Dear George:

I am enclosing the back of my A ration book, duly signed, with the inspection by the Standard Oil man, Percival, at 9th and Vermont Street. I am also filling out the application for a B card. I have endeavored to make it perfectly plain in the application that I make three, four and sometimes five trips a day to the gymnasium.

In the morning I come up for classes at 7:30, 8:30 and 9:30, then at noon I go downtown or home for some committee meeting. In the afternoon I am back here and then in the evening I have intramurals. I am to conduct intramurals for the V-12 Navy program as well as the other service programs here which will require much travel from downtown to the office, and back home or back down town.

Then I have a great many committee meetings, such as the Salvation Army Executive Committee and Nursery Board, being chairman of that. I am on the Community Chest committee, I am also on the new Sunflower Nursery Committee, and I am also on the Deferment Committee here at the University which meets to pass on the students' academic deferments. Then I am called out to communities to speak in high schools and churches as a part of our conditioning and preparation work. I am also chairman of the Recreation Committee of the State Parent Teachers Association. This calls for addresses and appearances in and out of town.

Of course I do make a number of commencement addresses, as well as addresses before Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions and other classification clubs, and I travel on the busses and railroad as much as possible, but there are some towns, like Winchester, Lane and other small outlying towns that it is impossible to get to by the ordinary method of travel. It is part of our school work to carry on these meetings. For that reason I would appreciate a ration card B.


Dear Fog:

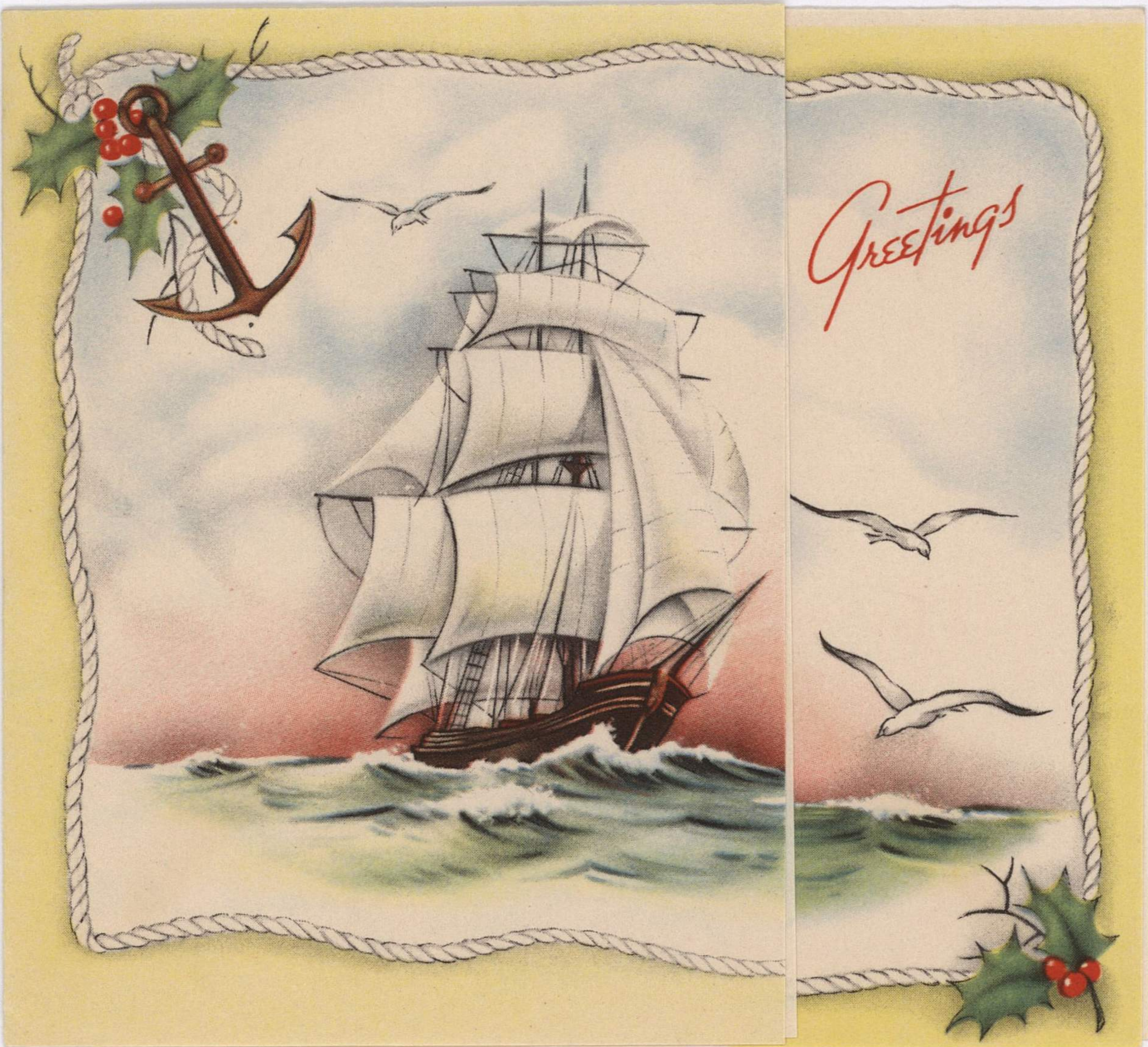

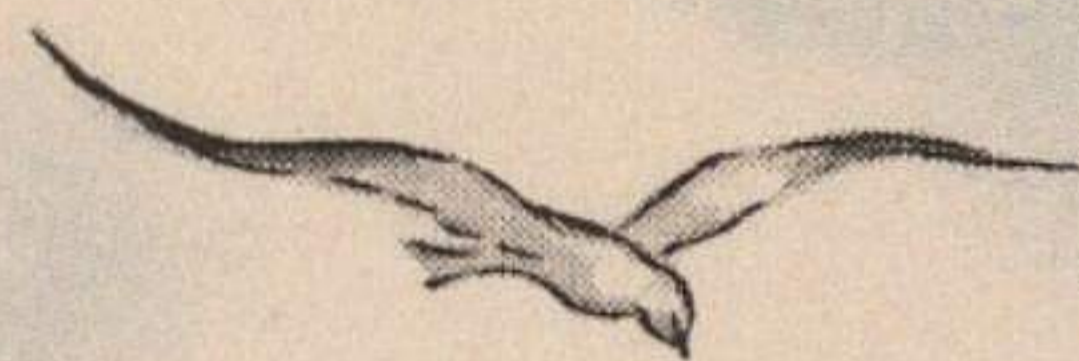

A special stockholders meeting is to be held at the club house for the purpose of amending Section Three of Article Six of the By-Laws relative to dues for social members, and to transact any other business pertinent to stockholders. Dear Dean Werner:

I regret that my presence at an important Rotary meeting this noon makes it impossible for me to attend your committee luncheon. Had I known it a little sooner I could have made arrangements, but under the circumstances it is impossible.

After much deliberation I am submitting to you my first choice as C. K., and my second choice is R. F. I would appreciate it if you would express my reasons for the first choice to the committee.

Doubtless all the members saw the picture of C. K. on the third page of the Kansas City Star yesterday morning. He is invalidated after a grueling campaign against the Japs. In presenting this young man's claim, may I state that his great desire was to see action and he enlisted in the Marines before graduation. He went to the Officers' Training School at Quantico and earned his commission as a second lieutenant. The admonition from his father to C. was "C., love your arms. They may be the means of saving your life." So from the beginning this boy knew that he was possibly sacrificing himself for others.

A mild-mannered, genteel, friendly chap is this boy. He is not the rough, tough fighting buckaroo, but he is very much of the opposite type. He comes from a long line of fine forbears, with University of Kansas background on both sides. Three generations of his people resided in Lawrence and he is a grandson of J. W. Jenkins.

In one letter to the folks back home he wrote, "I know definitely what I am fighting for. I am fighting for my mother and my sisters and for others who might have to face this thing if I did not." He has led his men in victorious campaign. Therefore, I feel that when we are selecting an Honor Man for this year certainly we should consider the patriotic and soldierly qualifications of this young man who has taken up the fight with the foe and is still carrying on. To me it would signalize our recognition of leadership and loyalty, courage and devotion in this very critical hour.




