liss Durkel graduated from the University of Kansas in 1938, having majored in our department. For the past two years she has been teaching at Coffeyville. I have recently talked with Superintendent McParland, of Coffeyville, and he tells me that she has made a very excellent record there. The Wichita schools have offered her a position in their school system for next year, and naturally we are desirous of knowing soon in regard to the approval of her appointment here.

In 1926 when I was in search of a dance teacher for our department I went to Ariansas City and hired Hiss Elizabeth Dunkel, one of our graduates who was teaching there, an older sister of Hiss Catherine. Hiss Elizabeth Dunkel was rated as one of the ten outstanding dance teachers in the country. She resigned har position here a year ago to become married. I think Hiss Catherine has many of the capabilities possessed by her sister, and I predict for her an outstanding teaching career.

I have conferred with Miss Hoover and Miss Stapleton, of our women's department, and they both concur with me in this recommendation. I have asked that Miss Dunkel attend the University of Wisconsin this summer for some graduate work if it is at all possible. She is expecting to pursue work toward the Master's degree, and if arrangements can be made on this short notice she will go to Wisconsin.

Dear Chancellor Malott:

At a dinner meeting on May 27th of the sub-committee on Intramural Sports and Physical Recreation, of the Senate Committee on Athletics and Physical Recreation, the following members were present: Professor W. W. Davis, Dean F. T. Stockton, Mr. Karl Klooz, Miss Ruth Hoover, and Forrest C. Allen, chairman. I had previously had a conference with Dean R. A. Schwegler, chairman of the Ways and Means sub-committee, and discussed matters that were to be taken up at this meeting.

The following matters came up for discussion:

First, the physical fitness for the mass of students, considering the holocaust in Europe. Looking toward the consummation of this project, it was considered necessary that our intramural fields be improved for this larger program.

It was noted that an appropriation of \$550.00 was made by the Central Committee of the Student Activity Ticket for the completion of the work of leveling the west half of the intramural football field. This appropriation was unanimously approved by the Men's Student Council and the Women's Self Governing Association on May 2. This gift of \$550.00 by the students, I understand, was contingent upon a cooperative grading and work project by Mr. C. G. Bayles toward putting a storm sewer through the field, thereby reclaiming much valuable land lost by a winding and irregular ditch half-filled with debris, which when overflowed by storm waters, hampers play facilities for the students.

It was voted by the committee that the Chancellor be respectfully asked for a special maintenance sum of \$150.00 for the work of transferring the good sod from the west half of the intramural field to the east intramural field which has been graded. There has been no fund for the removal of this sod prior to the grading. The east half has been graded and seeded, but no grass grew due to torrential rains which washed much of the seed away and then a very dry, torrid summer which burned out the young grass roots which barely started. The level east half has been lost to the students for one year on account of no grass surface. When it is dry it is too dusty to play on, and when it is wet it is too muddy.

The west half is ungraded and very dangerous for play. Its rough, sharply sloping surface contributes definitely to serious injuries in touch football and even softball. Many sprains have been suffered by the students on account of its unfitness for play use.

east half, arrangements could be made with the fire department or with our University buildings and grounds department to run a hose to the newly sodded surface and thereby keep it alive during the transition period of growth.

Professor Davis discussed the biemmial report, and the committee felt that a winter skating rink project should be submitted, the skating rink to be on this level surface - the east half of the intramural field - with lights running down the south side of the hill to be controlled by a switch at the power plant. Also, a skining and coasting project on the north slope of Mount Oread was discussed, with lights placed at appropriate distances to afford the use of that area at night when the hills are covered with snow. A golf driving range south of the gymnasium, geology building and auditorium is also a desirable feature, as would be the development of an archery range and an improvement of the golf course.

These facilities would provide mass recreation and physical betterment for both sexes of the students at the University of Kansas.

Secondly, it was unanimously agreed by the committee that we should start on unit construction of concrete or sprayed asphalt tennis courts, as well as concrete handball courts. With the exception of the four courts which are used by the women south of the gymnasium, all of the courts on the campus have been constructed by the Athletic Association. The handball courts were also constructed by the Athletic Association, but after ten years of use four of these handball courts have decayed. The golf course likewise was built by the Athletic Association.

No money outside of Robinson Gymnasium, which was built in 1906, has been spent by the state for play facilities for the students of the University of Kansas. The state maintains and marks the tennis courts and maintains the grounds for golf and intramurals, but we are way behind our cousins at Manhattan in all of these respects.

A few years ago we asked Professor F. A. Russell to submit estimates for the cost of tennis and handball courts. The enclosed figures are his.

A mammoth student picnic and outdoor mixer at the opening of school next fall has been suggested. We might call it a "student-faculty day", and ask some of our leading societies to sponsor it. It occurred to me that we might have this mixer on the quadrangle and ask the different organized houses to pass up their evening meal at their houses and buy a supper ticket on the campus. Our idea was to have Miss Zipple supply the food, and the festivities would be under the control of the proper committee.

Our notion was that we could leave the lights up that have been erected for the Summer Session activities, and such games as shuffleboard, ping-pong, badminton, volleyball, loop tennis, and so forth, could be played. The band platform could be in place and could be used by the speakers and entertainers.

With some such program in the fall it would serve as an excellent opportunity for student acquaintance, which is always desirable at the opening of school. Informal games would break down the barriers. A less elaborate sort of thing would be a desirable activity in early May. If the quadrangle should prove too small at any time it would be possible to use the stadium and the play fields adjacent thereto, but the notion was that the quadrangle would be much better located and in case of inclement weather the gymnasium could be utilized.

