When Howard Jones went to U.S.C. as head football coach, Sam Barry followed him to U.S.C. two years later. Everett Case then enrolled in U.S.C. to take his advanced academic work and became Sam Barry's freshman coach. After taking some work at U.S.C. Everett Case returned to Indiana as high school coach. Nine of Sam Barry's eleven men on last year's U.S.C. team were from Indiana around the environment of Case.

When Wes Fry needed a line coach he hired Stan Williamson, who played under Howard Jones and Barry at U.S.C.

When Frank Root, the basketball coach at Kansas State, resigned this past year, Jack Gardner, the captain of Sam Barry's basketball and baseball teams at U.S.C., was hired. You can see that Wes Fry, Stan Williamson and Jack Gardner are all pupils of Howard Jones and Sam Barry. If Iowa and U.S.C. operated successfully in an athletic way, you can perhaps figure out that Kansas State will not go to sleep when it comes to using some of the legitimate means in getting good boys to Manhattan.

Iowa State. Perhaps the least proselyting is going on in that institution, but George Veenker, the athletic director, coached at Gary, Indiana, and the University of Michigan before coming to Iowa State. In my opinion Veenker is the shrewdest athletic director in the Big Six. That is not excluding Major "Biff" Jones and Tom Stidham. But Ames being a very small town and Iowa State being an agricultural college, there is not the same pressure put on them to win that is put on the other Big Six rivals. Yeager, the Iowa State football coach at present, is a Hays, Kansas, alumnus, and if there is any small institution that knows how to cover the wide open spaces and to write contracts on the cuff, it is these people from Western Kansas.

St. Benedict's College. Marty Peters and Don Elser, the coaches at St. Benedict's, use the Stanford system of "buck a month" contributions. They have a large clientele, and the St. Benedict's administration operates on this schedule. Moon Mullins was there before Marty Peters and Don Elser, and Mr. J. D. Coursey, of Kansas City, and others supported it at that time much after the manner Notre Dame is now supported athletically.
