Dear Sir:-

As one who much enjoys watching basketball, I have been interested in the stories in the press regarding possible rule changes. So pardon me if I submit a few ideas on the subject.


First. To avoid the crush in rebounding, I would suggest a rule that when the ball is taken off the bankboard or the hoop it has to be either passed to another player, or bounced on the floor before another shot could be taken at the basket. Under this rule it would be advantageous to spread the men out a bit, and some very pretty plays could be developed.

Second. There is too much intentional fouling. I would suggest that when a player gets two shots, he be given two points if he makes the first shot, and the second shot be cancelled. If he misses the first shot but makes the second, give him two points for that. A more stringent penalty on intentional fouling will make for better clean guarding. If this suggestion is too severe, Give him two points if he makes the first basket, one point if he misses the first but makes the second.

Third. If it is advisable to slow up the game, it is not necessary to restore the center jump. Simply rule that after a basket the ball has to be held a certain number of seconds, say 3 to 6, before being put into play from end of floor.

Fourth. The rules committee should take what action is necessary to clarify the call on baskets. When teams A and B are playing, some radio announcers call A's basket the one A defends, others call A's basket the one they shoot at. I believe A's basket should be the one they defend, just as the goal line in football. In listening to games over the radio one has to guess quite a bit of the time where the ball is.



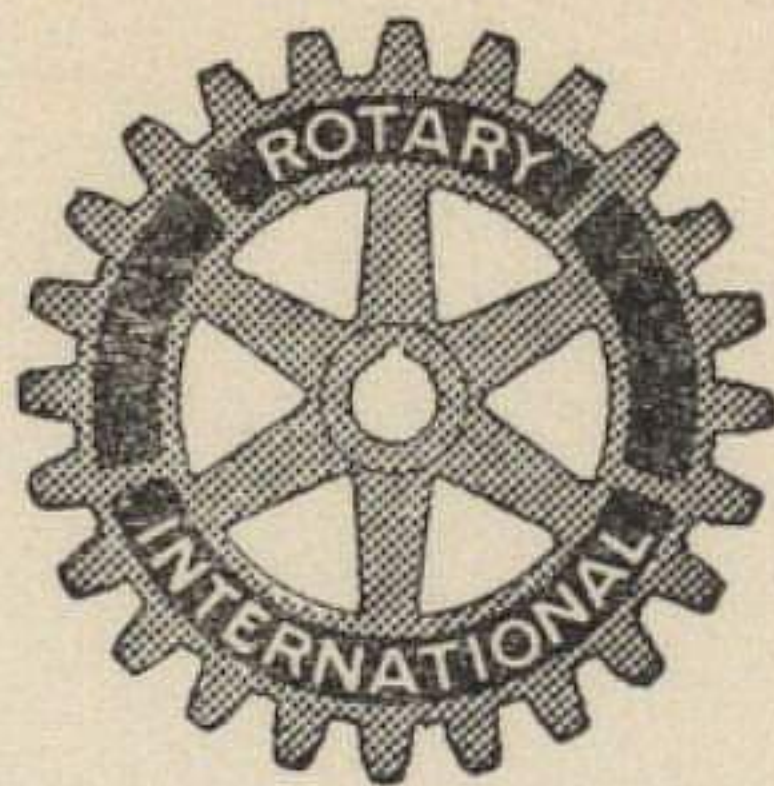

In times past you have expressed your interest in the improved training for teachers in health education. Because of this interest, we would like to call your attention to two meetings of the Teacher-Training Section of the Health Education Division of the A.A.H.P.E.R. on April 26 and 27. Both meetings will be held at 9 o'clock in the Stevens Hotel in Chicago. Consult your program for the rooms.

The Friday meeting will be devoted to a discussion of the problems of health education that teachers meet in the field. This will be a discussion meeting centering around the needs of teachers. We hope there will be a realistic discussion of the needs that teachers actually find. There will be no prepared speeches. A number of individuals have been invited to serve as resource people, but we are hopeful that there will be wide participation from the entire group.

