



MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
LAWRENCE COMMUNITY CHEST

December 28, 1944

Mr. Eby called the meeting to order; the minutes were read, and there being no objections thereto, they were approved as read.

The Minutes of the Budget Committee meeting on December 22nd were read and the recommendations of the Committee acted upon as follows:

Rev. Aszman moved, seconded by Mr. Elvig that the \$2911.49 on hand in the Community Chest-War Fund Account be divided according to the ratio decided upon and that \$1,959.90 be sent to the Kansas United War Fund and that \$951.59 be given the Lawrence Community Chest. This motion carried unanimously.

Rev. Aszman moved, seconded by Mr. Penny, that the \$3000.00 of the National War Funds retained for local use be transferred to the Community Chest so that it could be administered by the Chest Board. This motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Brand moved, seconded by Mr. Elvig, that the allotments to the Member Agencies of the Community Chest be approved as follows, and this motion carried unanimously.

The next recommendation of the Budget and Finance Committee considered was the allocation of \$250.00 per month for December, January, February and March to the Community Service League. After a general discussion, it was moved by Mr. Brand and seconded by Mr. Penny to approve the allotment to the Community Service League in the amount of \$250.00 for December and \$250.00 for January. This motion carried unanimously. It was further decided to request a committee from the Community Service League to attend the next meeting of the Board of Directors and outline their program for the coming year and the probable amount of funds needed to carry out the program.

Mr. Eby announced that the Annual Meeting of the Lawrence Community Chest had been set for January 25th, 1945.

Mr. Eby next announced that the following would serve as a Nominating Committee to fill the vacancies of the retiring Board Members: John Brand, Chairman, Kelvin Hoover, Mrs. Wilfred Hunsinger, A. E. Woestemeyer and Walter Schaal.

Rev. Aszman moved, seconded by Mr. Penny, that the Budget Committee be requested to give consideration to the matter of possible investment of the \$1565.90 accrued surplus. This motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Penny, seconded by Miss Carpenter, moved for adjournment. The motion carried unanimously.

Dear Dr. Allen:-

Remember me? Jim Coulson
formerly of Newton.

I thought you might be
interested in knowing the whereabouts
of one of your students of Athletic Conditioning
and training. Remember you remarked
several times of the great need for Physical
Therapy Technicians in government work.

So during the winter of 1941/2
investigated the procedure necessary to
become a P.T.T. and this is the way it was
in 1944. First I filed an application for
examination as Jr. P.T.T. and because I
had a degree and major work in physical
education I was allowed to take an examination
in Wichita during Feb. 1942 - which I passed. Then
in June 1942 I was offered a War Service
appointment for work in an Army or Navy
hospital. I accepted and in July 1942 I was
sent to a Veterans facility, Outwood, Ky as
a Jr. Physical Therapy Technician. During
the time I was at Outwood the central office

in Washington required me to study a prescribed course in Physical Therapy and attend one class session with my chief technician each week. Then I was also required to take a written examination over the work covered at the end of each six month period. The course covered one year. This was all worked in with treatments and hikes that were given daily under the supervision of our chief Technician. That is supervision until I could handle the work. Then I was assigned certain patients and was responsible for giving treatments as prescribed by the ward doctors. There were nine wards and our Dept. received & treated some patients from all wards.

I spent nineteen months in Kentucky then was transferred in Feb. 1944 to the Veterans Administration Facility at Batavia, N.Y. with a promotion to staff technician of Physical Therapy. I am still a civil service employee but our doctors are all Army officers and in uniform.

My work here at this hospital has been varied since we have a nice dept. with a great deal of equipment. We give the treatments prescribed by the ward doctors.

Our equipment includes two electric light baths, all types of showers, whirlpool baths for arms and legs. Then we have Diathermy Infra-Red & Ultra-Violet lamps. Also the galvanic and sine wave machine. Then massage and exercise are prescribed a great deal. And by the way several men back at the other hospital were put back on their feet and able to walk out under their own power because I learned a little about hips from you at K.U. - The treatments were listed as massage and exercise but the job got done.

This is a long letter for a busy man like you to take time to read, however I thought it might be of interest to some of your physical education people to know of this way to get into physical therapy work although the approved way - if they have the time and money - is to attend a school for physical therapy.

My appointment was a war service appointment so I expect to return and finish my graduate work as soon as the war is over. I need 15 hours including my thesis. Since Elbel is not at K.U. who would be my advisor? I've been thinking I might work out a project in physical therapy that

would be acceptable as a thesis. Is that possible? Do you have any suggestions?

If you find time to answer this letter please enclose your Basket Ball schedule. In case you tour the east I might be close enough to see one of your games.




Dear Mr. Allen:
