The questionnaires which you requested us to send from this office have been sent, and I trust that the replies will be coming in to you before long.

Personally, I believe that in the present war situation we need something like this to stimulate us to, because there will be only a few persons taking part unless a change takes place to make them really congizant of what we are trying to do. We need some approach that we have not had in the past for these younger people.

I don't know just how this can be done, but frankly that strikes me as a very necessary thing. The national leaders perhaps should prescribe the dosages, but to me it is not apparent at the present time.



Dear Committee Member:

Replies to our letters and questionnaires are coming in daily. Although these come slowly, it is too early to judge the amount of response to this correspondence, as it would be Utopia to expect people to meet a deadline, a fact that I am sure you have all had occasion to verify! I do feel, however, that even without a response, the letters and questionnaires may start some thinking along these lines and arouse some interest.

To date, most of the replies are favorable for the formation of a National Student Section, increased student membership and attendance at conventions, etc. But a few have answered in the negative and the objections most frequently made are:

The ideas and plans we have set forth should not be undertaken in the present emergency.

(2) National membership for a student is not desirable or necessary---that should come after they are out in the field--state membership is sufficient now.

Attendance at national conventions is not desirable because.

The expense and distances are too great

(b) Students miss too many classes while away

(c) They do not get enough out of the meetings

I am wondering, if as a committee, we might set forth a statement of our reasons for each of the items that we are advocating, and send this out with the summaries which will be compiled from the answers to the various questionnaires. I would like to suggest that if you approve of this, you send me your reasons for belief in the following needs.

(1) Students to become members of the National Association Students to attend National Conventions whenever possible

Students to have a national, as well as, state and district section

The increased need for all this in the present state of war

Since you all agreed, with minor reservations, to the functions of the Committee, I know that you do approve of the above points. I will put your answers in the form of a statement from the Committee and will send it back to you for your final approval before asking you to send it to the various people whem we are contacting through the questionnaires.

Publicity for these student problems will be most helpful. May I suggest that you use your state and district news letters for articles on these topics and talks to professional (major) clubs and local, state, and district conventions.

I have not been able to find the time to answer each of your letters individually--perhaps I can do so, in person, at the convention. I am really looking forward to meeting many of you there. Until then, please know that your help is very appreciated.

## Report of the Committee

- A. Functions of the Committee.
  - I. Student Organization
    - 1. To initiate the organization of a National Student Section of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.
    - 2. To distribute to State and District Associations the plan of organization developed for the Student Section of the National Association with suggested adaptations for similar sections in these units.
  - II. Membership
    - 1. To stimulate and promote student membership in State and National Associations for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.
    - 2. To promote a carry-over of membership and participation in the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation after graduation.
  - III. Student Attendance at Conventions
    - 1. To stimulate increased attendance at State, District, and National Association Conventions by students majoring and minoring in health, physical education and recreation.
    - 2. To encourage the definite scheduling of Student Section Meetings by the various State and District Associations for Health, Physical Education and Recreation during their annual conferences.
    - 3. To plan the program for the Student Section meetings to be held in conjunction with the 1942 convention of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation in New Orleans.
    - 4. To sponsor definite plans for student participation in social activities scheduled in conjunction with Association conventions.
    - IV. Student Interest and Growth
      - 1. To encourage increased student participation in affairs of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, e.g., the promotion of a Student Section in the Journal\*, the motivation of student contributions to State, District, and National Association publications, etc.

- \* This project might entail an expense to the Association which is not feasible in these days of retrenchment. It is, however, of value and should be considered.
- 2. To motivate higher standards of professional growth and behavior on the part of the students planning to enter the field of health, physical education, and recreation.

## B. Organization of the Committee

The chairman of this committee wrote to each member, giving them the list of functions as outlined by the Board of Directors. Their suggestions and replies were tabulated and a summary sent to them. With few exceptions, approval of the functions was unanimous. In all cases a majority approval was received.

It was decided to contact the following sources for ideas on formation of a student section, plans for increased student membership, attendance at conventions, and ideas for stimulating student interest in the A.A.H.P.E.R..

- (a) Directors of physical education for men and women in all teacher education institutions offering a major or minor in physical education
- (b) District presidents of A.A.H.P.E.R.

(c) State presidents of A.A.H.P.E.R.

(In addition, a letter from the acting student chairman for the New Orleans Convention, was sent to the president of the professional physical education club in each of the above institutions.)

The replies to these questionnaires were tabulated and sent back to the groups that had answered the questionnaires.

Both the questionnaires and the replies to them were sent out by the committee members to the people in their district who were to be contacted. Each of the two committee members in each district was allotted a certain number of people to contact. In order to facilitate distribution of these questionnaires each committee member was sent.

(a) A list of teacher education institutions offering a major or minor

in our field.

(b) A list of state presidents

Report on questionnaires.

Approximately 275 institutions were contacted. 40 replies were received. Both colleges and universities replied. Coeducational institutions and womens colleges were represented. All districts of the A. A. H. P. E. R. answered the questionnaire. It is the opinion of the chairman of this committee that a wide enough sampling of viewpoints was received to make the summaries valuable. Both the questionnaires and the replies should serve as motivation to greater interest and action in student affairs. This may be true even in the case where replies were not received.

## C. Procedures and Accomplishments to date in the order of functions:

I. Student Organization

A. Organization of a national student section

1. Committee on student section approved of such a section.

2. Questionnaires sent to directors of all teacher education institutions offering a major or minor in health and physical

- education. Replies were received from every district. A big majority favored such a section.
- 3. Questionnaires sent to heads of professional clubs in each teacher education institution. Replies were as above.
- 4. Student program for New Orleans Convention is planned to discuss and act upon a national student section.
- B. To distribute the above plan to State and District Associations

  Because the committee felt that students should plan their

  national section, action upon this function must wait until after

  the New Orleans Convention. No doubt the national student section

  will take this function as one of their projects in the future.

#### II. Student Membership

- A. To stimulate and promote student membership
  - 1. By questionnaires on membership and returned summaries to the groups mentioned earlier in this report, an attempt was made to fulfill this function.
- B. To promote a carry-over of membership
  - 1. The Committee on Student Section felt this could best be effected if interest in the A.A.H.P.E.R. were kept alive during the students undergraduate days.
  - 2. The suggestion was made that each teacher education institution could contact its graduates concerning membership or send their names and addresses to a state membership chairman.

#### III. Student Attendance at Conventions

- A. To stimulate increased attendance etc. (on this problem)
  - 1. Questionnaires and summaries of the answers were sent to all teacher education institutions.
  - 2. Through the acting student chairmen for the New Orleans Convention plans for interesting social and professional meetings were set-up. All teacher education institutions were contacted for ideas. Each district of the A.A.H.P.E.R. was asked to send two delegates to participate in the student panel.
  - 3. Committee members were urged to give publicity to conventions (state, district, and national) through talks, and also through articles, the state and district newsletters. The Journal was used for national news.
  - 4. Section chairmen for the National Convention were written and asked to include students on their program wherever this was feasible.
  - 5. Student rates were secured at hotels for the National Convention. Colleges were urged to send delegates.
  - 6. The Student Chairman wrote each district president and asked that publicity be given to the National Convention at the district convention.
- B. To encourage the definite scheduling of student section meetings by state and district associations
  - 1. Questionnaires and replies were sent to state and district presidents.
- C. To plan the program for the student section meetings
  The program was planned by the acting student chairman with the faculty guidance of the chairman of the Committee on Student Section. (See April Journal, 1942 Convention meetings).

All teacher education institutions were contacted for suggestions, convention committee personnel, etc.

D. To sponsor definite plans for student participation in social activities at the National Convention

This was done in conjunction with the directly above.

## IV. Student Interest and Growth

A. Increased student participation in A.A.H.P.E.R.

1. All of the items mentioned above should be effective in the promotion of this.

2. A student section in the Journal was initiated through the cooperation of the editors of this publication.

3. Plans underway to organize a national student section and thus make them really active in Association affairs.

B. To motivate higher standards of professional growth, etc.

The Committee felt that this would come about best through institutions themselves raising their standards and stimulating the interest of students in their profession. In reply to the questionnaires, the answer has been again and again to have the faculty alert and interested in all professional matters and students will follow.

## D. Recommendations of Committee to the Board of Directors

Throughout the work of this Committee the consensus of opinion has been that in order to have students actively interested in the A.A.H.P.E.R. the students themselves must take an active part. With the organization of a National Student Section at the coming convention this idea becomes a reality. The functions of this Committee can to a great extent be carried on by them. With the guidance of the faculty member who sponsors this section, the students can proceed with the reports and summaries made by this Committee when these are made available to them at that time. The files of this Committee will be at the disposal of the Board of Directors.
