
#### PEACH BASKET

However, I told them that I was going to as the basket was official, and if we did not designate a ball as official that they would not be consistent in insisting that we not use a certain type of goal. That is the reason that I am descring this information.

Won't you write me at your early convenience and give me all the background toward the discouragements and encouragements in locating your goals. Last September you wrote me that six or seven of the Big Ten freshman teams were using the goals. What has become of the contemplated action to use the Bask-O-Lite goal in the Big Ten?
