The left wing prevents a pass from going out of bounds by using the rounded side of her stick. The ball rebounds to the stick of the opposing right halfback.

At a center bully, the blue right inner crosses the line just before the completion of the bully. The red center forward obtains possession of the ball.

The wing taking a long corner hit stands with one foot outside the field of play.

A long hit up the alley is made and a halfback cuts across the path of the opposing wing, breaking the forward's stride while she is still too far from the ball to reach it. No personal contact occurs.

Player uses push pass on a free hit taken from edge of striking circle.

A player outside the striking circle does not interpose any part of her body between her opponent and the ball, but by using a reversed stick, she prevents her opponent's stick from touching the ball.

Dear Dean Schwegler:

I am listing the activities that our group; namely, the Community Recreation Class, either sponsored or augmented last summer session:

July 19 - All-school picnic.

This all-school picnic assembled on the quadrangle. The meals were served for 35¢ and Miss Zipple from the Cafeteria furnished the food. Paper plates and cups, etc. were furnished by Miss Zipple. The youngsters were served at half price. We had 175 at the picnic dinner. Plays and games were arranged for children of all ages. We had community singing after the eats. Just a good mixer.

Previously, these all-school picnics had been planned for Brown's Grove, but Brown's Grove is in such a disintegrated condition that it is impracticable. The chiggers and the litter made it untenable. Transportation was also a problem. We have all agreed that picnics on the quadrangle are more enjoyable, and too, we can use the gym for rest rooms for our people.

A drinking fountain over by the Fowler Shops will be an added attraction for next year. The grounds are lighted and after a meal the facilities for play are very convenient.

July 9 - Volleyball game.

In addition to all the other play facilities, a game of Volleyball was arranged between the faculty members and the graduate students on the Hill against a down town group, comprising George Docking and some of the other merchants. This was played out-of-doors. It merely added to the breaking down of the home town vs. Kansas idea.

July 23 - Summer session dance.

A summer session dance was held in the Union Ballroom with a 12-piece orchestra.

When the evenings are terrifically hot we plan to close the road between the Anatomy Building and our quadrangle and sprinkle meal on the roadway. Last year we used a radio and loud speaker with records. For next year we believe that we have it worked out so that on cool evenings we switch to the Ballroom and on warm evenings we go to the street with corn meal. The dance is one evening each week. Monday evening generally being the best time.

July 25 - Steak fry on quadrangle.

Professors F.O. Russell and Guy Smith fried steaks and this time we made our own coffee and fixed and prepared our own food and served it for 35%. Everything that could be had on a steak fry was had at this so-called farewell picnic. Large grills were used in frying the steak and everybody who attended voted Chefs Russell and Smith the best. Many people came from out of town. Dr. Don Carlos Peete, his wife and children drove down from Kansas City and a great many faculty members attended this steak fry.

Playground.

Our playground was open every evening from 7:00 to 9:00 with the exception of Saturday and Sunday.

Softball league.

We carried through the entire season a six-team softball league, each team having about 13 players on it. Most of these men who played were graduate students and they found these games on Monday, Wednesday and Friday necessary adjuncts in keeping more physically fit and mentally alert for the summer's grind.

This league has been in full swing three years, and if anything, it was more popular this year than last. We arranged to have the swimming pool open immediately after the games so that the players could have a plunge in the pool. In fact, the men's afternoons were so allocated that the men who did not play softball and wanted only the swimming, they could indulge in that. It works very nicely in the scheme of things by having the men's afternoons the same afternoons that the softball games are played.

Swimming pool.

As stated above, the pool was open for both men and women; men three afternoons a week and women three afternoons a week. The co-recreational splash was held twice a week in the evenings, and it was a great success.

Each year the colored people have had one or two co-recreational splashes, and what a splash they make!

Basketball.

On August 1, a basketball game was played under the new rules. In our Advanced Basketball course we had a great number of very capable coaches studying the game and we used these players to demonstrate the new rules of the game. The game was largely attended and greatly enjoyed.

Folk Dancing.

We used the band platform for teaching folk dancing to the little tots. We used a loud speaker with victrola music and the piano. It was a great success. Many mothers came to give the children the benefit of the training. Miss Dorothy Garrett, one of the students in the School of Fine Arts, assisted in this work.

