

Gene Sullivan, of St. Joseph, Mo., has asked me to get a late photograph to you; Here it is: Having the time of my life here, but Taylor, I'm running up against a few instances wherein promiscuous signing up of young kids might prove to "back-fire" on organized base ball.

Of course, whatever "back-fire" there might be, won't bother the powers that be, but I would rather have the good will of the rank and file of Interscholastic and Collegiate groups than be the target for their shafts of criticism----- and there is a lot of it going around.

Within the past two days I have had two fine boys come into my office; one with one year of Inter-Collegiate competition and a medical discharge and the other a High School graduate who will be eighteen next December---both coerced into signing base ball contracts-----under contract for a month---then released and now those boys are trying to find a school that will permit them to play the sports they want to take part in: one foot ball and base ball; the other basket ball and base ball and both boys "out in the cold" all because some cock-eyed "scout" was balancing his budget by signing up every boy---good and bad----- whether they had ability or not.

No, I haven't changed my attitude since I have re-entered College circles---Taylor, I have always been opposed to taking High School and College athletes until the boy has completed his permitted years of participation; Then let him sign with organized ball, if he is good enough.



Dear Dr. Allen:



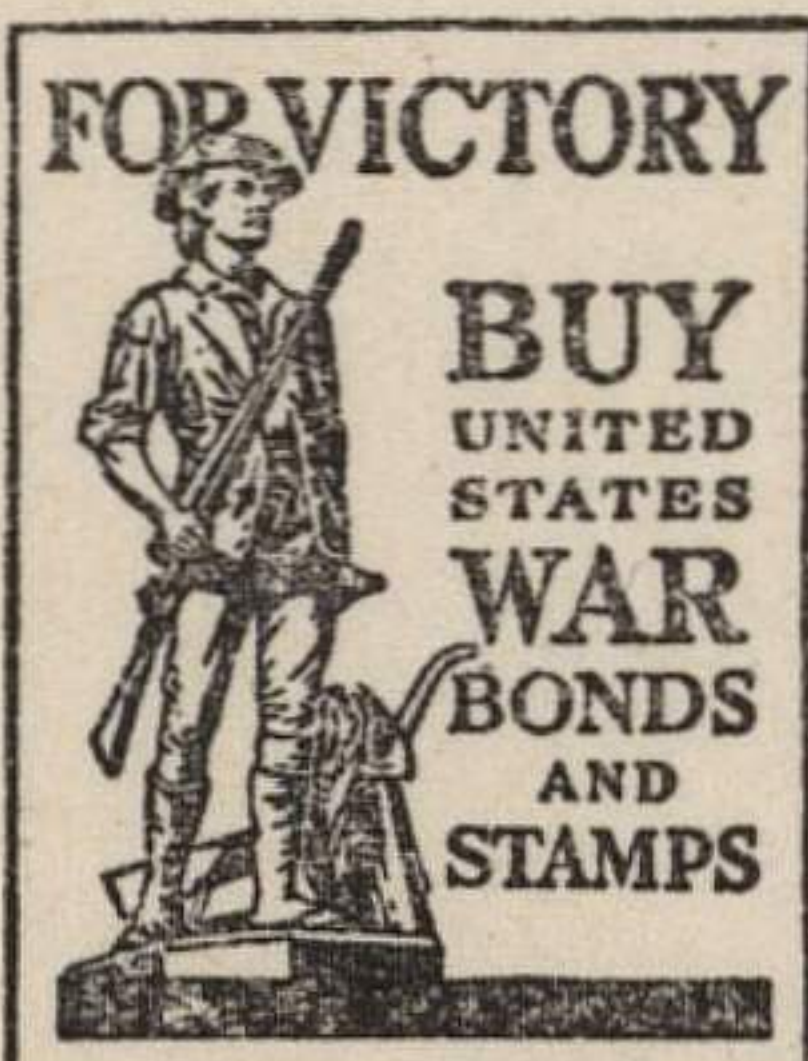

The printing of the programs for the Teen Age Recreation work shop has been delayed. In order to get information into your hands immediately, I thought we should send you this letter and let the printed programs follow.

We are bringing ~~Mr. Chester L. Bowers~~, who is one of the best authorities on recreation in the south west to the campus for that week.

We are building the program around the work unit, "Time On Your Hands" which I reviewed in manuscript form recently for Thomas H. Briggs, chairman of the committee on Consumer Education Study. The study was prepared by the National Association of Secondary School Principals, a department of the N. E. A. The work unit has not been printed for the public yet, so you see we are planning this program according to the latest development in education.

We have the approval of Norman's Teen Town Council to use their facilities as often as we need them.

We want at least one junior high school boy, one junior high school girl, and one adult from the same community to come to Norman June 12 through June 16, to attend and take part in this work shop.

Would you give us your cooperation to have at least three representatives from your community on this campus for the work shop? The adult does not have to be a teacher; just anyone in your community interested enough in youth to want to help. If the adult should be a member of your staff, I think he or she could make a definite contribution to your school after having had this training.

The civic clubs of your community might be invited to sponsor these youngsters coming. The P. T. A. could take this over as their project. The American Legion Post in your community might be encouraged to support this as a worthwhile contribution to the youth of your community.

Dear Mr. Seem:

I find your letter in some accumulated correspondence that I was unable to answer last spring. You ask, "Do football and basketball pay for themselves?". I do not know whether you meant to ask this as applied to high school or college football and basketball.

Night football in high school generally makes money but day-time football loses money in high schools. Basketball pays for itself in high school because the boards of education build the high school building and there is no rental to pay for basketball, while sometimes football fields are rented. Basketball in high schools where day-time football is played generally carries the load for all sports.

In college football pays about five times as much as basketball. Basketball and football both pay for themselves and make money in college.

If you are still interested and will be a little more specific in asking your questions, I will be glad to give you the best information available.

