them and it is proven every time we play. Fans have got to get used to the fact we're playing with a new team."

Nevertheless, the victory levelled KU's record at 2-2 for the season and handed the Hawkers their third tournament victory over Colorado with no defeats.

BORN collected only 12 points, his lowest output of the year. He still is nursing a lame ankle, but CU's defense spun a good job on him with Burdette Haldorson, 6-7 center, overplaying the lean south-paw's hand in co-ordination with a sag from the forward and guard on Born's right.

This left the Herd vulnerable from the outside and the Jayhawkers threw ringers from 20 and 25 feet thruout the third period to ice the triumph.

weaker are Kansas and K-State? (2) Can UN, OU, and MU improve enough to overhaul them? First test in this department will be provided by Kansas State and Nebraska, which lead off Monday's first-round set at 8 p. m. Oklahoma

is matched against this year's guest five, Washington, at 9:45 the same evening.

Kansas meets Colorado in Saturday's 8 p. m. lid-lifter with Missouri and Iowa State following.

As Phog Allen, coach of Kansas' defending league champions, pointed out: "Apparently there is no outstanding team in our conference at present. This means a tougher tournament in Kansas City. It could be the best we've ever had."

This thought can be transferred to the '54 conference race. For in five of the seven previous meets, the tournament champion or runner-up also has captured the circuit race. The only exceptions were 1946, when SMU edged Kansas in the final, and 1949 when Missouri clipped Oklahoma.

Not a single team will come into the meet unbeaten. As a matter of fact, only Kansas State at 4-1, and Iowa State at 2-1, owned winning records thru games of December 19.

Opponents are hoping for a Kansas defensive sag this year, after one and a half seasons of being subjected to the most vicious picketing the conference ever has seen. In losing to Tulane and LSU, and beating Tulsa, Jayhawker restriction has shown slight resemblance to the dread Porcupine Patrol of last season.

Kansas State, meanwhile, is striving to reel-in the slack caused by Dick Knostman's loss by employing three underclassmen in each start. Jerry Jung, 6-11 Hutchinson project, opened at the pivot, but since has given way to Roger Craft, sinewy 6-7 Garden Cityan. Both are splitting time with Jim Frary, 6-7 sophomore.

Here is the picture of that situation in the scoring column. This trio is averaging 14.4 points per game, exactly seven fewer than Knostman notched last year.

Under the railbirds' microscope more sharply than any other single player will be Bill Johnson, 6-7 Nebraska center. The lean senior holds the most significant individual key to the entire conference race.

With Johnson playing close to his potential, the Cornhuskers would be in a position to bid for the title. For they are physically endowed and suffered only one damaging loss from last year's club in guard Joe Good.

Missouri already has plugged one of its losses, forward Gene Landolt, with a sparkling sophomore, Norman Stewart, 6-4, Shelbyville, Mo., native. However, the Tigers certainly are missing Win Wilfong, all-tournament and all-league guard last year.

Oklahoma's veterans still must fight without a genuine big man, the 6-6 Bob Waller being their tallest regular. However, normal improvement, designed along the usual Bruce Drake lines of nifty ball-handling, passing and shooting, can pitch the Sooners high in the race.

Iowa State Collapses After Early Lead—

K-STATE SMASHES CYCLONES, 98-77

KANSAS CITY, MO.—There was a "cyclone" loose in Municipal Auditorium here Wednesday afternoon but it wasn't the Iowa State basketball team which bears that nickname.

Kansas State, going into the second quarter trailing by three, rushed home 30 points in 10 minutes to build a solid base for an eventual 98-77 victory.

Iowa State, owner of a surprise 25-22 lead at the end of the first quarter, suddenly became very impotent at scoring, making one field goal in an eight-point second period.

The Wildcats, by virtue of the victory in the losers' bracket in the annual Big Seven tournament, finished fifth. Iowa State wound up sixth.

The surprise in Iowa State's game wasn't that the Cyclones

lost by 21 points but that they lost by only 21 points after being haunted by such a horrible eight minutes.

It was 52-33 at intermission, but Coach Chick Sutherland's team scrapped back to cut the lead to 70-58 and they might have done even better if center Chuck Duncan and, later, Don DeKoster hadn't fouled out.

