## *Conferences*

It is hoped that those who attend the institute will utilize the conference periods by scheduling appointments either as individuals or as small groups with the institute leaders. Any special problems which you may desire to have discussed can receive attention by making an appointment with the leaders.

## *Demonstrations*

During the week there will be many types of demonstrations. A daily program will be mimeographed during the institute which will indicate the nature of the demonstrations carried on at the 2 o'clock hour. These demonstrations will be with school children and will involve both diagnostic and instructional methods.

## *Recreation*

Through the cooperation of the Physical Education Department recreational facilities of the University will be available daily north of the Fowler Shops building. These facilities have been very popular with the summer school students, and we are sure that you will enjoy them. The recreational activities will continue from 4:30 to 8:00 p.m.

## *Visual Education*

Since one of the major problems in teaching reading is the development of the child's background of experience, motion pictures and sound films have come to be regarded as essential aids in the teaching of reading. The Visual Educational Department, Fred S. Montgomery, Sec'y, has selected a series of films which can be very useful to teachers of reading. Each evening a set of pictures will be shown dealing with different levels of children's interests.



## *Housing Accommodations*

Facts regarding playground, Tuesday, June 27:

Dave Shirk: I came to the gymnasium at 4:30 intending to open up the playground for people in the Reading Institute if any desired to play. ### PHYSICAL EDUCATION

100. PRINCIPLES OF COMMUNITY RECREATION. Three hours credit. This course is planned for students interested in recreational leadership, in playgrounds, community and recreational organizations and activities of clubs, such as Camp Fire Girls, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, and in the organization, management and equipment of conducting social activities, games, play, etc., with adult groups in community recreation centers. Prerequisite, three hours of general sociology and ten hours of physical education. Required of all men majors, elective for women. 9:30-10:20. Allen.

10:30-11:20

200. THE THEORY AND PRACTICE OF ATHLETIC TRAINING. Three hours credit. Principles underlying the conditioning, nutrition, care and emergency treatment employed in the training of athletes. Prerequisites, 20 hours of physical education, and one five-hour course of anatomy or physiology. Allen.

300. SPECIAL PROBLEMS IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION. Three hours credit. This course provides graduate students an opportunity for individual or group study of special fields in physical education. Each student will present the results of his work in the form of class reports and term papers. Prerequisite, 20 hours of physical education. *Appt.* Elbel.

312. SEMINAR IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION. Three hours credit. An intensive study of the various phases of physical education. Full preparation and presentation of various subjects will be required. The selection of topics will be flexible enough so that any pressing problem of the group may be taken care of. The following is a tentative list of subjects to be discussed: posture, classification of students, noon hour physical education, intramural athletics, recreation and mental therapy, diet and physical education, athletic heart and circulation, and a hygienic physical education plant. *Appt.* Elbel.

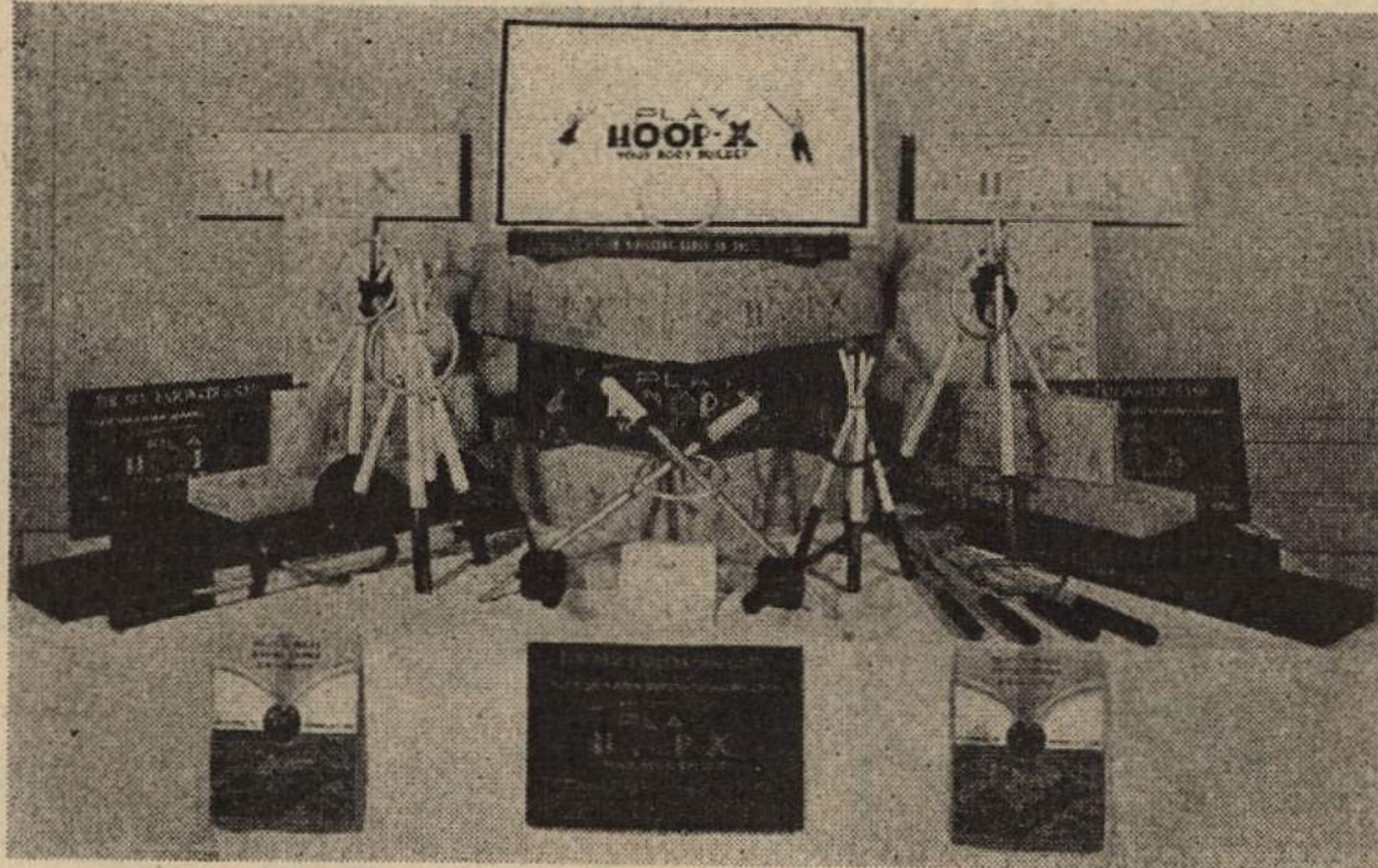

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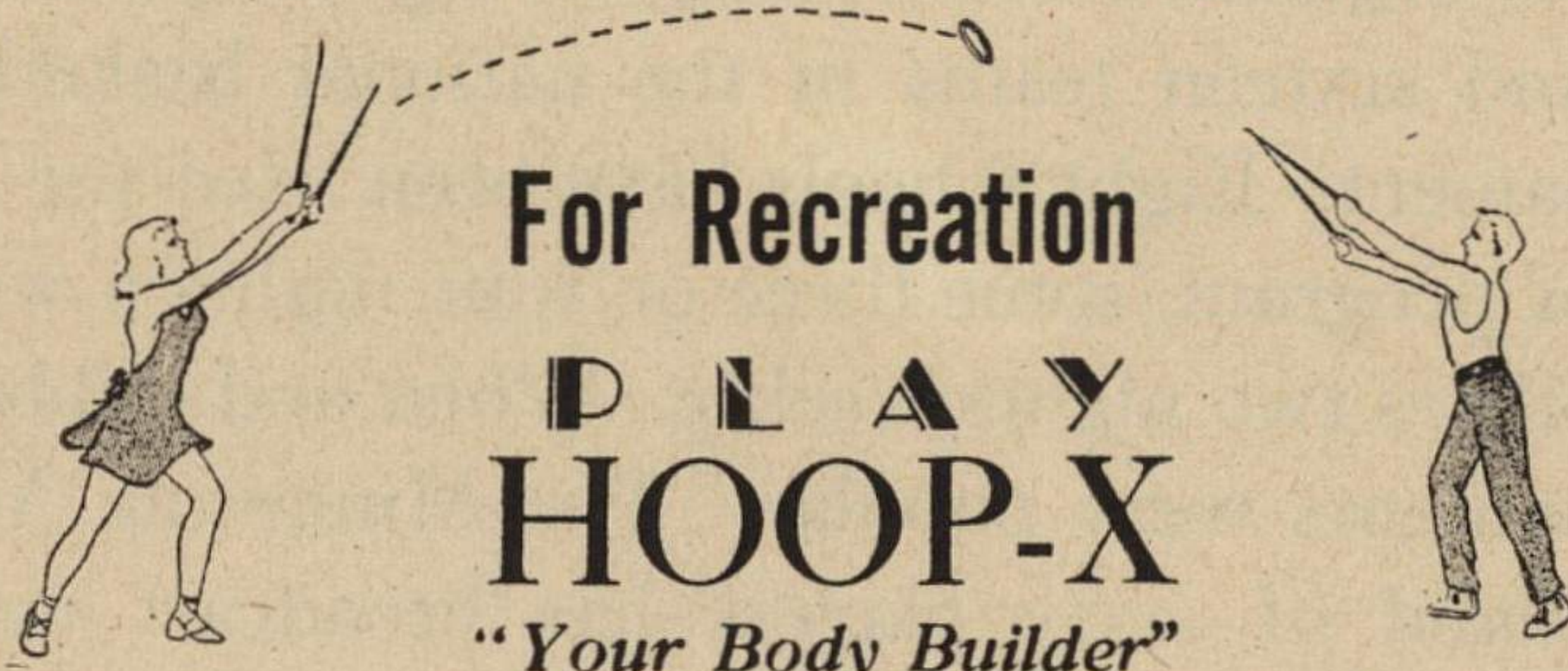


