We invite you to come out, get acquainted, and enjoy yourselves.



Outstanding Coach Replaces DeGroot

Henry Shenk, one of the outstanding men in physical education in Kansas, comes to the University this fall to replace E. B. DeGroot as assistant professor in the department of physical education.

DeGroot recently accepted a position as director of physical education in the 4th Air Corps at Sierra Madre, Calif.

For more than ten years Shenk's basketball, football, and track teams at Junction City have monopolized their league. He is past president of the Kansas Health and Physical Education Association, and also of the Kansas High School Coaches Association.

Besides being an outstanding student, Shenk earned a varsity football letter here. In 1926, in the annual Missouri-Kansas football game, he caught a 35-yard pass from Barrett Hamilton, and ran 45 yards for the touchdown that upset a powerful Tiger eleven, 14 to 7.

He received his B. S. in physical education from the University, and last summer completed work for his master's degree at the University of Wisconsin.

Shenk will supervise practice teaching in Oread Training school, and will also supervise their athletics. In the department of physical education he will teach history and principles of physical education, track, remedial physical examinations. He will also supervise equitation.

The newly-appointed staff member will devote his entire time in the physical education department, and will undertake no coaching duties.

Mr. and Mrs. Shenk and daughter will move to Lawrence August 1, and will live at 1235 Kentucky.

Huskers Trip Tigers Again

For the second time this season the Huskers defeated the Tigers in a game that featured 45 hits. Both teams, playing without a full roster, ran the score to 18 to 16.

Wolgast smashed out a home run as one of his three hits. Also getting three hits for the Tigers were Pitts, Zerger, Coulson, and Eiffert. Wagner hit five times out of six times up while Massare and Barlow hit four times each.

The Jayhawkers found the Sooners off form to defeat them 12 to 1.

Powell, Jayhawker second sacker, had a perfect day at bat with three hits. Malmgren, star outfielder for the Jayhawkers, had two hits and two walks out of four trips to the plate for another perfect record.