Duncan is the Cyclones' biggest at 6 feet 5 inches. And he was also their best with 21 points and 12 rebounds. It was also Chuck's absence in the second quarter—he was taken out with three fouls—that opened the gates.

14 Straight Points.

It was a 32-30 game, favor of K-State, when Duncan went out. Starting at 38-32, the Wildcats ripped off 14 straight points to run up their halftime lead.

By the time the Cyclones got

in scoring stride again, they trailed by 24 points at 59-35.

A problem that will become familiar during the regular season—lack of height—plagued Iowa State all the way. In the first half it was largely 6-11 Jerry Jung, who bagged 14 points.

Jung, who can out-rebound most of the Cyclones standing flatfooted (and generally does), was removed early in the second half. The report is that he had a dent in his brow which needed X-ray.

Balanced scoring—there were five Wildcats who tallied 11 or more—was a big aid to the Kansas State, which shot 47 per cent. Jesse Prisock was high with 16.

Starts 2 Newcomers.

Sutherland started a pair of newcomers, guard Tom LeBuhn and forward Howard Johnson, and both played well. Johnson,

a good shot, tallied 13 points, six less than the ever-valuable Dutch Van Cleave.

Kansas State's 98 points was the highest ever scored in a regulation game in this tournament. That 103-102 victory by Stanford over Iowa State was under experimental rules.

The Wildcats barely missed hitting 100. Reserve guard Bob Smith missed two free throws after the game had ended.

Centers Dominate Tourney

Born Favored to Maintain Centers' Scoring String

A 6-9 length of lefthander, Kansas' B. H. Born, will be the prime guardian of the postman's unbroken string of individual Big Seven tournament scoring championships when the eighth annual meet gets out of the starting blocks Saturday night in Kansas City.

This phenomenon of pivot dominance of the tourney point race was originated by Oklahoma's Gerald Tucker in 1946, when the meet was founded in the final year of the old Big Six. The hefty, 6-4 Sooner center rimmed 64 points over the three-game route despite OU's first-round upset at the hands of Kansas State.

This stood as a tournament record for four years before the Jayhawkers Colossus, Clyde Lovellette, figured home 82 markers as a junior in 1950.

Since Tucker's auspicious start, the loop's centers haven't allowed the individual point flag to escape them in seven consecutive meets. Bill Waters, the ponderous hoss who succeeded Tucker as OU's top pivot, also followed him as tournament scoring monarch with 40 points in 1947.

This represents the all-time low for a meet point title but it still was good enough to edge Harold Howey, fiery forward of Kansas State's champions, by two lengths.