The Saturday meeting will be devoted to a consideration of the problems teachers meet in sex education. Dr. Bertha Schafer of the Illinois Social Hygiene Association will speak. I want you to know how genuinely I enjoyed that swell visit we had Monday noon. You people are very generous hosts, and I delighted in every moment of our all too short visit.

You asked about the expenses at the University. The sorority dues are about \$50.00 a month, and the tuition is as follows: Matriculation, \$10.00; incidental, \$25.00 a semester; health, \$5.00 a semester; activity, \$8.75 (the present year). The matriculation and incidental fees given above are for residents of the state.

Well, this is Monday morning and after five attempts to start and endeavor to finish your letter I will attack it the first thing this morning so there will be no more delays or breaks in the *daison*. I asked Eleanor regarding the dues at her sorority house, that is for board and dues, and this gives you the bare expenses. By the way, the activity fee will be increased to \$12.00 next semester, so that will be an additional \$3.25.

I think it would not be fair unless you should add about \$2.50 per month for sorority assessments. They do not come, of course, as regular tax, but before the year is up we find that there are always some extras, so I believe by including \$2.50 a month you would cover all of the sorority party assessments, and so forth.

Bess and I are leaving Wednesday morning for Chicago where I will attend the National Health, Physical Education and Recreation Association for four days, including the 27th. Bess is then leaving for Louisville to visit Mary and her

children. Then Mary and Bess will drive on to New York for a couple of weeks or so, taking in the points of interest and seeing some shows that they have been counting on.

I have a speaking date at Wichita on Monday, and at Russell, Kansas, on Tuesday. I mention this only because of the fact that if you have other questions to write me, gather them together and drop me a note and at the first opportunity I will have another visit with you.

Tell Florence I am sorry I did not get to see her at the high school but we will have a visit real soon.

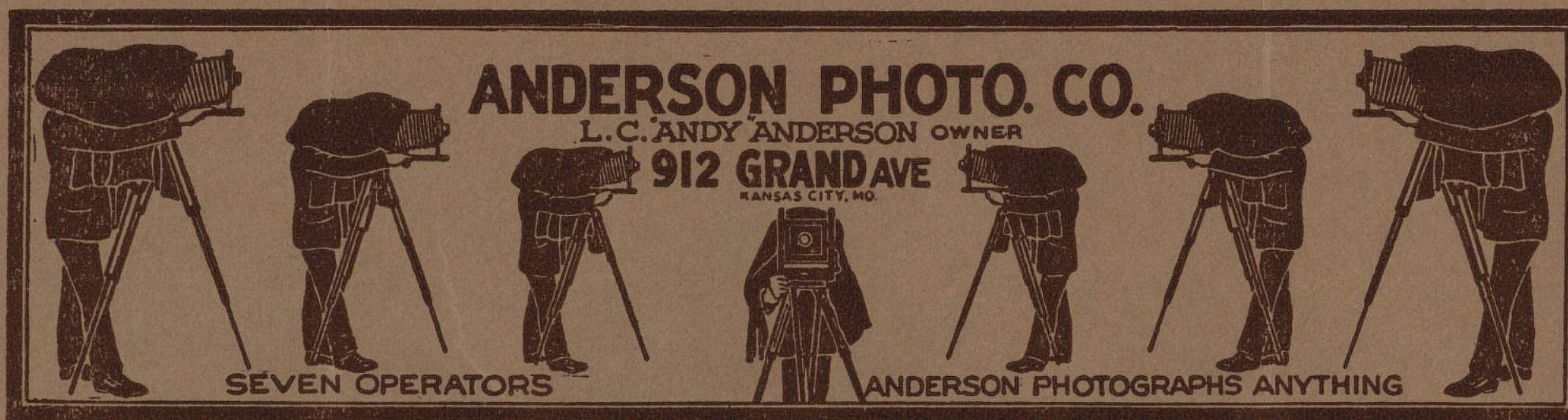
