I also pointed out that Drake had her Relays and since it was a college in a big city and a friendly institution that we should show appreciation for their many years of fine service.

I am sending you a carbon copy of a letter that I have written to Eddie Hickey and to Hal Middlesworth, and also a short note to Henry Iba. I saw in your column a few weeks ago - maybe it was a couple of months ago - where I had been given credit for some unfriendly attitude toward the Missouri Valley Conference, or either Creighton or Oklahoma Aggies.

I want to assure you that such is not the fact. While I was a representative of the Fifth District of the N.C.A.A. I tried by every fair means to give the Missouri Valley the fairest representation that they could have. I still hold to that opinion because I have never received any discourtesy from any coach or member of the Missouri Valley Conference. I have a very high personal regard and friendship for Artie Eilers and I have nothing but admiration and friendship for the coaches and athletic directors in that conference. They have always been very fair to me.

In fact, you might recall that when the Big Six withdrew from the Missouri Valley Conference I opposed vehemently the action, saying that it was not only unsportsmanlike but rather cowardly for athletic directors and faculty representatives to meet in a clandestine way and withdraw from their membership of long standing. I subjected myself to such personal ridicule and criticisms that I understand some of the members considered dropping Kansas from the membership.

Personally, I would not want you to publish any of this because it would only open old wounds, but if you have any doubt of it ask Nelson Metcalf, Chet Brewer or Herb Gates. I called a spade a spade, and called some of these fellows so-and-so. So I just want to set you right, See.

You have always been a fine friend of mine and I cherish most highly the confidences that we have exchanged many, many times. Please remember me most kindly to my good friend, Bert McGrane.

# THE UNIVERSITY OF KANSAS

## LAWRENCE

### TO MEMBERS OF THE STAFF:

Under the new Federal PAY-AS-YOU-GO TAX LAW the State Auditor is required to withhold about 20% of each salary warrant above the exemptions provided in the law, beginning with the July salary.

The new law is designed to make persons pay income taxes as they earn the income, instead of paying them after the end of the year. The monthly deductions really will be advance payments toward the annual income tax which actually can not be computed accurately until the end of the year. In some cases these advance payments will have been too low, in other cases too high, but any difference is to be adjusted in the annual tax return to be made before next March 15. Thus it is clear that the total tax liability of a person will be the same whether the income is earned, and withholding deductions made, in 9 or 12 monthly installments.

In order to establish your exemption status you will need to sign and return to the Business Office both copies of the enclosed Employees Withholding Exemption Certificate. Please be sure to fill out the certificate in detail according to directions. Home address refers to town, state, and street. If you have a Social Security number, give it in the space provided. If you are under 18 years of age, give your age on the name line following your name. Be sure to return your certificates promptly; if you do not file a certificate, the law requires that the State deduct the tax from the entire salary without benefit of any exemption. If you change your personal status, a new certificate must be signed before the end of the month during which the change occurs.

The following table shows the exemptions allowed under the law. Note that the married person's exemption can be divided equally between man and wife, or that either can take the entire exemption. The deduction for dependents can be taken only by the person actually providing the chief support.

**Table of Exemptions for Salaries Paid on Monthly Basis**

Single person .....	\$ 52
Married person: (a) Claiming whole of personal exemption.....	104
(b) Claiming half of personal exemption.....	52
(c) Claiming none of personal exemption.....	0
Each dependent other than first dependent in case of head of family....	26

To determine how much of your pay is subject to tax, refer to the table on the back of this folder. Table 2 applies to any person whose appointment begins after the first day of the month, but applies to that month only; Table 1 applies to all other employees.

Here is an example under Table 1: A married man with one dependent claiming all the personal exemption will have \$10 withheld from his check if his monthly wages are anywhere between \$160 and \$200. You will note that only in the case of a salary of \$180 will the deduction be exactly 20% of the amount above the exemption; that for the salaries between \$160 and \$179 the amount withheld will be greater than 20%, and for the salaries between \$181 and \$200, less than 20%. This is inevitable under the bracket system of taxation, and if there is any difference in your case the adjustment is to be made in your tax report next March.

