TO MEMBERS OF THE FACULTY:

The University budget for 1945-1946 includes the usual item for assistance to research projects of members of the Faculty. The Research Committee plans to give early consideration to the allotment of the fund and is, therefore, asking that requests for grants be submitted promptly.

The item in the budget is entirely from the maintenance fund; consequently, grants cannot be made involving the direct payment of salaries or wages.

It is very important that each request be carefully considered before being submitted. It is altogether probable that the total amount requested for even the very worthy projects cannot be granted. It would be helpful to the Committee if each person submitting a request were to obtain the endorsement in writing of the chairman of his department.

With each application there should be furnished as complete and as accurate information as possible on the following points:

1. Nature of the project and probable results to be obtained.
2. Its present state of completion.
3. Total amount necessary during 1945-46 from the Research Fund and specific purposes for which each portion of the sum is to be used.
4. Probable amount necessary from the fund in future years in order to complete the project.

Members of the Faculty who wish to apply for grants should submit their requests in writing by June 1, 1945.

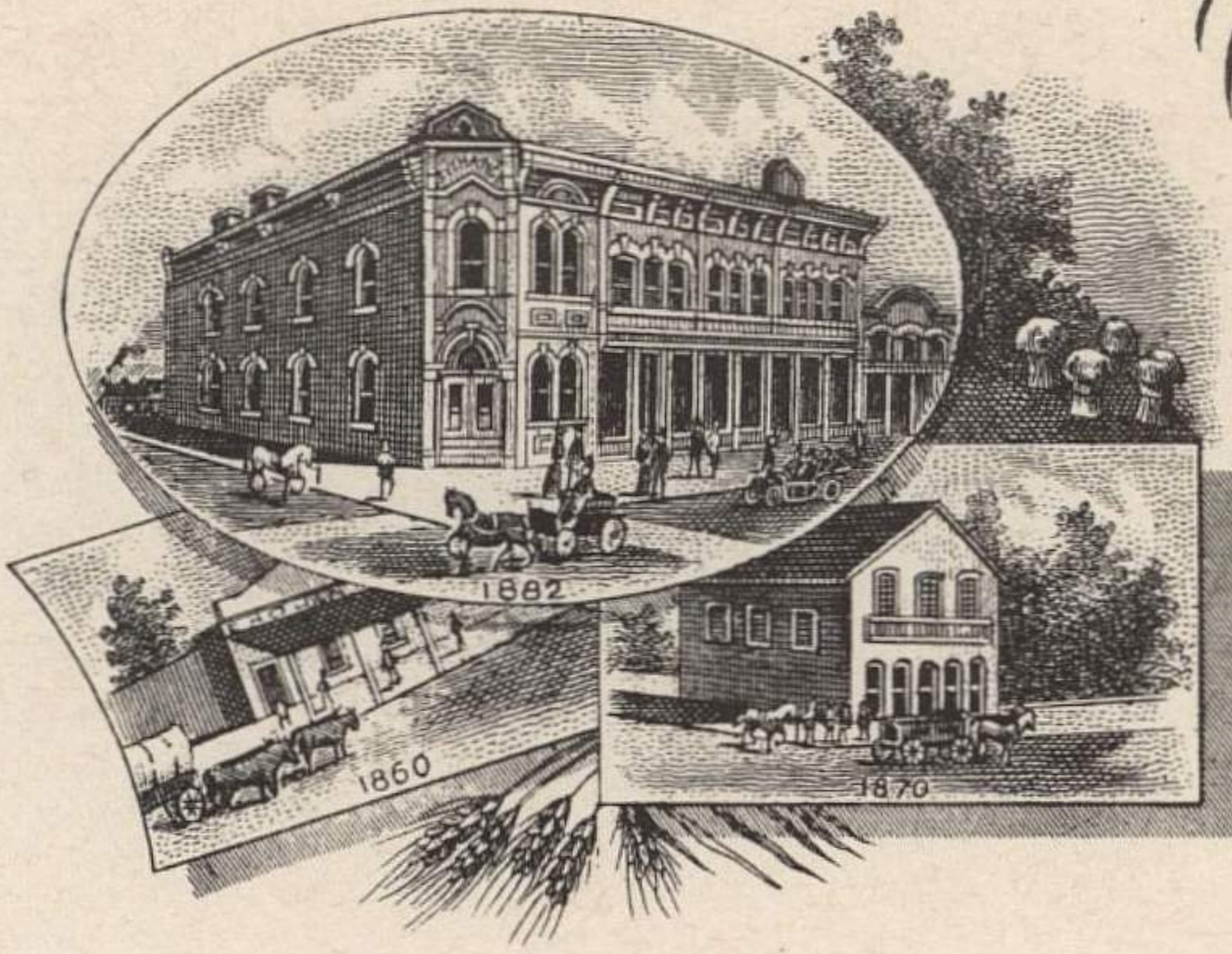

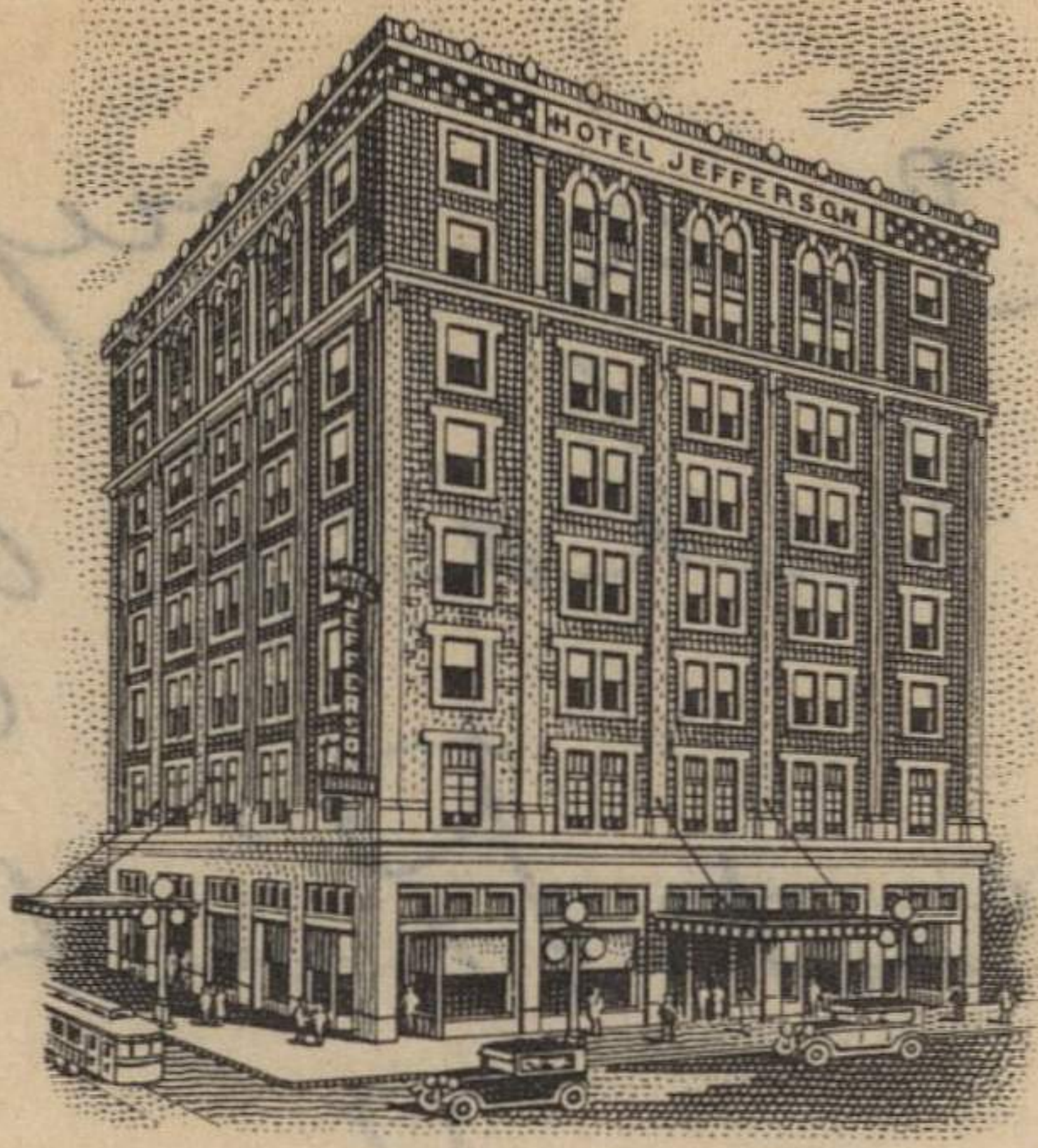
Any way that I can help out will be a pleasure. Let me know.

