Dear Dr. Allen:

Since you have done so much for me I thought I would drop you a line + let you know what all I have been doing the last two months.

Our basic training has taught us the fundamentals of the regular army. We have had plenty of drilling + physical training. We have P.T. twice a day + I am certainly in much better shape now than I was before I enlisted. Outside of K.P. three times, I have liked it fine. I haven't drawn in guard duty yet.

We have to take a lot more tests now than they did a month ago. The classification tests they use to give after pre-flight, they are give before you go to college. The test consists of a six hour mental and an hour and a half psychomotor (co-ordination). It is a little rough, in fact about 50% of the guys washed out. Gov't has decided it is better to give it before college so as not to waste time + money on guys + then have a large percentage wash out. I passed the test + I think I am classified as a pilot but I don't know for sure.

I was a super on a shipping list that shipped out last Sunday for Wisconsin. None of the supers shipped + we were supposed to be on the next order





but some are shipping tomorrow + none of us are on it so I don't have any idea as to when I will ship. Some of the guys think we will leave next week + I certainly hope so.

We live in huts, eight to each hut. They have flaps for windows + a screen door with weather proofing. They have small stoves but the temperature remains about the same as it is outdoors. I about freeze every morning + I have had a cold ever since I arrived here.

I have my Cadet uniform + they are really nice looking. <sup>haha</sup> They are very much like an officers uniform. It is surprising how many soldiers salute you.

It is about time for lights out so I will sign off. Once again I want to thank you for everything you have done for me.



I just received a letter from "Frosty" Hardacre. "Frosty" had his boot training at Farragut, Idaho. He is now stationed at Bainbridge, Maryland, going through the Navy Physical Indoc-trination School. Upon completion of his course, he will be sent to some part of the country to assist in the physical conditioning of our Naval personnel.


At present, I am stationed at the University of Minnesota. I was sent up here July 24 on temporary orders to supervise the military and physical training of eighty-one officer students going through an indoctrination course in aeronautical engineering. These men are all college graduates, varying from twenty-one to thirty-one years of age. All are ensigns with the exception of six who are j.g.'s. Their enthusiasm and response is excellent. They will be a definite asset to the Navy, as they will be sent to all parts of the world to take care of the maintenance and repair of aircraft. Upon completion of this course on October 16, I will be sent back to Memphis, Tennessee.

I have found Minnesota a very delightful place. It has been cool and very comfortable. I took an hour ride in an airplane yesterday. I am now convinced of the many, many lakes that are scattered over Minnesota.

At this writing, I am wondering about Kansas football. Are they finding any talent in the Navy that is stationed aboard? I have secured tickets for the Minnesota and Missouri game, and also the Nebraska and Camp Grant contests. Maybe I should scout Nebraska for Schaake and his cohorts, eh?

I am not sure, but I think Senesky is one of the greatest players, outside of Hank Luisetti and Chuck



Hyatt, that I have seen in action, but I guess that can be said of Andy Phillips, too, can it not? As for Ray Evans, I think he is the perfect athlete - the answer to a coach's dream. He is not only a fine student, but is a marvelous competitor and a modest, quiet gentleman. He is an All-American football player, and certainly in my opinion, an All-American basketball player. I would go all out on this boy at any time.

If there is any additional information you would like I would be happy to accommodate you. I trust that you land your story, and hope that my letter is not too late for your magazine piece. Yes, I remember you very well. I remember what a shellacking we took from Branch McCracken's boys that night in March. 
To Members of Phi Delta Kappa:
