



BASKETBALL INTERPRETATIONS OF THE BIG SIX CONFERENCE

I. General Suggestions:

- a. Officials should notify athletic authorities upon their arrival in town.
- b. Starting time of games will be as follows:
 - 1) Iowa State - 7:15 during the week; 7:30 on Friday and Saturday.
 - 2) Kansas - 7:30 p.m.
 - 3) Kansas State - 7:30 p.m.
 - 4) Oklahoma - 7:30 p.m.
 - 5) Missouri - 8:00 p.m.
 - 6) Nebraska - 8:00 p.m.
- c. The home team is to wear white uniforms. This includes shirt and pants. The visitors are to dress in their school colors.
- d. A copy of the official box score shall be mailed to the Secretary of the Big Six Conference.
- e. The visiting team is to send to the home team at least eight days in advance of the game, the names and numbers of all players who will make the trip.
- f. Each school is to exchange with all others squad information primarily for pre-game publicity. This information should include number, name, position, height, weight, home town, year on the varsity, men lost by graduation, veteran letter men returning, and any team records which may add to newspaper interest.
- g. The type of ball used by each school is as follows:
 - 1) Iowa State - Rawlings Naismith Lace.
 - 2) Kansas - Wilson, Spalding and Rawlings, Lace.
 - 3) Kansas State -
 - 4) Missouri - Rawlings Naismith Lace.
 - 5) Nebraska - Wilson Laceless.
 - 6) Oklahoma - Rawlings Naismith Lace.
- h. The Coaches have officially endorsed the Bask-O-Lite goals for the Big Six. If any school does not care to use these goals the home team will install regular goals when that team is playing there.

II. Rules Interpretations:

- a. When a basket is made the official will signal the basket by raising his arm and showing two fingers.
- b. All held balls are to be put in play in the nearest of the three circles. If there is doubt as to which is the nearest circle, the center is the one used.
- c. The official shall place his hand on the back of the player fouled and raise the other hand.
- d. Rule 8, Section 8, under Note relative to division line, the following is an attempt to make the rule clear:

If a player passes the ball from his back court to a team-mate who is touching or straddling the division line the ball has been passed into the front court. If a player passes the ball from his front court to a team-mate who is touching or straddling the division line the ball has been passed into the back

court. In other words the division line is in the front court or back court according to the position from which the ball is thrown. While he is in legal possession in such position the division line is a neutral area and the player's court location does not change because of any pivot until such time as both feet may touch the floor while entirely on one side of the line. Thereafter any stepping on or over the line changes the court location of the player.

e. We want to call attention to the Note to Officials under Rule 10, Section 1 which is as follows:

"Whenever a ball is rewarded to a team out of bounds from its front court area the official must hand the ball immediately to the player who is to put it into play. If there is any confusion or misunderstanding among the players as to the decision the official should obtain possession of the ball and not permit the player entitled to it to play it until both teams have had a chance to recover their positions.

f. Relative to the Substitution Rule. Substitution is permitted after a goal or made free throw. The procedure is as follows: The substitute reports to the scorer, the scorer sounds his horn loudly and quickly, the referee upon hearing the horn blowing his whistle and recognizing the substitute, permitting him to come on the floor. The point we are trying to make is this: That the substitute should not go on the floor in these two situations until he has been recognized by the referee. We would like to impress upon the officials that they warn the time-keepers to make these substitutions before the team that has been scored upon has had an opportunity to put the ball into play. If however, the time-keeper's horn has sounded after the team scored upon has put the ball into play, no play by the team scored upon can follow until the substitution is complete.

Dear Frank:

Apparently I missed a story in one of the daily papers out of Lincoln which told of Ebaugh batting the ball away from the basket, much after the manner of Wellhausen's performance last winter. The rules committee added a provision to Rule 14 which prohibited a defensive player from interfering with the ball in any part of the space enclosed by an imaginary cylinder having the rim of the basket as its base and extending perpendicularly upward.

Wellhausen's performance came in for much discussion at the rules meeting when this rule was put in. I am just writing you to ask if you were given full protection of this rule. I will not worry about how you played it, as that is my problem, but I will appreciate it if you will write me and tell me if you thought you were given full protection under that rule.

I did not see the article, but some of the boys mentioned it yesterday, and I thought at least I should find out all the details of the proposition. I will appreciate it if you will let me know before your trip to Norman.

Frank, it looks as if you and I are going to have some tough entangles in the very near future. Our last game was with Missouri on the 19th of January, and our examinations have just finished and the boys have been off a week without practice, so they certainly look groggy. They may snap out of it by Wednesday, but I wouldn't give too much on a bet.

Good luck to you down at Norman. From the way those scat boys are going it looks like you are going to need it.

Dear Dr. Allen:

I want to acknowledge your letter of January 18th in regard to the use of the Bask-O-Lite goal in the Big Six Conference.

I am enclosing a copy of the letter just mailed to Louie Menze at Iowa State which will explain a little more in detail our attitude in regard to this goal.

Inasmuch as the conference agreement in Kansas City was to the effect that any coach who did not prefer the goal would have the privilege of asking for the old basket for their games, I am notifying you now that Nebraska prefers the old style goal.

We are not in the mood to consider changing and inasmuch as George Edwards and Frank Root are not using the goal and since Oklahoma is evidently not sold on the idea, I see no reason for our conference to attempt to put this over.

My opinion is further influenced by the fact that the non-conference teams are definitely against the use of these goals.

