Dear Dutch:

I am sending you a list of the number of dozen eggs that we got together with the dates, and you can figure what eggs were worth and put a price on them, and we will settle with you at your convenience.

On September 7 - 15, we got 11 dozen, and on October 29 we got 4 dozen and 10 eggs. On December 9 we got 5 dozen, and on March 18 we got 6 dozen and 8 eggs. On April 8 we got ten dozen. That makes a total of  $37\frac{1}{2}$  dozen. The dates will allow you to figure about the price that should have been paid at that time.

Anything you say is highly satisfactory, as I assure you that I appreciate your kindness in bringing them in.

I am sorry that I missed the boy. I am writing another Jayhawk Rebounds and will mail him a letter, but I imagine he has a new address. Drop me a line giving me his new address and I will see that he gets it pronto.