Certain other features of the law are mentioned below for your information:

**Declaration of Estimated Tax.** On or before September 15 you will have to file with the Collector of Internal Revenue a Declaration of Estimated Tax for 1943, if you expect to have this year, or had last year, an income from wages of over \$2700 if single or \$3500 if married, or if you had last year, or expect to have this year, an income from sources other than wages of \$100 or more, and total income in excess of your personal exemptions. Any tax due under this Declaration must be paid in equal installments on September 15 and December 15.

Any tax on your 1942 income which you paid before June 15, 1943, is considered to be payments on your 1943 income tax, and that amount therefore is to be deducted from your 1943 estimated tax.

Any errors made in your Declaration of estimated tax are to be corrected in the actual tax return which you will file on or before next March 15. Any underpayment of tax is to be made up by you; for any overpayment the Government will give you a credit against future taxes.

**Tax Cancellation.** The new law cancels in full the 1942 tax liabilities of all persons whose tax for 1942 was not more than \$50; cancels a flat \$50 in the case of those whose tax was between \$50 and \$66.67; and cancels 75% of the tax in the case of those whose total tax was above \$66.67. The remainder of the tax is payable one half March 15, 1944, and one half March 15, 1945. However, if a person's tax on his 1943 income is less than the tax on his 1942 income, the cancellation applies to the 1943 tax, and the entire last year's tax must be paid.

**Victory Tax.** The new law does not eliminate the Victory Tax which you have been paying since January. The Victory Tax remains in effect, and of the Withholding Tax, 17% applies to Income Tax and 3% to the Victory Tax. However the Victory Tax assessment actually remains at 5%, although only 3% will be withheld starting with July. The difference is to be made up by you when you make your annual Victory Tax report.

In case a person is subject only to the Victory Tax, the withholding rate will be only 3%. This situation will occur where the wages are less than the Income Tax exemption but higher than the Victory Tax exemption.

If in any case the number of dependents is in excess of the largest number of dependents shown above, the amount of the tax to be withheld shall be the applicable figure in the last column reduced to the following extent for each dependent:

If the payroll period is monthly .....\$5.20  
If the payroll period is daily or miscellaneous ..... .15

In no case, however, shall the amount withheld, regardless of the number of dependents, be less than 3% of the amount by which the average wage in the bracket in which the wages fall exceeds the exemption allowed for the purpose of the Victory tax.

A bunch of us fellows just scrimmage continually. It's rather haphazardous, but very enjoyable. If "Spranky" is still there, tell him and any of the other boys that know "hello" for me. Oh yes, above all tell Dean "hello" for me, and tell him I could really beat the dickens out of him now in handball. Of course, he never could give me much of a battle. Tell him that and I bet it will get a rise out of him.

UNITED STATES NAVY

July 17, 1943

Dear "Doc",

I received the "Jayhawk Rebounds" yesterday. I might say, I sure appreciated; it rather built up my morale a little, don't you know. It makes a fellow feel pretty good when he knows what the other fellows are doing right along.

The navy life is all they say it is. I'm taking it easy right now because I just took my typhoid and tetanus shots and the arm is a little stiff. I've made a lot of new friends since I've been here, but that is easy to do in the navy. I'm still rooming with my old roommate from K.M., Pete Teichgraber. We sure were surprised when we found out that we were roommates.

As for studying, I'm doing more than I ever dreamed that Paul Turner would do in his life. Everyone in the program is taking 19 hrs. I'm taking everything that they already had planned for me. My courses are: Physics - 4 hrs, Abnormal Psychology<sup>3</sup>, Medieval and Modern European History<sup>3</sup>, Naval Org. - 3 hrs, Naval P.E. - 2 hrs, Engineering Drawing - 2 hrs, Org. and Adm. of Intramural Sports - 1 hr, and Org. and Adm. of Athletics - 3 hrs. The latter course is the theory of baseball. Along with the navy routine the going is tough as you can see. Physics is the only subject bothering me so far. I just can't get that material to soak through my thick skull. I'm putting up a good fight; I'm planning on winning, too.



Say "Doc", I turned my Christmas travel brochure into your office about two weeks before school was out. I had every day written up except for the last two, but those two days would be the same as the other fellows, I hope you find my brochure; because I was sure looking forward to have my mother receive it next Christmas.

We have two hours of exercise, five days a week and one hour on Saturday. Week-end liberty lasts from 3:30 P.M. Sat. till 6:15 P.M. Sunday. After you go through this schedule up here, you are sure ready for that liberty. My uniform will be worn for the first time tonight. I just received my shoes and that's all I lacked; so you see it won't be long until I really find out what type of sailor I will look like. I'm sure anxious to find out.

Tell everyone in the phys. ed. department "hello" for me and any of my other friends that might still be there.

I suppose you have started basketball practice now. I hope you have a good crop of young boys to work with. If not, I know they'll be when you are finished with them. We averaged about an hour a day of basketball since we've been here. Usually a group of navy men play a group from the marines, but the navy has won every play so far, and I sure hope our luck holds out.

I will be here for four months if I struggle through physics alright; then I will go to midshipman's school.

It's time for parade drill, so I'll have to close and mail this letter.

Thanks again for the "Jayhawk Rebounds". I will be looking forward to your next report.




Dear Phog :

Dear Sir:

It has been some time since I received your kind letter with information concerning activities on the hill with football and basketball schedules.

It has given me pleasure to follow the fortunes of another splendid team of yours. I only wish I could have seen it in action.

I was sorry to see the team break up before the NCAA play-offs because I believe it was in the cards for a national championship for your splendid bunch of boys -- but of course the war comes first. I only hope it will be possible for you to get Charlie Black, Otto Schnellbacher, Ray Evans and the others back together when this is over.

I had a particular interest in the team because of "Schnell". I followed "Schnell's" career through his junior and senior years at Sublette while I was sports editor on the Garden City Daily Telegram - 30 miles from Sublette.

I suspect I saw Otto in some 20 of his high school games and was of the opinion he was the best high school player I ever had watched, with the possible exception of Gerald Tucker, and all Tucker had on him was size.



I was a good friend of Otto's older brother George, before Otto's ability began to be noticed.

When he was a senior I twice drove the 200 miles to Hutchinson to see him and his team in action as they won the Class B championship. I watched Otto pour in 29 points in the final game as he set a tournament record of 84 points in the four games. I was proud to give Otto the publicity he deserved for his 17+ point average for his last two years in high school.

I felt I might have had some little part in his going to K. U. I wrote column after column following his graduation, when his high school principal believed he definitely was set to go to Oklahoma A and M, pointing out every argument I could think of him to go to school in Kansas -- and particularly K. U. where he would have a chance to play under the nation's greatest basketball coach.

I had to urge, naturally, he attend Garden City junior college, but that if he didn't do that, to pick a Kansas school -- and as strongly as I dared make it -- K. U.

I know that his decision to attend K. U. was based on your record and personality and the persuasive powers of Ed Hall, but I like to feel I might have had something to do with it.

His success has been very gratifying to me, since it bore out my opinion of his ability, but more because it tickled me to see a swell kid, who hasn't had an easy life of it, make good when the going was tough.

As far as I can remember his scoring mark in conference games is the highest ever made by a K. U. sophomore. What could he do as a senior?



I hope you will pardon my enthusiasm if it seems over-done -- but I have been sold on Otto for a long time.

I had my folks send me clippings of all the games from the Times.

Included among them was the story of how you had so justly been picked as the No. 1 basketball coach of all time. It was no surprise to me, I had been convinced of it since I started listening to broadcasts of K. U. games in the days of Tus Acherman and Al Peterson.

Then, too, I was interested to see the article in "Sporting News" with pictures of you, Evans and Otto.

No, Sr. Allen, I'm not a lieutenant, just a buck sergeant. I have no desire to be a "90-day wonder". I'd rather be doing my part as one of the crowd although I think I could qualify for Officers' training. The idea of trying to lead a group of men after 90 days training when they would know a lot more about their jobs than I just doesn't appeal to me.