Dear Louie:

I want to reply to your letter of January 14th in regard to the Bask-O-Lite goals.

I recall very well the conference meeting at which time it seemed we were the only ones not interested in this goal. I did not have the time to experiment with the goal to give it my consideration and felt as you did that if the rest of the conference wanted the goal, Nebraska would put it in.

We installed these goals and gave them a thorough trial and did not find them satisfactory. The non-conference teams that we played were very much opposed to our use of this goal and this made it rather inconvenient and unpleasant to change the goal every time that we had a new team coming to the Coliseum. Our boys did not like the goal. The tall boys did not like it for the reasons we have discussed and the small boys did not like it as they felt as if they were shooting at two rims as well as the other common reasons for disliking the goal.

They also had considerable amount of mechanical trouble. In fact, two sets were installed before the switches were set properly and functioned as they should. The inconvenience hinging around these baskets certainly has proven to us that they are not worth the amount of money necessary to install them.

The main reason for using this goal is to flash the light when a basket is made for the information and guidance of the spectators behind the basket. We have found a very satisfactory substitute in the way of lights to be controlled from the scorer's bench similar to what George Edwards was doing at Missouri. These were tried in our game with Kansas State and were very satisfactory. In other words, everything considered, Louie, we do not want to use the Bask-O-Lite goal and would prefer the old goal for our game at Ames next Saturday night.

It was my understanding at the conference meeting that should anyone not care for the goal, they would have their choice at the time of the game. George Edwards and Frank Root have come to the same conclusion as Nebraska and from my correspondence with McDermott of Oklahoma, he is of the same opinion that the goal is not worth the price and would much rather use the old style. We feel we have given this a very thorough trial and have found a substitute for the only valid reason to use the goal, that is a light to flash when a goal is made, and would therefore, very much prefer playing on your court with the old style basket.

LEFT FORWARD -- Two veterans, Harlan Anderson, first reserve two seasons ago, and Harry Roschlau, major letter winner of last season, may be displaced by a pair of newcomers, Wendell Allan, 6-foot sophomore from Ames, and Bill Nechanicky, outstanding in intramural basketball last season. It is likely that Allan and Anderson will get the first call. Both are good shots but Allan has the edge in all-around floor play.

FLOOR FORWARD (Offensive guard, defensive forward) -- Minor letter winner Bob Kliebenstein, and sophomores Bob Menze, son of the coach, and Warren Maxon, 170-pounders, are the leading prospects. Though Kliebenstein is larger than the sophomores, the latter are fast and are clever ball-handlers. Menze's coolness, basket eye and cleverness will probably give him first call.

CENTER -- A four-way battle between two Ames sophomores, Hilary Ryan and Don Beresford, minor letterwinner Alan Kilborn and sophomore Al Munsell. Kilborn, at 6 foot 6, is the tallest man on the squad. Ryan and Beresford, each 6 foot 1, appear to have the edge at the pivot post.

FLOOR GUARD -- Bob Blahnik, eighth high scorer in the Big Six conference, this year is easily the outstanding man at this position. Other candidates are Maxon and Kliebenstein, also prospects for the "floor" forward position. Blahnik, a rugged 6-footer, is a clever floor man, a good shot and a fighter.

BACK GUARD -- Bill Bliss, 190-pound Ames sophomore, looks like a real prospect. He's big, rugged, fast, a good ball handler and cool under fire. An all-state man in high school. Other prospects for this position are Malvin Levine, and sophomores Al Munsell and Clement Marsden.

SUMMARY: Summing up the prospects it looks as if the five Ames sophomores -- members of the state high school championship quintet of 1936 -- two other sophomores and three veterans will do most of the playing for Iowa State this season. Anderson and Allan at one forward; Menze, Kliebenstein and Maxon at the other; Ryan and Beresford at center; Blahnik, Kliebenstein and Maxon at floor guard; Bliss and one of three others at the back guard.

For IMMEDIATE Release---Big Six Composite Basketball Schedule.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Dec. 1.---Basketball schedules of the Big Six schools, in addition to the 30 games necessary for the double round robin, now have an even 50 non-conference games. Kansas has the limit of 10 non-conference contests; Iowa State has but five, and the others have eight each.

Practically all the non-conference games are to be played in December, largely for their practice value, but a few traditional contests come during the regular conference season. An unusually large number of new names appear in the non-conference lists, the Oklahoma-Oklahoma A. & M.; but the Nebraska-Minnesota; the Iowa State Grinnell; the Missouri-Washington and the Missouri-St. Louis games are on the list.

Kansas and Iowa State open the season with games Dec. 3, and the conference season opens at Lawrence when Oklahoma meets Kan-

sas. The conference season closes likewise at Lawrence, with the Kansas-Missouri game, March 3.

The first round of conference play is completed Feb. 5, except for the Missouri-Oklahoma game, which is set for Feb. 21 at Norman. The return game is at Columbia 12 days later, Feb. 28. In the original schedule this game was set for Feb. 26, but Oklahoma will go to Iowa State for the Saturday night game, and meet Missouri on the way home.

Nebraska and Oklahoma also have a pair of close games, meeting at Norman Feb. 5 and at Lincoln Feb. 9.

Feb. 21 is the only date on which all six teams are engaged in conference play, and there are but three dates with two conference games, namely, Jan. 15, Feb. 5, and Feb. 12.

Mid-year examinations thin out the games in late January, with only one the week of Jan. 24-29, and that on Saturday night.