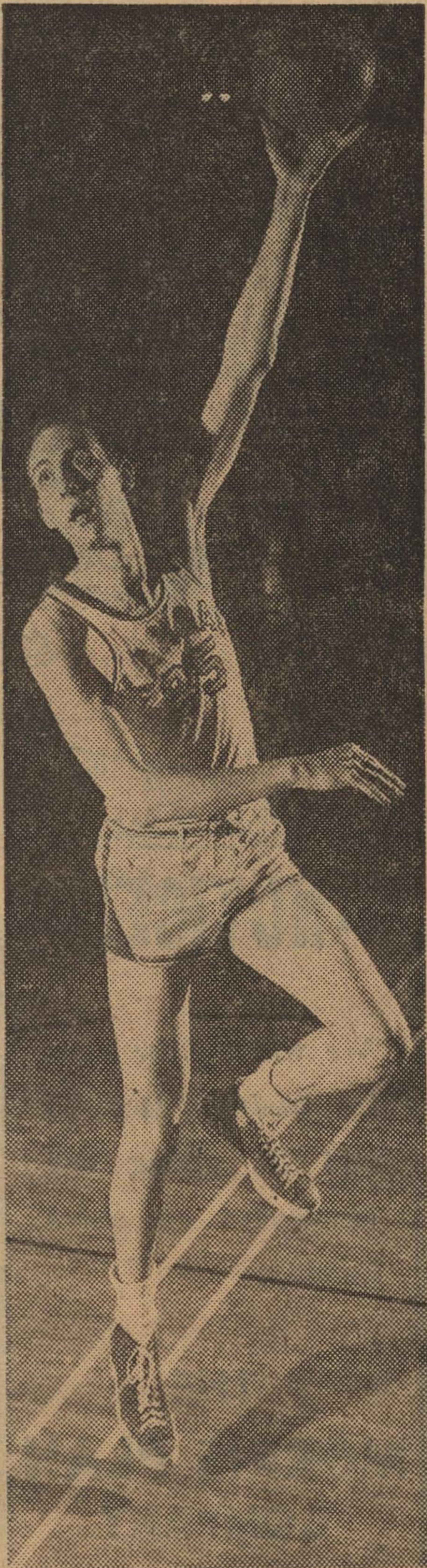

Off the basis of the conference's early outings, Born is the heir apparent to this roster. In the Jayhawkers' three games he has nailed 77 points for a 25.6 average to lead all league point-smiths.

If Born falters, three other pivots will be on hand to keep the torch away from the forwards and guards. Missouri's Bob Reiter, a 6-8 junior, is averaging 17.7 points per start to rank next to Born in the league's early scoring tables. Nebraska's Bill Johnson and Bob Waller, Oklahoma's versatile shooter, are carrying 14.7 means.

Phog said. "Pat was the only one outside of B. H. Born who was playing any kind of ball last night. When he went out (6:01 of the third quarter remaining) we were really in trouble."

Phog said the Kansas effort was definitely under par and that the boys never got relaxed. He said there was little difference in the two teams and that Missouri displayed an aggressive brand of ball. He picked Missouri and Nebraska as the dark horses of the Big Seven.

Phog was a little critical of the rest of his boys. "Kelley played like he thought he was in Nova Scotia," Phog remarked, "and the rest of them are going to have to do a lot better."

From Sparky Stalcup, the Missouri coach, came some pretty high compliments for the Kansas team.

"Almost as Good."

"They're as good as the 1952-53 team," Sparky said—"well, almost as good, anyway."

That was high praise since the Jayhawk machine of last year was only a 1-point loser to Indiana in the N. C. A. A. finals here.

"That boy Dallas Dobbs (K. U. sophomore from Bartlesville, Ok.) really has filled Dean Kelley's shoes." Sparky said. Dean Kelley was key factor in Kansas's rise to success last year after losing almost all the Olympic team of the year before.

Stalcup felt that Missouri could have won the game had the Tigers kept closer to the Jayhawks in the first half.

"We got too far down and never could quite make it back," said Spark.

For the Kansas rooters, they came way too close.

The soft-shooting Salinan, who did not even appear in the tournament as a sophomore two years ago, was particularly effective in the 76-69 demolition of then-unbeaten Wyoming December 12 at Manhattan when he plugged 26 points.

Other players within range are Bob Waller, who'll come in with 54 points in two meets; Jesse Prisock, who owns 74; Bill Johnson, who has collected 63 in tourney play; and B. H. Born, who has scored 51 in Kansas City.

the stoutest bid for the meet individual scoring crown since Nebraska's Jim Buchanan missed by nine points against

Kansas' Prolific Pachyderm, Clyde Lovellette, two years ago.

Of this gang, only Segar, the 6-4 Cornhusker, finished among the circuit's scoring elite in league play last year, with a 13.1 average for ninth position. None crashed the tournament's top ten last December.

Altho the guards have three representatives among the Top Ten tournament career scorers, Kansas State's Ernie Barrett, and Colorado's Wayne Tucker, along with Buchanan, they never have made much splash in any single meet. Buchanan's 1951 effort is the high-water mark and he is the lone out-count delegate on the Top Ten single-tournament scoring tabulations.

With anything approaching their early pace, any one of the four must be conceded a chance at the tournament point pennant. Van Cleave will come in tied for second on the conference pre-tournament scoring tables with a 17.7 average in four games. Segar is fourth with 15.9 in six; Stauffer fifth with 15.6 in five, and Lane sixth with 15.3 in four.

Van Cleave is likely to see his average shrink under stress of more severe competition since the Cyclones have met only Colorado A & M, Creighton, Grinnell and Drake. The other three have been shooting against major targets in almost every start. Segar has collected his last 37 points on the road against Oregon State and Oregon.