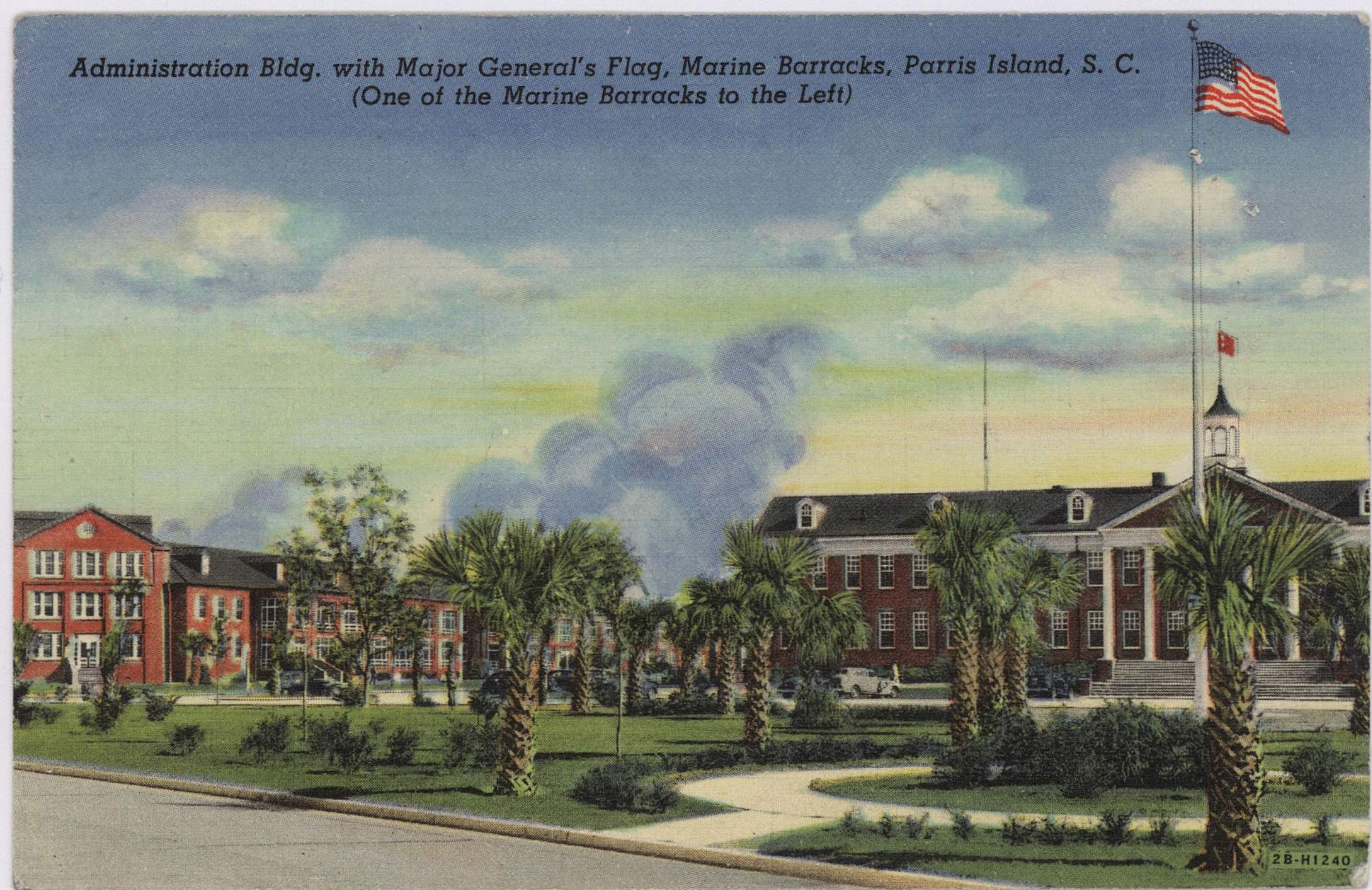

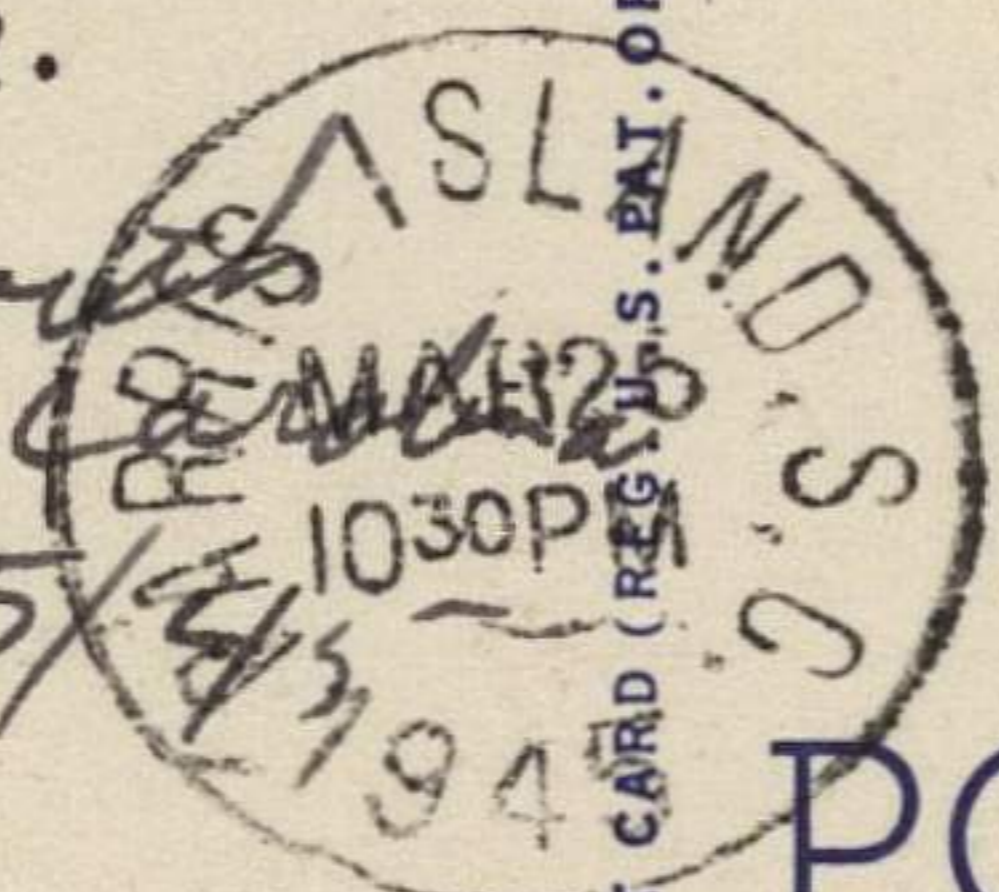

I have had another change since I last wrote to you and I am more than just well pleased with the duty that I have now. I don't care much for the sea but it is a welcome change. While I am overseas and away from home I like to keep moving. I am now stationed aboard and LST that is operating out of England. I have already made several trips to the continent trying to keep some of the boys up front supplied with a few of the things they need. I have already become the Welfare and Rec. and Education officer. I have a good softball team and we get quite a lot of opportunity to play when we are in port. In fact, we have a game scheduled for this afternoon and I am going to hurry this letter a little to be able to make the game. Got an interested bunch of boys and that is a good sign. The ship, with her officers and men, has been overseas for two years now. That is too long but they have stood up well under the strain of three invasions in the mediterranean and Normandy. At least they know what the score is and that means a lot.

This is just going to be just a note because I have a ball game to play and I think that I could do myself and a lot of kids a lot of good by getting off this metal deck for a few hours. Keep the Rebounds coming Doc and I am sure that none of us will be sorry that you will publish one a month.

For gods sake don't show this typing to anyone because it seems that my fingers don't want to do what the old bean tells them to.

Letter writing has become increasingly difficult due to censorship restrictions and the "daily routine" of war activities.

However, I have made a resolution to try to keep up with the home activities and I certainly appreciated the comprehensive reports of Kansas basketball activities. I picked up a copy of "Stars and Stripes" and I note that only Iowa State remains to be defeated for another Kansas championship. By the time you receive this letter, congratulations should be in order to you and the members of the team.