Community Sing.

At each one of our all-school picnics and steak fries, we had community singing lead by Miss Oliver of the School of Fine Arts.

Plays and skits.

We used our class in Community Recreation to put on skits and plays, using the band platform as our stage. Two years ago Mr. Allen Crafton helped us by having his advanced students drill our Community Recreation class. We put on three one-act plays which were greatly enjoyed by a large audience seated in folding chairs between the bandstand and the main drive of the University.

Archery.

We not only permitted a great number of young people to arch, but bows in the rough were purchased and Mr. Earnest Davis, a graduate of Goshen College, Goshen, Indiana, who took graduate work here this summer, assumed the role of teaching these boys how to make their bows and arrows. It was an excellent project and much excellent work was accomplished. We are planning to use Mr. Davis again this summer with a greatly enlarged activity.

Recreation for Bankers Convention and for Reading Institute.

We have a service here in our Department whereby we loan play equipment to any department which desires the same for picnics or recreational gatherings. We even go to the point of providing someone to supervise such activities provided there is no one in said department who could do the same. We also provide play facilities for equipment for group visitors to the campus such as the Bankers Convention or the Reading Institute, or for such out-of-town groups which have University affiliations that may desire the playground opened before the usual time or the time extended after the usual closing date.

Out of this list of activities, I am very sure that you and your committee can select the outstanding and beneficial activities of the summer session.

TIME IS THE DAWN OF ANOTHER DAY -- ANY OLD DAY

OPENING CURTAIN ... TWO PERSONS WALK APART FROM THE CENTER
OF THE STAGE

ACTION ... The wind is blowing the "Fog" from the scene.

Miss _____ blows at Dr. "Fog" Allen and he leaves
the stage going off to one side, with the wind following.

ENTER THE "KING" ... The King goes to the front of the stage and
looks left and right. Then he looks up and down very
cautiously. The king is very impatient. He paces left
and right two times. He says his lines, "Where, oh where,
what, oh what, will I do? I must find the cup of youth!
If only the Queen could be here to help me and advise."
The King continues to pace left and right.

ENTER THE "QUEEN" ... The Queen comes front stage, falls in step behind
the "King" and says in a worshipful voice, "Oh my King what is
it that bothers thee?" King stops walking and the Queen bumps
into the King. They give each other a dirty look!

THE KING GROULES ... "I'm getting old, I want to find the cup of
youth." He crosses his arms and scouls at the audience.

THE QUEEN TURNS TO KING AND SAYS ... "My great King does this cup give
you the strength of youth again? If you drink from it?"

THE KING TURNS TO THE QUEEN AND SAYS ... "Yea, my love, to be a young
man again and to see you as my lovely maiden, but the wise men
say that those who do not drink of the cup of youth will die."

THE KING'S BEAUTIFUL DAUGHTER ENTERS ... She stops, looks at her parents and advances to the front of the stage and asks, "What, my beloved parents is the trouble?"

THE QUEEN SAYS ... "My fair one, the wise men say all will die unless the cup of youth is found. Oh, my poor child, what shall we do?"

THE KING CRIES OUT AS HE TURNS TO HIS DAUGHTER ... "I'll offer my fair one here to the brave man that can bring to me the cup of youth. The king shouts, "Bring out the captain of the guards, he can find me the man who will do this deed!"

ENTER THE CAPTAIN OF THE GUARDS, CARRYING A BROOM ... The captain says, "I'll sweep the kingdom clean so I can find the cup of youth." Beats himself on the chest and coughs over the effect of the blow.

THE KING SAYS ... "My captain" and the King exits on left stage and pats him on the back.

THE QUEEN SAYS ... "My captain" and she exits on right, throwing him a kiss.

THE FAIR DAUGHTER SAYS ... "Nuts to you" and she exits on left stage, head high and trips when half off stage.

THE HERO ARRIVES ... and comes to the front of the stage and slaps the captain on the back. Then he says, "I'll find the cup of youth." Then the hero turns and faces the audience and folds his arms.

THE CAPTAIN TURNS ... and slaps the hero on the back and says, "I'll find the cup of youth" and folds his arms and faces the audience.

THEN THE HERO TURNS ... and slaps the captain on the back and says,

"No, no, I shall find the cup of youth."

