Stafford-Fratt continued

Again Dellinger shoots a long shot when team is behind 17-8.

Stafford showing difficulty in being able to work through Pratt's defense.

HALF Stafford-Pratt feme.

Sportsmanship of both teams is very excellent. The play is very clean, showing a high regard to play the ball and not the man. An observation is made, however, that there could be more conversation among the team mates and thereby developing a little closer unity among the men on the floor. Conversation between team mates adds to the morale.

Beginning of the Third Quarter

Again S. Barker pasking to Hillard on side line, then S. Barker dribbled down side line, pivoted, lost the ball. The other quard could have slipped over and received the pass. S. Barker recovered the ball, dribbled, instead of passing the ball. He dribbled down side line instead of cutting in towards center.

This seems to be reneral -- both teams working on side line too much.

Unruh received the ball 10 feet from basket -- by pivoting on inside foot and pulling back ball over shoulder a try should be made for a basket.

Illustrate

S. Barker pivoted and passed to Murphy who drove in toward the center for a nice play. Defensive position of both teams could be more secure.

Illustrate

S. Barker uses swing pivot again throwing 2 fouls.

Both teems use about the same system during the third quarter as for the first and second quarter.

Teams do not huddle when time out is called or when time is taken for a chance in personnel.

Fourth Quarter

Illustrate: slide dribble Illustrate: hook pass

Teams do not bend their knees enough prior to start of play or on defense.

(Heflin of Pratt-very good) (Brock of Stafford-very cool and clever)

Brock of Stafford-when referee stands in circle you should step out until referee leaves circle. There is a psychological interference.

Then Brock and Willard were fighting for the ball, a tipping of the ball up in the air rather that driving forward would perhaps produced more results.

I would suggest on officiating that the officials place their hands upon the men fouled, and demonstrate the foul. This helps the spectators interest and aids the score keeper. Sometimes an official desiring to minimize the calling of the foul will walk away to the free throw line and leave the spectators to wonder.

Booing and unsportsmanship conduct on the part of the spectators is responsible for 8 to 10 point advantage in the home team. This perhaps accounts for some of the officials failing to demonstrate a foul.
