LICENSE RENEWAL LAW IN MISSOURI

Laws 1937, Page 188

Section 13521-A. Annual registration fee authorized—renewal mandatory—penalty for failure to renew.—All persons who are now or may hereafter be regularly registered and licensed to practice osteopathy shall, on or before the first day of November annually hereafter, renew his or her certificate of registration or license and pay a renewal fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) each year; *provided*, that satisfactory evidence is presented to the board that the said licensee in the year preceding the application for renewal attended at least one of the two-day educational programs as conducted by the Missouri Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons, or its equivalent as approved by the Missouri Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons. The Secretary of the State Board of Osteopathic Registration and Examination shall notify each person having a certificate of registration or license at least thirty (30) days prior to the due date of the renewal fee and give a receipt when the renewal fee is paid. Every person failing to renew his or her certificate or license within thirty (30) days after the same is due may have his or her certificate of registration or license restored only upon payment of a restoration fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each delinquent year in addition to the renewal fee. Any licensed osteopath failing to renew his or her certificate within three (3) years after the same is due may, in the discretion of the State Board of Osteopathic Registration and Examination, forfeit all rights under his or her license to practice osteopathy in this state. *Provided*, that the State Board of Osteopathic Registration and Examination, for the purpose of enforcing this provision and other provisions of Chapter 102, Revised Statutes of Missouri, 1929, shall be authorized and empowered to employ and pay for all clerical services whenever, in their opinion, the same is necessary.




My dear Dr. Allen:
