

J. DONALD BUDGE - San Francisco, Tennis Player

Regarded generally as the outstanding amateur tennis player of the world. American singles champion and member of the Davis Cup Team. Almost single handed brought back the Davis Cup to America after ten years. Won Wimbleton singles, doubles and mixed doubles and is the only player in history to have accomplished this fete.

A true sportsman and gentleman. Modest and unassuming. Popular with younger players because of his willingness to help them.

His general demeanor on and off the tennis courts here and abroad have always resulted in favorable comment. He has been a big factor in promoting international good will between the United States and foreign countries.

His perseverance and courage were demonstrated in the inter zone final at Wimbleton when with the count at two sets all and Von Cram leading in the fifth set by four games to one, he won the match and enable America to challenge England for the cup.

He has upheld the amateur code in the face of flattering offers to turn professional.

His record as a sportsman has only been exceeded by his record as a competitor.

RALPH D. FLANAGAN - Miami Beach, Florida, Swimmer

Member of the 1936 Olympic Team and regarded as one of the world's greatest swimmers. Present national champion in the 440, 880 and mile free style events.

During his career has won eleven national championships and holds thirteen American records.

Has a pleasing personality and is exceedingly popular with his fellow swimmers. Always conducts himself in a manner which commands the respect of his teammates, competitors and the general public.

Is modest and unassuming and has been a good loser as well as a good winner.

Is a credit to American sport and has contributed much to the development of swimming in the United States and abroad.