Stauffer will be under closest scrutiny since he is the leading pointsmith of the defending champions who are given a better-than-average chance of becoming the first team to bag two titles in succession.

KANSAS CITY, MO.— Favorites are as scarce as Orange Bowl tickets as the Big Seven's basketball squads, plus guest team Washington, prepare to tip off the eighth annual pre-season tournament tonight in Municipal Auditorium.

The other four tourney entries get into the milling Monday night, with lower bracket first-round games. They match Kansas State and Nebraska at 8 p. m., and Oklahoma and Washington at 9:45.

Semifinals are scheduled Tuesday night, and finals Wednesday. Consolation games will be played in afternoon doubleheaders starting Monday.

By force of habit, Kansas and Kansas State will shoulder the favorites' burden, but it's

lighter than in any previous league tournament.

However, these Sunflower State squads have won four of the seven previous meets, and are shaky picks to play in the finals again this time. KU won it all only once—in 1951—but has been a finalist on three other occasions. K-State won in 1947, 1949 and last year, this latest on a 93-87 victory over KU.

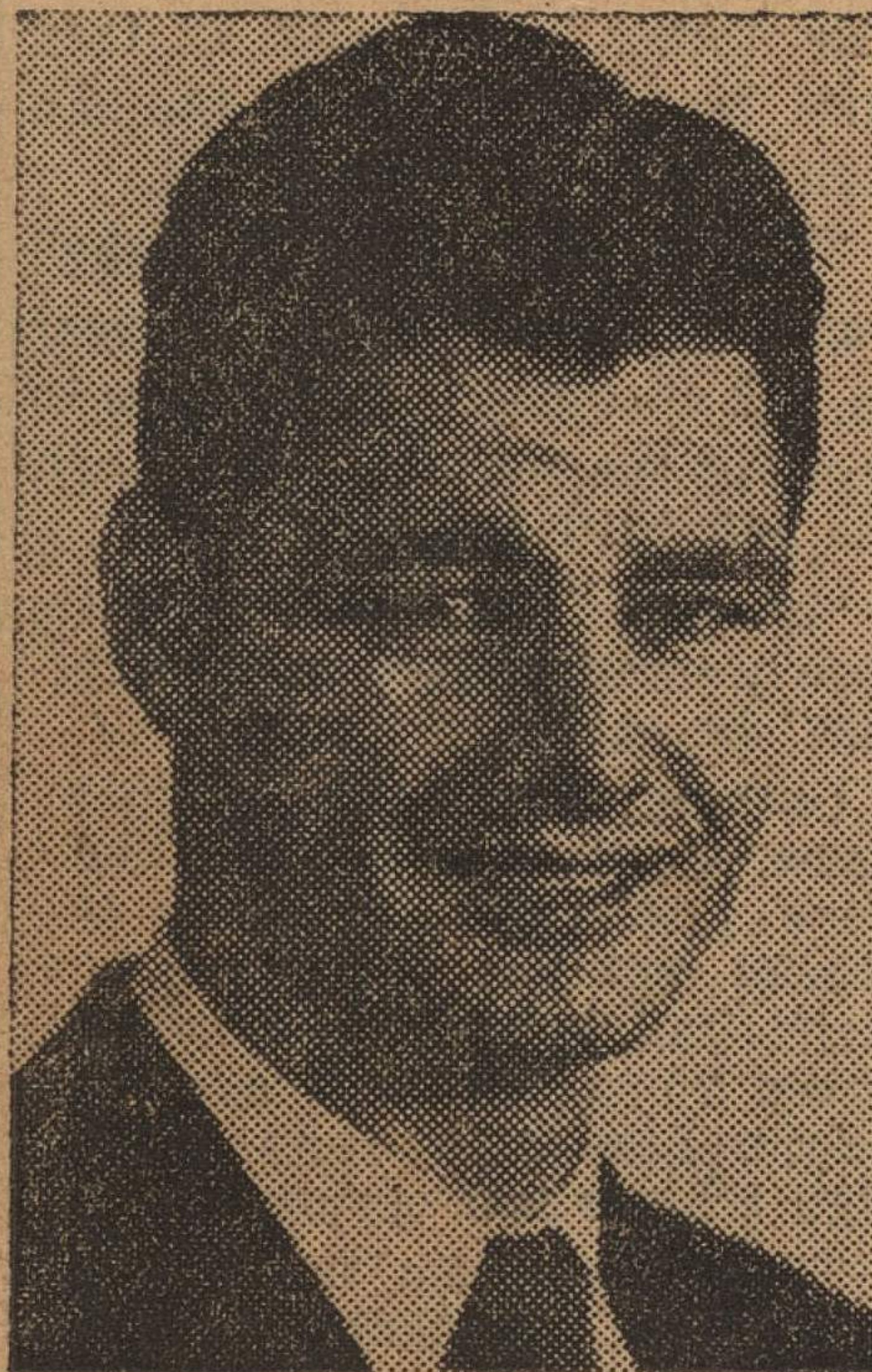
If you're superstitious, your favorite should be Kansas, since no champion ever has repeated.

K-State will pace the best record into the tournament, a 4-1 mark that includes single victories over Denver and Wyoming, a double triumph over Washington, and a whopping 92-66 loss to defending champion Indiana.

Kansas stands at 1-2 on the year, having flogged Tulsa after dropping two games to Tulane and Louisiana State on a season-opening southern tour.

ment with a record on the sunny side of .500. The Cyclones have won three and lost one. Missouri is all even at 2-2,

and the rest of the entries lag behind.

Oklahoma and Kansas have won only one game apiece, and Colorado and Washington are winless. The Buffs have dropped five in a row, the Huskies from the Pacific Coast conference four straight—two each to Stanford and Kansas State.

Nebraska, with a 2-4 record, generally is given the best chance to unseat the title-hogging Sunflower squads. The Huskers have shown promise, and will field a veteran squad headed by 6-7 center Bill Johnson and guard Fred Seger.

Oklahoma, which lost all three tourney games it played here last year, also will bear watching. The Sooners also will start a veteran five topped by little Les Lane, southpaw Ron Blue and center Bob Waller.

However, OU's customary lack of height again is a problem. Waller is the tallest Sooner at 6-6, and the replacement line is thin.

Missouri has a big one in

Bob Reiter, 6-8 center, and a promising squad. The Tigers, like Oklahoma and Nebraska, could figure in the title picture.

KU and K-State, despite pressing problems, still rate as the best bets, however. Kansas coach Phog Allen has back towering center B. H. Born and forwards Al Kelley and Harold Patterson from last season's conference champs and NCAA runners-up. But Allen still is looking for guards to match the all-round skill of graduate Gil Reich and Dean Kelley.

State, which lost Dick Knostman by graduation and 6-8 Gary Bergen on a transfer to Utah, has a tender spot at center, and has been experimenting with 6-11 Jerry Jung and a couple of 6-7 hopefuls, Roland Craft and sophomore Jim Frary.

New K-State coach Tex Winter is expected to open with Craft.

Tourney officials say plenty of tickets for the first two nights of action remain. They're priced at \$1, \$2, and \$3, and are available at the auditorium.

Unexpected the Rule

Big Seven Meet Zany

HOW many ambushes await favorites in the eighth annual Big Seven basketball tournament which gets out of the starting gate Saturday in Kansas City's municipal auditorium? What odd outcroppings of team performance and bizarre player incidents will mark the affair?

Those are the magnets that again will draw sellout houses in the 10,000-capacity round-ball palace at least three of the four playing nights and continue to project the affair as one of the nation's finest, despite its comparatively youthful existence.

This is the meet that already has produced two high-scoring overtime matches without precedent in regular league play, Kansas' 90-88 win over Kansas State in the 1951 semifinals and Stanford's 103-102 edging of Iowa State in the first consolation round of the same meet.

This is a tournament in which Iowa State, a team that hasn't won a league cage flag since 1945 and has dropped 13 consecutive conference decisions to Kansas State, is the only club which holds an edge over the Wildcats in tourney play. It is only 1-0, the Cyclones having captured the only match between the two. But State is 0-7 against a combination of Missouri and Kansas while State holds a bulge over all other comers.

