

paid by the state. Therefore, Stanford maintains that the alumni must raise the tuition money for the students. But Stanford raises it all - \$245 a quarter, and the scholarship carries room, board and spending money. Hank Luisetti sold me a "Buckster" and I subscribed to get the information. All that is printed on the four pages of the monthly "Buckster" is information regarding football, basketball, track and baseball. Those are the four sports in which scholarships are given.

U.S.C. Bill Hunter, the athletic director, is a glorified personnel man who does a better job of getting the athletes than the traveling representatives of U.S.C. It is alleged that they use receipts directly taken in at football games to subsidize athletes. A part of this money is set aside for advertising and otherwise, and is paid directly to the boys. The movie actors and other large directors turn in fabulous sums.

Tulane, L.S.U., Alabama and the other southern schools - some have either a \$90.00 or \$125.00 monthly stipend which they pay the boys. There are no bones about it. When I was down at Atlanta this summer I talked to these high school boys, all-star fellows who had just graduated from high school and they were playing in this all-star football and all-star basketball game. I talked to a big fellow, Richardson, from a small town in Georgia, who is going to U.S.C. He told me that he was to get \$125 a month, and told me just as openly as a boy that would get a job with any firm. He was one of the most beautiful specimens of humanity that I have ever seen. He weighed 206 pounds, a perfect Adonis, and built as symmetrically and beautifully - well, I started to say as Bill Bunsen, but a lot better. He was a magnificent specimen to gaze upon and he was a member of the National Honor Society. He was clean, handsome, intelligent, and intensely appealing to any man who loved human flesh at its best. The boys down there expect a contract and they consider this an honorable arrangement.

Kentucky. A few years ago the University of Kentucky started out to build up their athletics and they took \$10,000 from the athletic fund and charged it to advertising. They used this \$10,000 to hire football, basketball and baseball players at \$90.00 a month. That is the price at Kentucky.

The Big Ten. There is one assistant athletic director in an institution in the environs of Chicago that operates much like Mr. Hunter. He hires the boys, keeps them in hotels or otherwise, pays their bills and checks on their eligibility. But of course the director of this institution knows nothing about what the assistant director is doing. I talked to Major Griffith this last spring and he said that the Big Ten worked out a system to correct proselyting. When the boys come to the college as freshmen the athletic director interviews these boys and if propositions have been made to them by scouts from schools in this territory, then he will refuse to sched-