THEN ENTERS A BEAUTIFUL DAUGHTER AND A JEALOUS DAUGHTER...

The beautiful daughter says, "My hero, wilt thou go search for the cup of youth?"

THEN THE JEALOUS DAUGHTER SAYS TO THE CAPTAIN ... "Wilt thou also go search for the cup of youth?"

THREE DAYS GO BY

ACTION ... The wind is blowing the "Fog" from the scene.

Miss _____ blows at Dr. ^{PHOS}"Fog" Allen and he leaves the stage, going off to one side, with the wind following.

ENTER THE KING ... The King goes to the front of the stage and looks left and right. Then he looks up and down very cautiously. The King is very impatient. He paces left and right two times. He reads his lines, "Where, oh where, what, oh what, will I do?" I must have the cup of youth! Within 5 minutes we all die. If only the Queen could be here to help me and advise." The King continues to pace left and right.

THE KING GROWLES ... "Within 5 minutes we die. I must have the cup of youth." He crosses his arms and scowls at the audience.

THE QUEEN TURNS TO KING AND SAYS, ... "My great King, does this mean that we all die if we don't drink from it?"

THE KING TURNS TO THE QUEEN AND SAYS ... "Yea, my love, to be a young man again and to see you as my lovely maiden. But the wise men say that those who do not drink of the cup of youth will die."

THE KING'S BEAUTIFUL DAUGHTER ENTERS ... she stops, looks at her parents and advances to the front of the stage and asks, "What, my beloved parents is the trouble?"

THE QUEEN SAYS ... "My fair one, we will all die unless the cup of youth is found. Oh my poor, poor child, what shall we do?"

THE KING CRIES OUT AS HE TURNS TO HIS DAUGHTER, ... "I'll never die an old man." He takes out a dagger, stabs himself, lays on the floor and says, "Goodbye my love." Turns and waves to the Queen.

THEN THE QUEEN CRIES OUT, RUNS OVER, TAKES THE DAGGER AND CRIES ... "My King my King, to die with thee." She stabs herself and falls on the King. She says, "Goodbye, my child."

THE BEAUTIFUL DAUGHTER ... Cries out, "Oh, my great parents, I cannot let these die alone, I too must die with thee." She rushes over to the Queen who hands her the dagger and the daughter kills herself.

ENTER THE JEALOUS DAUGHTER ... She walks around the pile of of bodies and smells, then she says, "Well, they ain't been dead very long. And the script says to kill myself too so I guess I'll have to do it." The beautiful daughter hands her the dagger and lies down again, and the Jealous daughter kills herself too.

ENTER THE CAPTAIN AND THE HERO ... They have between them the cup of youth ... They walk around the pile of bodies, and bump into each other as they go to the front of the stage.

THE HERO SAYS ... "We are late and all is lost, so I too must to be
with my lover, he hands the script to the captain and
he too kills himself.

THE CAPTAIN TURNS TO THE PILE OF BODIES AND SAYS ... "Oh, just to be
with my King again, and serve him well. So I too must
kill myself." He then stabs himself.

(Then the Fog again covers the scene and the curtains close)

SUGGESTIONS FOR A CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

ON THE PLAYGROUND

It is very important and necessary that the children be provided for and well taken care of on the playground. However, they should not monopolize the equipment and play space which is more suitable for adults. Many times this summer adults have remarked that they would like to play a game of shuffleboard or badminton or croquet but they "hated to run the children off."

The nights when the children were amused on the band platform with the program of singing, and folk dancing, there were more fathers and mothers in attendance and it was also possible for these adults to use the play equipment. If there could be a well worked-out program of low-organized games for the younger children every evening for an hour or so, the children would be amused and the adults who came with these children would have a chance to play and enjoy themselves also.

Someone in the community recreation class could plan and carry out such a program. Such games as dodge ball, end ball, stealing sticks, long base, last couple out, prisoner's base, three deep, tag games and many others could be used, as well as many different kinds of relay races. Rope jumping, a hop scotch tournament, marbles, stunts and other activities could be introduced. Certain shuffleboard courts and croquet areas could be reserved especially for the children, which they could take turns using. Such a program could be carried out at the east end of the quadrangle. A few additional lights could be installed here, and benches placed for the fond parents who want to watch.