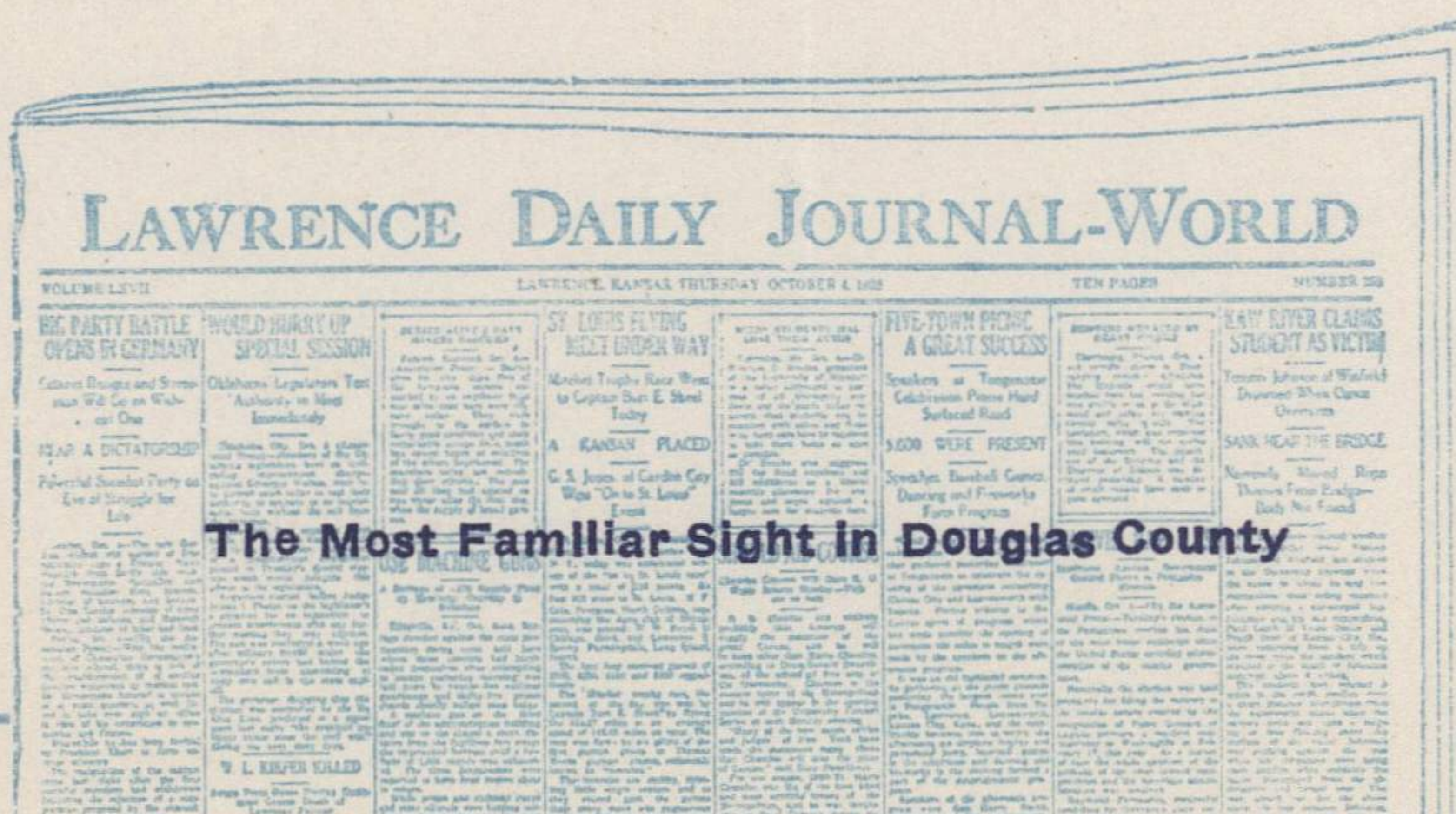

Fortunately I have been assigned to Iowa State College. The Navy has a V 12 Unit here and also an electrical and diesel school. Iowa State has a very beautiful campus and wonderful facilities for outdoor athletics. We have eighteen football fields marked off. The indoor facilities are not quite adequate however. We have nice quarters good food, a fine bunch of fellas to work with and all in all their is only one assignment I would rather have had and that of course would have been K.U. I guess K.U. has about the same set up so you know about what my duties are. Duty here doesn't seem like being in the navy after the training stations, in fact it is very much like college days again.

Thought perhaps I could see the game in K.C. this week but two of the boys are on leave at present. I believe K.U. comes here Oct. 14th. 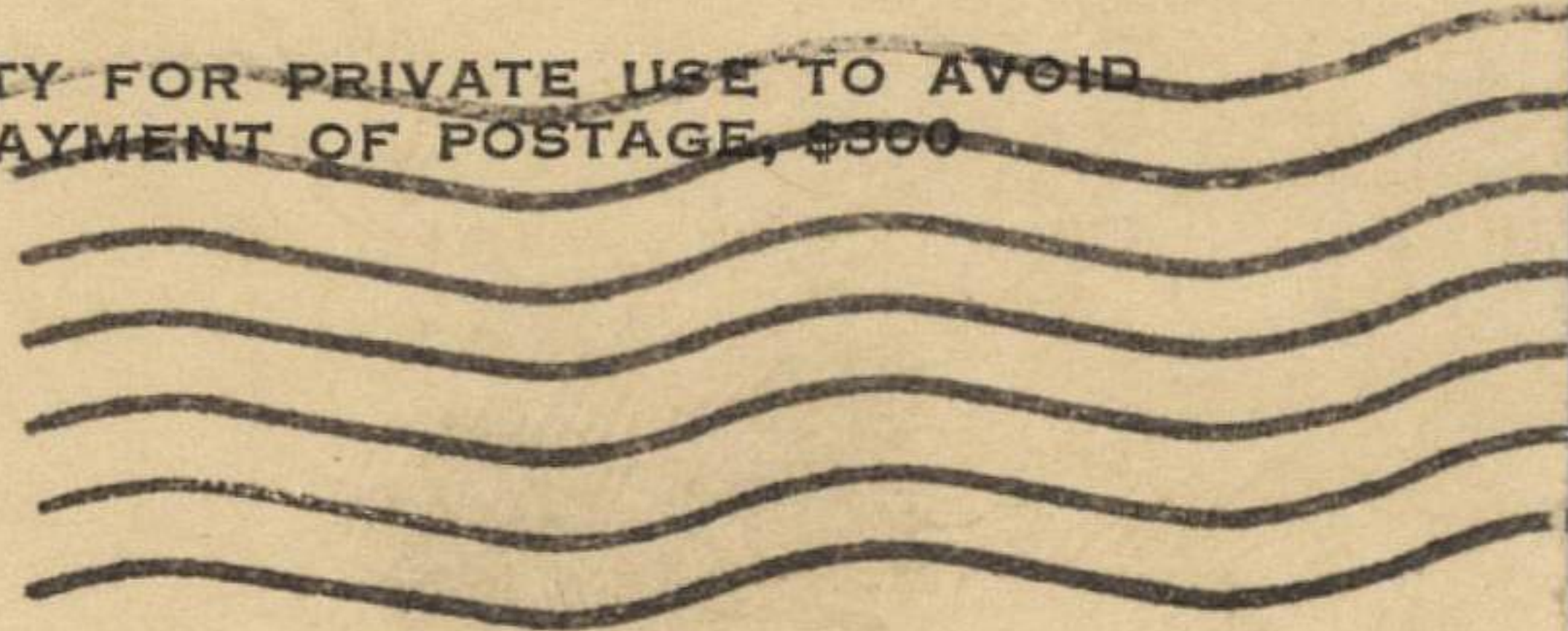
