The office of The Surgeon General is interested in securios as soon as possible the names of two groups of men.

- educators, who are now in the Army are needed for officers in the Reconditioning Program of this office. We could use the names of a few civilians of like caliber who, in the beginning, would be willing to accept commissions of not higher than captain. These men should possess the following qualifications:
 - 1. They should be graduates in physical education.
 - 2. They should be well grounded in the basic biological sciences, especially anatomy, kinesiology and physiology of exercise.
 - 3. They should he men of good leadership.
 - 4. They should be good administrators.
 - 5. They should be men of a quality that would be commonsurate with a civilian salary of \$2800.
- 2. We are also in need of the names of enlisted men who have majored in physical education, have leadership, are intelligent, and have some teaching experience. Men who have had two or three years of college are acceptable if the qualifications are otherwise good. They must be men of some maturity we cannot use twenty year-olds unless they are otherwise exceptionally mature.

We would appreciate it very much if you would send us at your very earliest convenience names of such men, with a short resume of their qualifications.

For men now in the Army, if possible, give mank and address; If you do not know the address, give the last Army address you have, or even the home address. If possible, give the organization to which he is attached. The work for which these men are desired is very important and urgent, hence my request for a very early reply. Would you please send it air mail?

Please excuse the duplicated letter; the numbers to whom we are sending this communication and its urgency prevent personal typing.





I had a good laugh on that paragraph telling of the notorious phone call Engleman made from Dr Peete's home in KC. Don't think I'll ever forget it. Suppose Howard is busy these days teaching little Howard how to throw a ball up and make it balance on a door ledge. If you write him please give him my regards.

A little better than fourteen momths has passed since I reached England. With Anglo-American relations emphasized the way they are I even find myself joining in a cup of tea occasionally plus a few other conventions we've had to get used to such as driving on the left side of the road, their monetary system, riding a bicycle, etc. It isn't such a bad place and we get along

all right.

In April I was lucky enough to get a few days leave and visited Scotland. Spent a day or two in Edinburgh, Aberdeen, and Stirling. It's a very beau-

tiful country and the people are swell to the Yanks.

Just recently we were honored to have the King, Queen, and Princess Elizabeth visit our base. They were accompanied by Lt Gen Doolittle and others so with rank like that around I didn't have a chance to talk to them but did see them from about ten feet away.

So far I haven't run across very many Jayhawkers. There are three others with me here but I don't know if you know them--Capt Karl Becker, base photo officer, Lt Robert Anderson (no relation!), communications officer, and Lt Vincent Tharp, squadron engineering. I'm still C.O. of this outfit (was two years last month) and additional duties as base quartermaster. Since D-day we've been plenty busy but time goes faster that way and helps speed the day when we can return back to good ole Kansas.

The folks told of your being at Rosedale for the banquet in May and certainly enjoyed having you there. My brother Homer is at the University of Minnesota now in the ASTP. Dean is working for the Union Pacific RR in KC and

waiting to get his call from Uncle Sam sometime this fall.

As you know there isn't a great deal we can write about from an overseas address, but I did want to drop you a few lines anyhow to acknowledge the Rebounds, pass on a little news from this corner, and to hope that things are going well for you these days. So for now, all best wishes,