I wish to report to you concerning my conferences with Olemn Curningian. I had four of them and found Glenn to be a fine gentleman and excellent athlete, and sociologically speaking, a superb poker player.

When I first talked to Glean regarding the position here in the Department of Physical Education he queried me regarding salary. I told him that while I had not discussed the matter with either the Chancellor or the budget committee, I was certain that there was not sufficient money here to engage him, especially with our physical education set-up as it is at present, with one position very indefinite. I told him the only way that I could see clear was for me to endeavor to find an individual who believed in his type of education sufficiently to underwrite the expenses of this venture. I told him that I was willing to endeavor to raise \$5,000 for such a position.

He came to my office a number of times for discussions and he queried me on a possible increase on this amount of money. I explained to him that for several reasons I could not recommend a higher salary. Some of these reasons were that he had no experience in teaching, and that there were other very valuable faculty nembers who had taught here for years and who were not drawing as much or more money than this enount, and that while we considered his teaching valuable we were thinking of the fine influence he would have on the youth of the state, which we considered one of his most valuable contributions.

Glenn told me at the beginning that his offer from this love college was in the middle thirty-odd hundred dollars. On his last visit to me Friday morning he wanted to know if Chancellor Lindley had ever spoken to me about his salary. He said the Chancellor said that for the first year he would be willing to agree to a \$3,000 salary, but for the second year he would recommend \$5,600. I told him that I had not discussed it with Chancellor Lindley in any way, shape or form, and that the salary that I had arrived at in my mind was contingent wholly upon the recommendation of Chancellor Malott and the budget committee. I explained to him very definitely that I had only

discussed informally with you and the budget committee the possibility of his coming.

Clerm seemed very armious to come, yet at times I seemed to denote an emphasis upon the naximum salary that he might draw.

It is my opinion that he has been very highly successful in his financial ventures the past two years, and while I would have been delighted to cooperate with the Chancellor and the budget committee in obtaining him for the University of Kansas, yet it is my lingering belief that having so many opportunities to lecture and possibly still appear in athletic competition we might have had difficulty in satisfying him in staying on the job as much as would be necessary for an efficient teaching position.

This is merely a progress report to let you know of our negotiations. Had we had sufficient time and had we been sure of Glenn's desire to accept a good will contact job, I am sure that I would have raised the money for such a venture, but I was informed that Glenn was not interested in such a contact job but desired to teach, and did not desire the contact proposition which have entailed so much time away from home. Previously I had conferred several times with him. Guy Keeler and felt that I had a pretty good basis for my conclusions.

Dear Chancellor Malott:

At the meeting of the budget committee considering the athletic expenses for the various sports of the University of Kansas Physical Education Corporation, you asked that I send you results of my inquiries and findings concerning the allotment to athletics in the various schools over the country where the compulsory activity ticket was used.

This survey was made in all the standard universities in the United States about 1935. I distinctly remember the findings, but Mr. Henry's secretary cannot locate the said information. It is my definite recollection that no standard school in the United States received less than \$5.00. In the Big Six Conference Missouri had the least, \$5.40. I am not sure that these figures obtain at the present time. However, I am sending you a copy of the letter that I wrote Chancellor Lindley just prior to my removal as Director of Athletics by the Board of Regents. This lengthy epistle sheds some light on the problem that we have constantly had before us, that of diminishing returns from athletics.

The insufficient funds that we have always been faced with has been due to the problem that athletics here have received less money from either an optional or compulsory athletic ticket than most of the standard schools in the United States. When I came to the University of Kansas it is my recollection that athletics were receiving eighteen to twenty thousand dollars from the state. In my last year as Directorythey were receiving \$7,715.

The total cost of the stadium was \$660,000, and when it is free and unincumbered of debt it will revert to the state. It seems to me that since the state will possess it, and since it has directly cost the state nothing that it would have been possible to have relieved slightly some of the Corporation's utilities debted encumbrances, such as gas, water and electricity, as well as stadium maintenance. The University of Nebrasha pays the stadium maintenance.

# A BIG BASKETBALL JUBILEE PLANNED

Naismith Memorial Committee in Springfield to Arrange Program

#### TO BE INTERNATIONAL

Springfield, Mass., Apr. 1.—An international celebration to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the invention of basketball will be held during the 1941-42 season with the city of Springfield, where the game was invented, as the focal point of the celebration. A group of prominent Springfield citizens headed by Mayor Roger L. Putnam will serve as a Naismith memorial committee to plan the events of a world celebration.

In December, 1891, Dr. James A. Naismith tacked the first peach baskets to the gymnasium railing and posted the first rules of basketball in the gymnasium of the International Young Men's Christian Association Training school, now Springfield college. The dates of basketball's golden jubilee year have been set accordingly by the committee as December, 1941, to

December, 1942.

#### To Erect "Temple"

Plans already underway will provide recognition of basketball during the anniversary year in the United States, Canada, Mexico, and the South American countries, where the game has become the most popular of all sports. The Naismith memorial committee will conduct a campaign to erect a memorial to the game's inventor to be known as a "Temple of Basketball." The building will house a basketball "Hall of Fame" that will be a depository for past, present and future basketball documents and records of the game. Another feature of the "Hall of Fame" will be the enshrining of names of annual official All-American basketball teams, selected by the sports writers of the country.

The first gift for the memorial to Dr. Naismith has been received by the committee from Dr. Naismith's Springfield college class of 1892 which has pledged the first thousand dollars for the memorial to their celebrated classmate.

The Naismith memorial committee will announce soon the list of nationally known figures who will make up the nation-wide committee to conduct the year's celebration of events in every place where the game of basketball is played.

### Yearlings Play Prominent Role in Spring Football Practice at K. U.
