
My Dear Phog:



I am writing you in regard to some arm trouble that one of the pitchers on our ball team is having.


The player's name is Rufus Meadows and he is one of the finest fellows I have ever had the pleasure of playing ball with. He seems to be having a great deal of difficulty with his arm. The main trouble seems to be when he throws a fast ball or a screw ball. He says it doesn't hurt at all when he throws a curve. He suspects that he may have a chipped bone in the elbow, which is the location of his trouble apparently, and had in mind having it operated on.