It was interesting to note in our travels through war-torn France, that basketball goals still stand at many schools. This is apparent that the game is becoming international in character. Of course, some of the backboards have gaping holes in them from shell fragments. Just some time ago, the 79th Division, of which we are a part, enjoyed a short rest period. A school building with a

better than average gym was used for
bulleting. It was interesting to note that
the men preferred to bunk up classes
so the floor space could be used for
basketball and other games. It is not
unusual for one to see a couple
of Entitled Men playing catch only a
few miles back of the front lines.

Due to this keen and enduring interest
in sports, the problem of finding some
worthwhile off-duty leisure-time sports
is not so much of a problem, I
am still trying to double up as Special
Service Officer and Information and
Education Officer for the Battalion. I
might add in addition to my other
duties as Battery Executive Officer.

It was interesting to note how many
of the former Kansans have become
leaders in the various branches of
Service. It is a tragedy that some have
already lost their lives and that many
more have been wounded. I have just
heard that Lester Kappelman is now
back in the States. I knew he was
wounded and in a hospital over here but

I have been over here for quite some
time (Cherbourg) and as yet I have
seen only one person from around

Kansas State. We have some terrible
times rubbing one another. It certainly
made me yell "Hawls" after the turning
football upset but the basketball season
has been kind to me.

Spring is here to stay we hope even
if the snow has turned to knee deep
mud. We are all hoping and believing
this is our "Year" and that we will
be doing a lot of traveling to the east,
with Berlin as our objective.

I should like to send my best regards
to those on the "Hill" that I know
with special regards to Mrs. Allen.

I believe Lt. ~~Smith~~ mentioned that
Mrs. Katten is still in the athletic
office. It will be a happy day when
I can again drop in and pick up some
tickets and watch the younger generation
in a peace-time sports program.

Many thanks again and I will be
looking forward to the next issue and
with it the Championships.