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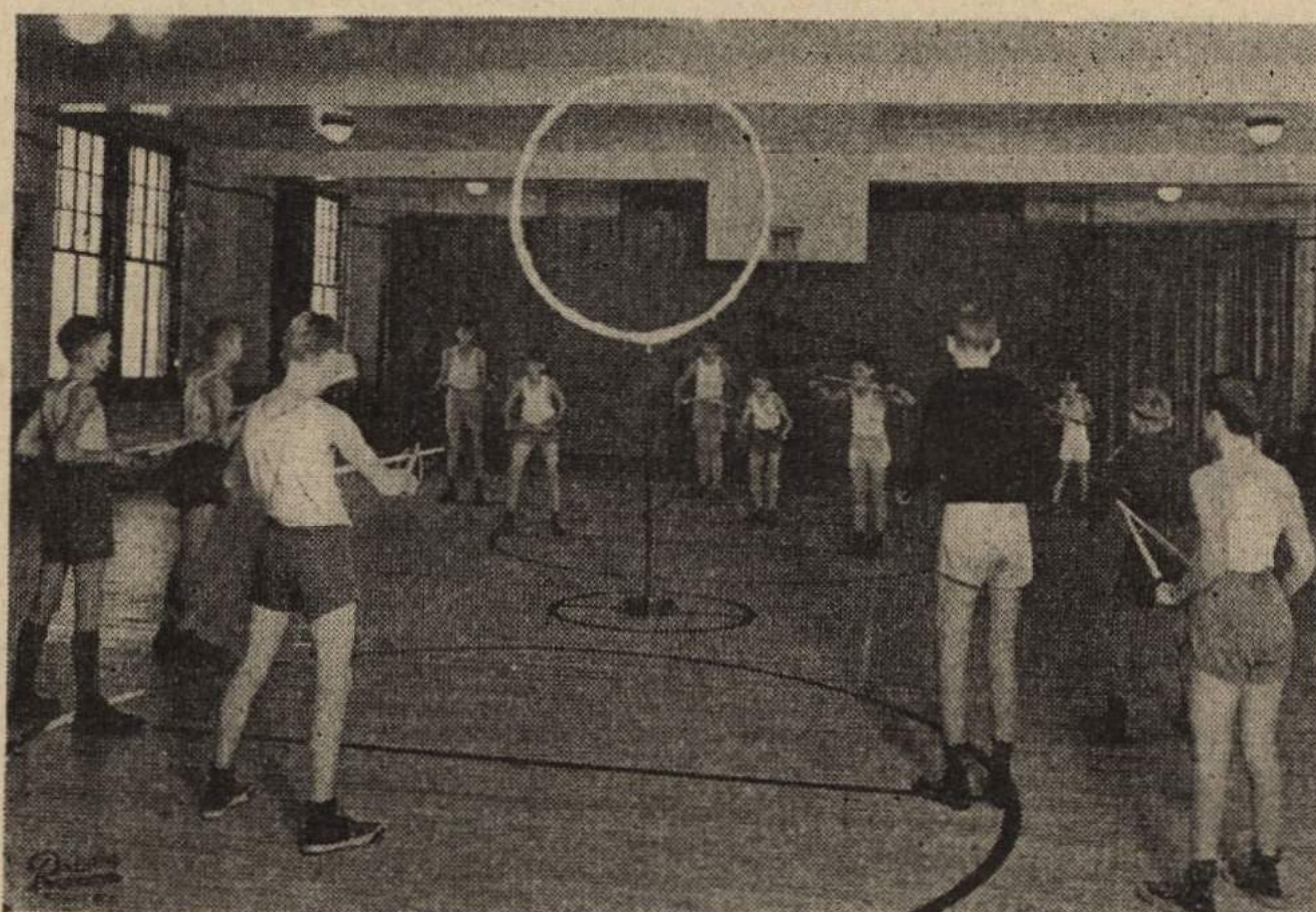
