We had an emergency situation here caused by the fact that Dr. Merchouse, who joined our department on September 1st, was called to active service in the Navy, and had to leave last Saturday, October 10th. We were able to secure a man from one of the larger Kansas high schools, and he is on the job this morning. His draft classification is 3-A at the present, but we do not know how long we will be able to keep him.

Most of the young fellows are going to be called to the service, and we will have to have men in our department above 50 years of age. This is, of course, a temporary appointment for the duration of the war, because we expect Dr. Elbel to return to us when he is released from the service.

I would like for you to tell me what salary you would come for - next semester or possibly next year. Our school closes this academic year on May 17th, and we are starting on a full twelve-menths program. Figure on a nine-menths basis, and let me hear from you. I had understood that you had had a little aidment with your stomach, but I don't believe that would bether you much in your work here. I am teaching a full schedule and ceaching at night, and with 57 summers on my head I still think I can do it.

I am enclosing a printed schedule of our wartime physical conditioning courses, so that you will know semething of our set-up here this year. We are developing a leaders' corps among our physical education majors and athletes to assist us with these classes. Many believe that this is the last year of intercellegiate football at the University, and for that reason our intramural program in all sports may be very strong mext year.

I am telling you these things to give you a background of our program here and the pessibilities for next year. Let me hear from you at your early convenience.

Dear Dr. Andes:

Floyd Santner has presented to me your letter in regard to his classes in Physical Cenditioning. The government insisted that all students who are registered for Selective Service or are members of the various enlisted reserve services of the armed forces of the United States be required to take conditioning exercises. The minimum here at the University of Kansas is three hours a week, while at most institutions the minimum is five hours a week. Due to our limited facilities were able to offer only the three-hour week schedule.

The Department of Physical Education has no authority to exempt anyone from these classes. The University Senate and the Chanceller have appointed a Committee on Exemptions from Physical Conditioning, and this committee informs us when any student has been exempt. Every student has a health examination where they are classified A, B, C or D. The hospital usually recommends that students classified C or D, because of some physical disability, be exempted from the conditioning course, and the Exemption Committee generally accepts their recommendation.

I assure you that if there is any possible way that I can cooperate with you without violating the Senate ruling I will be glad to do it. The class schedule is not so difficult but what a fellow carrying the usual lead has ample time to exercise three times a week for a one hour period.