The meet also has seen a stellar performer like Missouri's win Wilfong blanked from the field for a full game. And it once produced an all-tournament team, the 1949 five, that did not include a single member of Missouri's championship five.

Also consider this rare backdrop: Only post-men ever have won a meet individual scoring championship. Yet none holds

the single-game point record. Three men, Oklahoma's Sherman Norton, the record-holder with 39; Minnesota's Maynard Johnson and Kansas State's Dick Knostman, with 38 each, have nailed more points in a

single tournament game than KU's Clyde Lovellette, greatest pointsmith in conference annals.

Two teams, Colorado in 1949, and Stanford in 1951, have come into the meet with undefeated records, but never even reached the finals. Nebraska once outscored Iowa State, 19-1, in the overtime period to notch an 86-67 consolation triumph in 1948.

Jim Stange, who still is co-holder of the school record for most points and most free throws in a single game, potted a goal for Nebraska in this one, wheeling into the wrong goal after snaring a jump ball.

The last two finals have ended in tears, boos and rhu-barbs.

SMU set a pattern for the unexpected in the inaugural meet by winning the championship as one of the two guest teams. The Mustangs did so by clipping Kansas, 49-46, in the finals. No other invited five . . . Washington is completing the eight-team bracket this year . . . ever has won the crown.

Kansas State added impetus to what has become an annual surprise motif in the same meet by ambushing Oklahoma's eventual NCAA runners-up, 59-55, in the opening round of the meet despite a 24-point salute by Sooner pivot, Gerald Tucker.

The Wildcats since have become the tourney's most dominate team, winning three championships . . . no other club has won more than one . . . and clearing the first round in every meet.

Yet that blank against the Cyclones persists. It was accomplished chiefly by a pair of midget guards, 5-9 Bob Petersen and 5-8 Don Ferguson, who rollicked for an aggregate of 23 points as the Iowans scored a 56-53 upset in the 1948 third-place playoff.

Missouri won the '49 title by edging Oklahoma, 44-42, in the finals, after disposing of Colorado, 62-51, and Michigan, 47-46. Yet none of the Bengals'

starting five of Bill Stauffer, Don Stroot, Jerry Fowler, Bob Wachter and George Lafferty earned a first-team all-meet berth.

Wilfong, since lifted by the armed forces, drew his handcuff in last year's meet from Kansas guard Dean Kelley who restricted him to four points from the free throw line. Had the versatile Tiger sentinel merely notched his season's average of 11.1 KU could not have scored that 66-62 semi-final upset.

Norton cut his record in the opening round of 1951 as Oklahoma upset Stanford, 77-71. The lean 6-4 Redshirt harvested 13 baskets, nine of them lay-ups out of Bruce Drake's patented "Shuffle" with which the Sooners hoodwinked the Pacific Coasters all evening. Norton canned every one of his 13 free throw tries which also is a meet mark.

Stanford had come into the tourney with a string of eight consecutive early-season victories.

Colorado met a similar fate in '49 won it lugged a ribbon of seven straight triumphs into the hall, only to suffer that 51-62 sacking at the hands of Missouri, the champs' widest winning spread of the meet, in the semifinals.

That record Stanford-Iowa State match was chiefly the product of a rules experiment which 1) Forced the offended team to shoot all free throws and 2) Gave the offended team ball possession after every successful free throw.

THE KU-KS heart-stopper, played just one game later, must go down as the tourney's greatest bout to date. This saw the Wildcats wipe out two 19-point leads to tie at 72-72 6:40 from the finish. It also saw Lovellette score only five points thru the first half and nail 22 of his 27 while carrying four fouls. State forward Hoot Gibson, sent the game into overtime with a long tip-in 9 seconds before the finish to forge an 80-80 deadlock. Then the two bitter intra-state foes whirled thru 18 points in the overtime.

Ranking on the same plane was Missouri's 1949 win over OU which saw Guard George Lafferty score his team's last seven points to pull the Tigers from behind.

With the conference expected to be considerably tighter from top to bottom this winter, the intense firing in Kansas City should be even more acrid.
