Dear Mr. Toalson:

On November 24, 1937, Professor F. A. Russell of our Civil Engineering Department, gave us an estimate on the approximate cost of building one reinforced concrete tennis court. This estimate was based on plans and specifications of the Portland Cement Association and was in line with the suggestions of Junior Coen, one of the Davis Cup members.

I would suggest that you write the Portland Cement Association, 33 West Grand Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. They have rather an elaborate description and drawings of tennis court construction. The brochure they mailed us was dated February 7, 1938, but I am sure they have made improvements since then.

We planned on reinforced concrete, 120 feet long by 56 feet wide, and 5 inches thick, reinforced with wire mesh. The total cost of material was \$976.20. I believe you will get a better estimate from them than it would be possible for us to give because they are specialists in that field.




Dear Phog:



Are you planning on building concrete tarvia or some other type of court? We have some specifications for reinforced concrete but have no other kind.

Frankly, I would not know what to prescribe for courts in your section of the state, unless I would suggest the reinforced concrete. They, of course, are all-weather courts and in the warmer climates they are lighting them electrically for play in the evening. In that way you can get full service from them and the maintenance and upkeep is negligible. Of course, the initial expense is great but it is the proposition that we encounter when we consider highways -- concrete or sanded roads. Eventually the sanded roads eat up all the profit and you still have nothing but a sanded road.

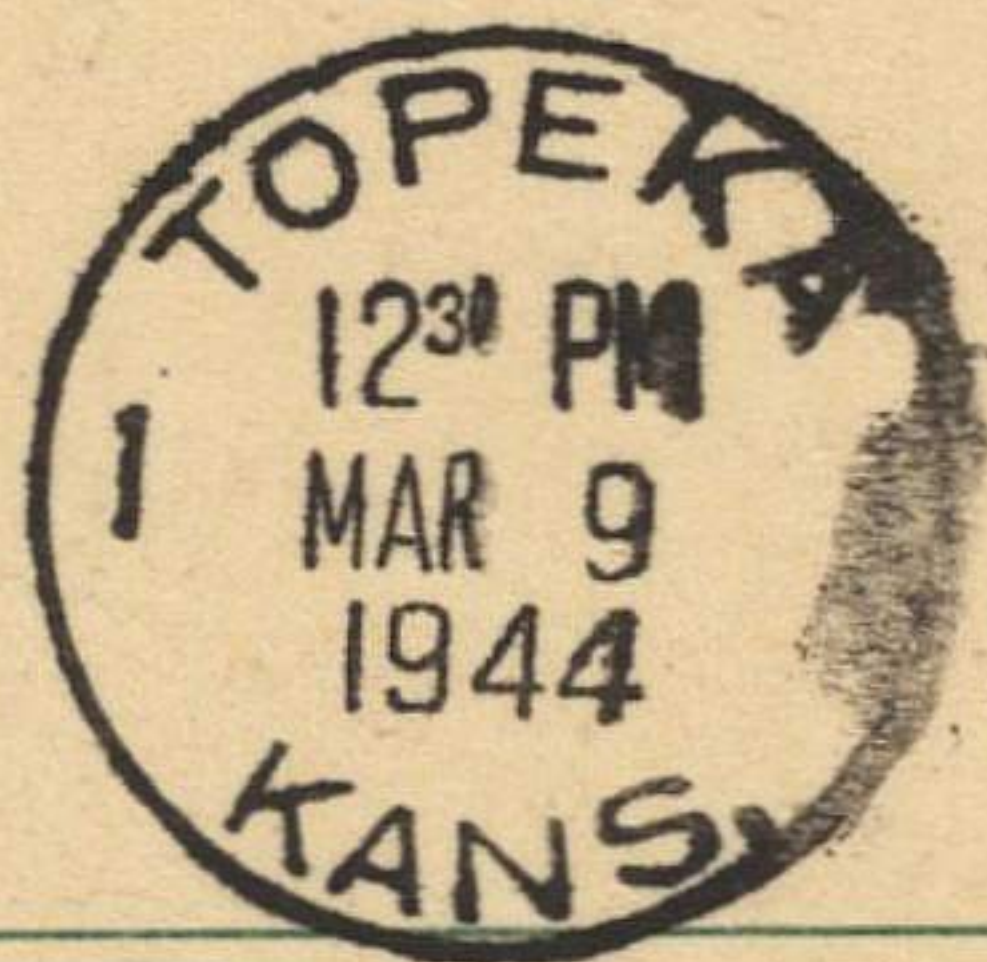


